Thank you for providing this opportunity to address the committee on a subject of significant interest to the hundreds of minority owned businesses and job seekers I serve throughout the state of Florida.

About two years ago, I joined with a group of Black business leaders from around the state to explore the potential economic impact that new casino development might offer to minority communities. My quest to find proven pathways to real economic benefits to minority businesses and job seekers led me to review numerous articles, studies projecting economic impact before new casinos are built, and studies measuring results of economic impact years after new casinos had been operating. Today, I will highlight three consistent themes of these studies that give us high hopes that new casino development in Broward County could be of great value to minority businesses and job seekers.

First, there is an evident trend towards emphasizing economic diversity, specifically how casino development benefits economically underserved communities, in the conversations of economic impact when it comes to expanding gaming in states. Within the past 10 years, the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, the Louisiana Gaming Control Board, the Missouri Gaming Commission, the New York State Gaming Commission, and a host of others have not only adopted policies that require diversity plans for casino developers & operators, but the more assertive ones like the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board actually produce annual report cards documenting the real economic impact that casinos are having to diverse communities — and the results are impressive. Adopting and enforcing diversity plans in expanded gaming policies is a proven best practice towards setting the stage for economic benefits to diverse communities like Broward County, and it is imperative that Florida authorities continue the trend.

Secondly, local economic benefits are real when regulators and casino developers/operators emphasize benefits to the local community. There should be mechanisms to ensure that local labor is equipped with the skills necessary to fill the new jobs that include higher wage positions with the traditionally lower paying jobs. This may entail training subsidies for local workers or the creation of targeted educational programs in hospitality management, slot machine maintenance/repair, and various upper management positions. Fortunately, Broward County boasts a very robust network of workforce development resources that can partner with casino developers/operators to achieve the goal of enhancing the skills inventory of local workers to access casino based employment specifically.

In addition to ensuring a substantial participation in the planning and construction phases, casino developers/operators must commit to the utilization of local vendors, suppliers, food vendors, restaurants, and other core service providers in order to have a net positive impact on local businesses instead of cannibalizing them.

Finally, any attempts to expand gaming in the state should favor casino developers/operators with a proven track record of delivering local economic impact and minority participation. Those operators that have been asked to ensure that local businesses and job seekers benefits have historically delivered — and in many cases exceeded minimum participation thresholds. In Broward, we are fortunate that one of the interested operators, Sunrise Sports and Entertainment (SSE), the current operators of the home of the Florida Panthers in the Sawgrass Mills area, has a proven track record for emphasizing supplier diversity and maintaining productive collaborations with networks of local groups to ensure local businesses and job seekers are included in the work they do.

This may seem like a shameless plug for SSE, and yes while it is a plug, I have no shame in making it. The fact of the matter is we have already seen casinos developers and operators across the nation that even when they have demonstrated impressive minority and local participation on one project in a specific community, has also yielded poor minority and local participation in others. When asked to explain the difference, the answer was simply "because the community that got more required more". Therefore, I'm okay with highlighting the fact that SSE have already committed to the delivery of local economic impact, including substantial opportunities to local and minority businesses and job seekers, and my hope is that anyone else seeking to compete for the opportunity to develop new casinos in Florida will follow their lead.

Our network of minority, women and veteran architects & engineers, construction contractors, and our non-construction business partners are assertively seeking opportunities to enhance our ability to create jobs, support schools and unlock the growth potential of our local economy. We believe new casino development would offer tremendous economic benefits to our local community. We look forward to doing our part to help make the promise of positive local economic impact a reality.



SENATE GAMING COMMITTEE WORKSHOP October 23, 2013

I am neutral regarding offering gambling to the citizens of Florida.

I have over 43 years of abstinence and recovery from gambling. My last wager was on July 15, 1970.

Florida is dependant on revenue from gaming and it appears that additional gambling in our State will result in more revenue to offset growing expenses.

For most of our population gambling is part of recreation and is not a problem, for some of our citizens the fun will be replaced by devastation.

We can label persons that are controlled by gambling as Compulsive Gamblers, Problem Gamblers or Disordered Gamblers; all 3 labels would fit me fine.

The unchecked problem of those addicted causes havoc, not only to the gambler but also to the direct family, employers, co-workers, friends and the authorities. How many people does each problem gambler negatively affect? Could it be 30, 40, 50 or more? What is the economic loss? Many incarcerated for forgery, money laundering, embezzlement and armed robbery are really in prison for a gambling problem.

What should we do to help?

The State of Florida needs to have the infrastructure to educate the public, refer the problem gamblers for

inpatient and outpatient help, train associates in the gaming industry as to how to interact with a problem gambler and react to the devastation caused by the problem gambler.

Florida should initiate a Gaming Commission that will have oversight of the Gaming Industry, implementation of funds disbursement for above segments and possible licensing approval.

The funding would be derived from a very small fraction of 1% of annual gross gaming revenue from the Gaming Industry.

We must take responsibility.

We cannot bury our heads as other industries have done in the past and in the present.

There is a huge hippopotamus in the room; what shall we do?

Dear Chair Richter and Chair Schenck:

We urge you to pass legislation next session to improve the lives of racing greyhounds.

Specifically, we ask that you approve greyhound decoupling. Currently, greyhound racetracks are required to lose money on live races in order to make a profit on other forms of wagering. This mandate makes no sense, and goes against free market values. Further, the passage of a decoupling bill will help greyhounds. Unless the legislature acts, thousands of dogs will continue to endure lives of confinement at Florida tracks, and suffer serious injuries, for an activity that generates little interest.

We also ask that you adopt a requirement for greyhound injury reporting. Florida is now one of only two states, joining Alabama, in which there are operational dog tracks that do not report injuries to the public. When this law has been enacted in other states, it has led to a significant decrease in the number of greyhounds euthanized due to injury.

Dogs play an important role in our lives and deserve to be protected. That is a mainstream value shared by citizens across the state. In a 2012 survey commissioned by the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, 73% of Florida voters indicated they are troubled by the fact that racing greyhounds are kept in cages for long hours each day. Similarly, 71% indicated they are concerned about the serious injuries greyhounds suffer. Meanwhile, only 32% of Floridians viewed dog racing as an important industry to the state.

Florida has a proud history when it comes to the humane treatment of animals. Passing these two greyhound protection measures will continue that tradition.

My name is Helene Jones and I am here today to represent David Wolf, Director of National Greyhound Adoption Program. They have adopted almost 8000 of Florida's greyhounds, one a day for over 20 years. None of you may recall his name, but back in the 90's he spent considerable time in Tallahassee lobbying for better care for racing greyhounds. He lobbied for the legislation that specifically spelled out that racing greyhounds in the state of Florida could only be euthanized by lethal injection, administered by a vet, nor could greyhounds be taken from the state of Florida for the purpose of euthanasia, as was the case of Robert Rhodes a few years back. Robert Rhodes was never prosecuted because he died before his trial, but the kennel operators that took the dogs out of state to be euthanized were never prosecuted.

Then there were those greyhound exported to Alabama on what became known as 'Kill Mondays'. This was featured in a piece by HBO Real Sports with Bryant Gumbel. It showed trucks from Florida lined up outside of a vet clinic in Alabama on Monday mornings. The dogs would be walk in, one after the other, euthanized, and then thrown into a dumpster.

Just down the road from JCKC there was a vet clinic with a five acre plot. They would dig a trench the length of the plot and as they euthanized greyhounds, they would throw the bodies in and cover it with soil. When the trench was full, they would dig another trench. When the five acre field was full, they simply ran the backhoe perpendicular exhuming the bones of the previously buried greyhounds. We have photographed that field. The then-Director of Pari-mutuel Wagering asked me if I had a problem with greyhounds being euthanized and the way they were being euthanized. I told him that I had a problem with how many were being euthanized.

Hopefully JCKC, which is now closed, will stay that way. No one there cared at all about the dogs. The smell from their greyhound compound was overwhelming and could be smelled from quite a distance away. Now there is no kill truck coming on a weekly basis.

Florida has failed greyhounds in the most basic sense. After Hurricane Andrew and the sunsetting of pari-mutuel regulations, the Florida legislature specifically said that it is 'the intent that greyhounds born and raced in Florida be humanely treated throughout their lives'. That was way back in the 90's. History has proven this not to be the case. Florida now has the opportunity to give greyhounds an overwhelming gift. Don't make them race. Let the track owners determine if they want greyhound racing, which we all know loses money, the very reason greyhounds are supposed to be racing, to make money. They don't. Now is the time to let the greyhounds that are being injured every day, fade into the sunset. After all of these years, we owe them that. There are veterinarians in this state, single veterinarians, that would euthanize over 500 greyhounds in a year. By decoupling, that practice will surely end.

If there are not enough greyhounds to be adopted because there are just too many adoption agencies, and if every greyhound retired from racing would find a home, that would be wonderful. But you need to decouple and make them scarce for that to happen. Of course, having the ability to track them and know what becomes of them is the one way that we can be partially assured that they are not being destroyed willy-nilly.

Time moves on, things change. Greyhound racing needs to change and become much smaller and much better. This state can make that happen. I have written many times in newsletters and other publications something called 'The Gift of Life, The Gift of Death'. Greyhound adopters give their new pets the 'gift of life', which they would not have had, and sometimes they also need to make that ever-difficult decision to let them go and them that final gift. You have the opportunity of giving them a very special gift. That is the gift of not putting them at risk at all. It is wonderful to see a greyhound run when they are running for fun. It is a joy knowing they will not come up injured and they will stop and take a nice nap on a soft bed.

Good afternoon Chairman Richter and Committee members.

- My name is JAN HANSEN and I am the Vice president for Regulatory Affairs at GULFSTREAM PARK, a Destination Entertainment Center that is a major contributor to Florida's economic base with 3 major Components: 2 major thoroughbred racing and training facilities, a Casino, Retail Restaurant, and Entertainment development, all developed over the last 10 years by the Stroanch Group, who also own many of America's premier racing facilities from Santa Anita to Pimlico.
- These GULFSTREAM facilities alone comprise a total investment of more than a billion dollars and as the Spectrum Study confirms, they are a major generator of annual millions in tax revenues to all levels of government.
- While we concur with some of the Spectrum report's fiscal impact findings, we believe that the models significantly understate the synergy effects of this total investment. For example, the economic impetus of the racing and casino re-development project was critical to the investment calculus of the projected \$665 m. construction cost of our mixed use facility alone, -the Village at Gulfstream Park. Far from investing in an industry that is alleged in the Spectrum Report to be diminishing, we are demonstrating just the opposite.

- Similarly, the Model's estimated estimated tax revenue projections do not fully account for the total fiscal impact of a mixed use development model that integrates Racing, Casino, Retail, Residential and entertainment components.


