SEED Miami plans to use the funds to support its 24-hour education model that allows students to receive high-quality education with wraparound support services, including mental health counseling and cultural enrichment opportunities.

d. What are the direct services to be provided to citizens by the appropriations project?

Full appropriation of the amount requested for FY19 will allow SEED Miami to serve 300 students in grades 6-10. SEED Miami serves low-income underserved students who need 24-hour support and a stable learning environment to succeed. SEED Miami provides a rigorous academic program in addition to student life programming which enhances the social and academic skills of SEED Miami students.

e. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

SEED Miami students meet eligibility criteria defined by Florida statute such as: (1) family gross income at or below 200% federal povery line; (2) have an incarcerated family member; (3) live in public housing; (4) under the supervision of the child welfare system (1/3 of the open seats are reserved for these students). SEED Miami is expected to serve 300 students in grades 6-10 for school year 2018-19. If more students apply than the school can accommodate, admissions will be conducted via lottery. Students who are not selected for admission during the lottery will have the option of being included on a waiting list and may be selected should space become available.

f. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

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Academic growth demonstrated by SEED Miami's students is an example of some of the expected benefits of this project. SEED Miami has adopted several practices to aid student development, including adopting the ACT Aspire interim assessment series to measure periodic growth. This decision was made to ensure that there is alignment between our interim and summative assessments. Additionally, SEED Miami utilizes the Fountas & Pinnell Leveled Reading Benchmark Assessments three times during the school year to measure ongoing reading development. SEED Miami provides quarterly and annual reports on its performance data to FL DOE Office of Independent Education and Parental Choice.

- g. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

 The Officeof Independent Education and Parental Choice (OIEPC) at FL DOE is formally assigned to monitor and evaluate the execution of the State Board of Education contract with SEED Miami. OIEPC conducts annual site visits to the SEED Miami campus for the purpose of verifying, among other things, evidence of lesson plans, personnel data, student records and academic and residential facilities. The suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider include termination of the operating contract for failure to maintain adequate progress, thus endangering performance of the contract.
