






Income by level of education


Unemployment by level of education



Percent of layoffs that are permanent



Stuck in the Middle


The recession has accelerated a longer-term decline in middle-skilled, middle-wage jobs.

Cumulative change in employment since 2000, by skill level





2.07 million working-age adults in FL have attended college but don't have a degree.


Public Opinion Trend On College & Opportunity


Projected Changes in FL Adult Population by Race/Ethnicity

Projected Changes in Florida Population by Race/Ethnicity – 2005 to 2025





Comparative Growth of White and Minority PK-12 Populations




