








Percent of Current Support Paid in the Month it is Due

WAGE WITHHOLDING

Payroll deduction is the Child Support Program's most effective collection tool. When the Program issues a wage withholding notice, the employer makes timely and consistent payments on behalf of the employee. More than half of all child support collections come from wage withholding.



SUSPENSION ACTIONS

Before suspending a license or other important government document, the parent receives notice. If the parent does not pay, reach an agreement with us or contest the action, the Program may suspend:

- Driver licenses
- Passports
- Professional licenses
- Vessel or vehicle registrations
- Hunting or fishing licenses



The Child Support Program can collect past-due support from financial institutions.

Financial institution records are matched to parents who owe child support.

When there is a match, the Program notifies the parent of the possible levy.

ACHIEVING VOLUNTARY COMPLIANCE

Once a child support order is established, we work with families and partners to help children receive the support they need and deserve.

Our partners are not only parents; we work with: employers, financial institutions, the IRS, other state and local agencies and the judiciary all with a goal of reaching voluntary compliance.

The Child Support Program has a variety of tools available to assist in this effort. State and federal laws apply to how and when certain tools can be used. We also partner with other state child support agencies when one parent lives in another state.

REPORTS TO CONSUMER AGENCIES



Like other creditors, the Child Support Program can report past-due amounts to credit agencies.

COURT ACTION

The Child Support Program can refer cases to court for judicial intervention. Outcomes vary depending on each case, but can include:

- Full or partial payment of past-due support
- Contempt of court



LIENS

The Child Support Program can file liens to collect past-due support on:

- Vehicles
- Boats
- Personal watercrafts
- Mobile homes
- Real estate



INTERCEPTS

The Child Support Program can intercept money from:

- Insurance settlements
- IRS tax refunds
- Liquidated unclaimed property
- Lottery winnings
- Reemployment assistance
- Workers' compensation benefits

ADMINISTRATIVE



The Child Support Program can establish paternity and child support obligations

administratively. Orders established through this process have the same force and effect as a court order.

An administrative action begins by serving a notice of the administrative proceeding and asking parents for financial and other information needed to determine the child support obligation. Based on the information provided by the parents and the Florida Child Support Guidelines, we calculate the amount of child support to be ordered and mail both parents a proposed order.

Parents can agree to the proposed order; provide additional information; meet with us or request a hearing.

A final support order that includes an income deduction order is issued and filed with the Clerk of Court and provided to the parents. The order provides the parents with instructions on how to pay their child support.

Paternity needs to be established for children born out of wedlock before support can be ordered. Establishing paternity identifies a child's legal father.

Florida allows parents to establish paternity voluntarily at the hospital when the child is born or any time after leaving the hospital by signing a voluntary acknowledgment of paternity.

We help parents establish paternity using both judicial and administrative processes described here. We also help parents determine the legal father with genetic tests. The genetic test collection is handled in our offices and a certified lab completes the tests and issues a report.

The final step in establishing paternity is updating the child's birth certificate with the father's name at the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

ESTABLISHING A CHILD SUPPORT ORDER

The first step in a child support case is establishing the initial child support order. We work with families and partners to help children receive the support they need and deserve.

A child support order sets the amount of support parents are required to provide and can also establish paternity and medical support obligations. Support orders can also be modified as the circumstances of the family change.

The Child Support Program has two ways to establish and modify support orders, judicially and administratively. We also partner with other state child support agencies when one parent lives in another state.

ORDER MODIFICATION

As the circumstances of a family change, the child support order may

> need to be changed to reflect the current needs of the parents and child. Parents can ask us to review their support order or they can seek to modify the order themselves. The Child Support Program collects information on the change of circumstances and financial information from the parents to determine if the Program should attempt to modify

the order. Administrative orders can be modified using the administrative process described above. Administrative and judicial orders can be modified using the judicial process described below.

JUDICIAL



A judicial support order is a child support order issued by the court.

The Child Support Program partners with public and private attorneys and the Clerks of Court to judicially establish support orders.

A judicial action begins with our attorney filing a petition in circuit court and having it served on the parent who owes support. Information is provided by the parents and used to calculate the amount of child support to be ordered under the Florida Child Support Guidelines.

A hearing is held and the court issues a support order that includes an income deduction order. The order provides the parents with instructions on how to pay their child support.


