An act relating to an annual study of the use of restrictive housing; creating s. 944.022, F.S.; requiring the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability to conduct an annual study on the use of restrictive housing for all prisoners in the state correctional system; specifying the types of restrictive housing placements to be studied; requiring that the annual study include specified data per certain age groups and categories as it relates to the uses of restrictive housing, to include the frequency and duration, demographic information, the conditions of restrictive housing, mental health, economic data, and program questions; requiring state agencies and contractors that receive state funds to comply with requests from the office; requiring the office, beginning on a specified date and annually thereafter, to submit a report to the Governor and the Legislature; providing an effective date.

examples are typically described as solitary confinement. The

restrictive housing placements to be studied must include

individuals placed in single cells and double cells.

- (1) The annual study must include all of the following data, disaggregated per individuals under 18 years of age, per individuals 18 to 21 years of age, per individuals 22 to 49 years of age, and per individuals 50 years of age and older; disaggregated per correctional facility; disaggregated per type of restrictive housing; and aggregated per total of the Department of Corrections, as follows:
  - (a) Frequency and duration.-
- 1. The total number of individuals placed in any type of restrictive housing.
- 2. The total number of monthly restrictive housing placements at each facility, including by type of restrictive housing.
- 3. The duration of each individual's placement in restrictive housing, including the total number of consecutive days any individual is continuously assigned to any type of restrictive housing and the number of consecutive days an individual is continuously assigned to each type of restrictive housing.
- $\underline{\text{4. The reason each individual is placed in restrictive}}$  housing.
  - 5. The frequency at which each individual is placed in any

type of restrictive housing during the year.

- (b) Demographic information.—For each individual placed in restrictive housing during the year:
- 1. The individual's gender, race, ethnicity, and age at the time of entering restrictive housing.
- 2. Whether each individual placed in restrictive housing has any known qualifying disability under the federal Americans with Disabilities Act, including, but not limited to, mental illnesses, sensory disabilities, mobility disabilities, intellectual disabilities, neurological disabilities, or chronic medical conditions, and if so, which disabilities.
- 3. Whether each individual placed in restrictive housing has any known developmental disabilities, including, but not limited to, autism spectrum disorder, intellectual disabilities, or learning disorders, and, if so, which developmental disabilities.
  - (c) Conditions of restrictive housing.-
- 1. Which, if any, alternative strategies were employed before the use of restrictive housing.
- 2. Which, if any, mental health interventions were used during restrictive housing.
- 3. How often security checks were conducted by correctional staff for individuals in restrictive housing.
- 4. The frequency and duration of each medical check for individuals in restrictive housing, as determined through video review.
- 5. The frequency of restrictions on property or removal of inmate property as outlined in rule 33-602.201, Florida

  Administrative Code, during restrictive housing. If there are

any restrictions or removals, the reasons for the property restriction or removal, the duration of the property restriction or removal, and the type of property restricted or removed, such as a mattress, sheets, clothes, or personal property.

- 6. The number of accommodations requests pursuant to the Americans with Disabilities Act during restrictive housing and the number of accommodations provided.
- 7. The conditions of restrictive housing in each facility, including, but not limited to, air conditioning and access to legal phone calls, reading materials, adequate nutrition, clothing, medicine or medical attention, showers, and hygienic supplies.
  - 8. The size of each room used for restrictive housing.
- 9. For individuals under the age of 18 placed in restrictive housing, whether they had an individual education plan when they entered restrictive housing and, if so, whether they had access to all of the support services, accommodations, and modifications included in the individual education plan during restrictive housing.
- (d) Mental health.—This study shall analyze all of the following:
- 1. If and how being placed in restrictive housing impacts an individual's mental health, including the severity of mental illness before, during, and after restrictive housing.
- 2. The number of placements in Self-Harm Observation Status and the number of instances of self-injurious behavior, including self-mutilations and other types of self-harm that occurred during restrictive housing.
  - 3. The number of placements in inpatient mental health

treatment, including crisis stabilization units, transitional care units, and mental health treatment facilities.

- 4. The number of attempted suicides that occurred in restrictive housing.
- 5. The number of suicides that occurred during restrictive housing.
- 6. The number of psychological autopsies conducted on individuals who had been placed in restrictive housing.
- (e) Economic data.—Assuming the Department of Corrections' compliance with all policies and regulations, all of the following:
- 1. The average yearly cost of housing individuals in maximum management versus the average yearly cost of housing individuals in the general population.
- 2. The average yearly cost of housing individuals in disciplinary confinement versus the average yearly cost of housing individuals in the general population.
- 3. The average yearly cost of housing individuals in close management versus the average yearly cost of housing individuals in the general population.
- 4. The average yearly cost of housing individuals in administrative confinement versus the average yearly cost of housing individuals in the general population.
- 5. The average yearly cost of housing individuals in maximum management, disciplinary confinement, close management, and administrative confinement versus the average yearly cost of housing individuals in the general population.
- 6. If the Department of Corrections calculates the costs of restrictive housing, state the methodology used by the

department to measure the costs of restrictive housing.

- (f) Program questions.—
- 1. Whether restrictive housing is more or less expensive than the cost of housing an individual in the general population.
- 2. Whether the recidivism rate after 3 years is different for individuals who spent time in restrictive housing than for individuals who did not.
- $\underline{\mbox{3. How being placed in isolation impacts an individual's}}$  mental health.
- (2) All state agencies and contractors that receive state funds of any kind shall comply with each request for data and information from the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability. By July 1 of each year, beginning in 2025, the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability shall report its findings to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2024.
