THINK PINK

October is nationally recognized as Breast Cancer Awareness month. It is estimated that in the United States, 1 in 8 women and 1 in 883 men will develop invasive breast cancer over their lifetime. Unfortunately, Florida has the second-highest cancer burden in the nation and, since 2011, cancer is the leading cause of death for Floridians, surpassing heart disease. Sadly, young women generally face more aggressive cancers and lower survival rates. I have filed SB 276, which would include breast and prostate cancer education in the high school health curriculum. Ensuring that our youth learn the characteristics, measures of prevention, and symptoms to watch for will ultimately result in better preparing them.

The Florida Department of Health states that mammography is the most effective method of early breast cancer detection, as it can identify cancer several years before physical symptoms develop. According to the American Cancer Society, getting regular screening tests is the most reliable way to find breast cancer early. They also provide screening guidelines for women at average or high risk of breast cancer. They are ultimately suggesting that women should know their breasts and report changes of size, symmetry, or skin appearance to their doctor. The Florida Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program assist Floridians with cancer screenings recommended by doctors. Should you meet the eligibility requirements, the screenings can be either free or low cost. CAN BREAST CANCER BE FOUND EARLY?

Yes, it is imperative to have regular Breast Cancer screenings as it can potentially be caught in the early stages.

CAN IMAGING TESTS FIND BREAST CANCER?

Different tests can be used to look for and diagnose breast cancer. These include Mammograms Breast Ultrasound, Breast MRI Scans, and Experimental Breast Imaging Tests

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS

The Department of Children and Families oversees the Domestic Violence Program. This Program is tasked with the prevention and intervention of domestic violence. Among the Program's primary responsibilities are the administration and oversight of federal and state funding designated to assist Florida's certified domestic violence centers, the leading providers of domestic violence services. It works closely with the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence and has 42 certified domestic violence centers. These centers provide free crisis intervention and support services to victims. Additionally, they offer emergency shelter, 24-hour crisis and information hotline, safety planning, counseling, case management, child assessments, daycare, transportation, relocation assistance, rape crisis intervention, and prevention programs in local schools.
