


Recidivism Rates over Time



■ 13-24 Months ■ 1-12 Months



Therefore, expenditure impacts related to decertification of existing judges would occur over multiple fiscal years through attrition.

FLORIDA PUBLIC DEFENDER ASSOCIATION BUDGET PRESENTATION FY 2017/18

96% of Public Defender budgets are dedicated to personnel (salary & benefits)

- Total Filled FTEs: approx. 2800
- Attorneys: approximately 60% of total employees
- Other employees: investigators, legal assistants, paralegals, mitigation specialists, witness interviewers, other non-lawyer assistants

There is a critical need to recruit and retain experienced attorneys

- Approximately 62% of Assistant Public Defenders have less than 6 years' experience
- Average statewide turnover rate: 16.5%
- Turnover costs money
- Experienced attorneys are needed to handle complex cases, including capital cases

FLORIDA PUBLIC DEFENDER ASSOCIATION BUDGET PRIORITIES FY 17/18:

1. ASSISTANT PD SALARY PARITY WITH ASSISTANT SAs (ALL Circuits, Trial/Appellate)

- APDs earn an average of \$4030 less per year than ASAs doing the same work
- \$4030 (salary increase) + \$1,185 (fringe benefits) = \$5215
- \$5215 x 1544 (filled APD FTEs as of June 30, 2016) = \$8,051,960 GR
- GR is requested because ICDTF and PD Revenue Trust Funds do <u>not</u> have the recurring cash necessary to fund this issue

2. GRAHAM/MILLER WORKLOAD—CIRCUIT SPECIFIC (17 Circuits requesting)

- Unfunded mandate from Courts to resentence juveniles who received life or functional equivalent of life sentences
 - o Over 1000 cases statewide identified
- Also applies to future cases where juveniles are charged as adults on serious crimes
- Experienced staff is required in these cases. ABA Guidelines: 2 attorneys, 1 investigator, 1 mitigation specialist assigned to each case.
- Requires attorneys, investigators, and mitigation specialists to explore the offender's entire life history, similar to investigation required in capital cases
- Factors in determining the appropriate sentence that must be considered:
 - o 1) the nature and circumstances of the offense; 2) the effect of the crime on the victim's family and community; 3) the defendant's age, maturity, intellectual capacity, and emotional health, 4) the defendant's background; 5) the effect of immaturity, impetuosity, or failure to appreciate risks and consequences on defendant's participation in the offense; 6) the extent of defendant's participation in the offense 7) the effect of familial pressure or peer pressure on the defendant's actions; 8) the nature and extent of defendant's prior criminal history; 9) the effect of characteristics attributable to defendant's youth; and 10) the possibility of rehabilitating the defendant. F.S.921.
 - Records must be gathered, evaluations must be conducted, interviews of family and friends undertaken, educational materials obtained, and mental health history explored, and interviews with teachers, neighbors, program caseworkers, correctional staff, and other people who may assist in understanding and presenting the client's life story
- FTEs = 59 GR: \$4,480,187 TRUST: \$447,717 = \$4,927,904
 - Due Process costs associated with cases appear in JAC budget—approx.\$10-15K per case

FLORIDA PUBLIC DEFENDER ASSOCIATION BUDGET PRIORITIES Continued:

3. MENTAL HEALTH WORKLOAD-CIRCUIT SPECIFIC (16 Circuits requesting)

- PDs are experiencing increased workload in the area of specialty courts including Mental
 Health/Substance Abuse Courts, Veterans Courts, and in the area of Baker Acts and Civil Commitments
 due to intellectual disability.
- Specialized and experienced APDs/staff are needed to give effective representation.
- Baker Acts have increased 84.92% from 2003 to 2015
 - From 104,593 in 2013 to 193,410 in 2015
 - The increase in the numbers of involuntary exam initiations is greater than the Florida population increase during this time
 - http://www.usf.edu/cbcs/baker-act/documents/annual_report.pdf
 - Ex: PD8 30% increase in Baker Acts last year; PD6 48% increase in 4 years
- APD Annual Reviews pursuant to F.S. 393.11 for those involuntarily admitted to residential services
 - New, unfunded workload ordered by Courts
 - Must have annual review but Court may order more frequent reviews
- Specialty Courts have increased statewide
 - Often without corresponding funding increase for PDs
 - Requires experienced attorneys
 - Longer case processing times that standard cases
- FTE: 38.50 GR: \$3,088,947 TRUST: \$638,097 = \$3,727,044

4. 5% SALARY INCREASE FOR ALL PD EMPLOYEES (ALL Circuits, Trial/Appellate)

- No across the board pay increases or cost of living increase since 2006
- GR: \$8,270,315

APPEALS LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES (5 Appellate Offices-Circuits 2,7,10,11,15)

- Issues #1 (Salary Parity) and #4 (5% salary increase), above
- Appellate Workload-Circuit Specific:
 - 4 Circuits requesting FTE: 33 GR: \$2,403,926
 - o Additional APDs/staff needed to deal with the backlog of cases which causes delay in the process
 - Reduce caseloads of individual attorneys, which at 38 appeals/year per APD over last 2 years exceeds national standards of 25 appeals/year per APD (32% above national standards)
- E-Filing Mandate—Circuit Specific
 - o GR: \$57,789 FTE: 1
 - Staff and equipment to print paper copy of record on appeal
 - Supreme Court mandates records on appeal be provide electronically by clerks
 - PD must provide client with record on appeal at conclusion of appeal
 - Paper record printed because DOC will not permit electronic viewing
 - Idea: DOC should allow electronic access or be responsible for printing paper copy
- Reauthorization of non-recurring funding--Circuit Specific:
 - o 3 Circuits requesting GR: \$311,250
 - Requesting that non-recurring GR appropriated in FY 16/17 be re-appropriated as recurring GR to continue to reduce backlog of case, prevent future backlog and to maintain current staffing levels


Offices of Criminal Conflict and Civil Regional Counsel

The Office of Criminal Conflict and Civil Regional Counsel was created by the Legislature (Sec. 27.511) in 2007 to provide legal representation to indigent persons and to control rising costs from the private court appointed registry attorneys. Regional Counsel's main 3 classes of cases are criminal conflict cases that the court grants the Public Defender's motion to withdraw and appoints the Regional Counsel, Dependency and civil cases, and certain statutorily authorized civil commitment proceedings. Regional Counsel also handles appeals and post-conviction motions. The five Regional Counsels are: Candice Brower, Ita Neymotin, Eugene Zenobi, Jeffrey Deen, and Antony Ryan.

Regional Counsel provides legal representation with substantial cost savings. It has been estimated that to date, the **Regional Counsels have saved the State of Florida close to \$306 million** over private registry counsel.

<u>2017-2018 LEGISLATIVE</u> PRIORITIES

- 1: Salary increases for the five Regional Counsels
- 2: Graham Miller cases and work load
- 3: Salary parity and rate
- 4: 5% increase in pay for employees



More than half of our cases are in Dependency Court. Another way to save taxpayer dollars is safe and quicker reunification of families in dependency cases. Our opposing counsel is Department of Children and Families. Their attorneys are limited to a caseload of 80 children, whereas Regional Counsel attorneys represent over 100 parents each and have no maximum caseloads. Regional Counsel represents the parents and helps to reunite the family.

Due to the recent Supreme Court decisions of Miller, Graham, and Horsley, we are required to investigate, prepare, and litigate juvenile resentencing cases to the same degree of professionalism and competence expected of death penalty phase investigation. Records such as birth certificates, report cards, any intellectual assessments, and Department of Corrections' records become relevant for establishing mitigation during resentencing. The procurement and organization of those records may require hundreds of hours of work per client, as well as additional due process dollars. As a result, Regional Counsels will need additional due process dollars as well as additional attorneys.

Increased Case Loads + Less Funding = Double the cost to Taxpayers

We need salary parity with other state agencies. Due to the fact that **death penalty attorneys can** make 40% more working for other public agencies, we are losing those attorneys. We invest time and resources into every attorney that we train, and lose those resources when the attorney departs to another state agency, requiring the investment of more time and resources in training a new attorney. If we are unable to staff Regional Counsel with the proper number of attorneys and thus are unable to handle the cases, they will spill over into the private registry, which ends up costing the taxpayers much more money.



Compared to CBC Case Manager



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ADJUSTMENTS FOR CRITICAL CLASSES




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Turnover of Critical Classes FY 12-13 through 15-16

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CAPITAL COLLATERAL REGIONAL COUNSELS 2017-2018 LEGISLATIVE BUDGET REQUEST

Florida Statute 27.702 requires the Capital Collateral Regional Counsels (CCRC's) to represent each inmate sentenced to death in the state and federal courts, including the United States Supreme Court, until relief is granted or the sentence of execution is carried out. Cases are assigned by the Florida Supreme Court after direct appeal and are based on the federal court districts.

There are three CCRC offices: North, Middle, and South. The CCRC-North office was recreated by the Legislature in 2013 in the Timely Justice Act. In 2014, the Florida Supreme Court implemented numerous changes to the post-conviction death penalty rules, including a substantial increase in the minimum standards for legal counsel in death penalty cases. All CCRC attorneys must have expertise in the highly complex area of Federal Habeas Corpus, as well as extensive experience in capital cases.

CCRC budget requests for the 2017-2018 fiscal year are:

- \$ 9,600 for attorney training
- \$ 4,800 for investigator training

- \$127,557 competitive pay adjustment to recruit and retain legal staff
- \$25,500 for attorney training
- \$ 9,000 for investigator training

- \$62,094 for IT replacement
- \$10,400 for enhanced OPS

CCRC-SOUTH

- \$81,535 competitive pay adjustment to recruit and retain legal staff
- \$21,600 for attorney training
- \$ 9,600 for investigator training
- \$ 8,200 to replace outdated books for the law library
- \$17,500 for IT infrastructure replacement

Justice Administrative Commission

Created in 1965, the Justice Administrative Commission (JAC) administratively serves 49 judicial related entities, as well as provides compliance and financial review of billings for services provided by private court-appointed attorneys representing indigent citizens and associated due process vendors.

In the most recently completed fiscal year, JAC processed approximately 285,217 accounting transactions, 66,366 court-appointed attorney and due process vendor invoices, 68,164 payroll and human resources related transactions, 11,367 budgetary transactions, and 460 public records requests; attended 1,150 hearings for state payment; and responded to over 13,000 legal motions for payment of costs by the state.

The Justice Administrative Commission accomplishes all this, and more, with 86 staff and a budget of \$6,282,992 through its partnership with the Legislature, systemic cross-training its staff, and constantly developing and updating our processes for increased efficiency, accountability, and customer convenience.
