14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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Flagler County requests capital funds to construct an Integrated Behavioral Health Stabilization Unit and Men's Substance Abuse Residential Treatment Program. The ISU will accept both voluntary and involuntary patients experiencing a behavioral health crisis. The ISU will be a short term, stabilization service. The residential treatment program will accept both voluntary and involuntary patients. These services are currently not provided in Flagler County.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Following construction, the facility will provide mental health crisis stabilization, detoxification, residential substance abuse treatment, and outpatient medication assisted treatment (MAT) to Flagler County residents regardless of their ability to pay for the services provided. With the exception of MAT, these services are not currently provided anywhere in Flagler County.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Following construction, the facility will provide integrated crisis stabilization and addiction receiving facility services as defined in 65E-12.110 FAC and residential level 2 services as described in 65D-30.007 FAC.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population consists of anyone with drug abuse issue, any persons with poor mental health and those in the criminal justice system that are drug offenders. This new facility is estimated to serve anywhere from 400 to 800 of the target population.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

80% of clients entering residential treatment will enroll in and continue to participate in primary care services throughout their length of stay. 80% of residential clients will be linked with continuing primary care services subsequent to discharge. 100% of individuals discharged from the ISU will be linked with ongoing care following discharge. Through mental health intervention, the Flagler County residents should see a reduction in violent crime and recidivism rate. 75% of client admissions to the ISU will not be re-admitted within 90 days of successful completion. 90% of residential clients will not be readmitted to a residential or ISU program within 45 days of successful completion. 70% of ISU detox admissions will successfully complete the treatment episode.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Given that this a proposal for capital funding, failure to construct the facility and provide evidence that costs incurred in construction were equal to or greater than the amount appropriated would result in the repayment of any unexpended funds.
