14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

We are in the midst of a national children's mental health challenge. Our primary goal is to intervene with children who are at risk of long-term negative outcomes as a result of their exposure to Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs). Research has documented that time spent in nature, exercise, play, artistic expression, time with mentors, and time with people with similar experiences are all therapeutic for people experiencing PTSD, anxiety, and depression. We intend to use the setting and activities of Camp to reduce these children's symptoms and create space for healing.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

As an American Camping Association and SeriousFun Children's Network certified camp, Camp Boggy Creek is based in traditional camping activities. Those include swimming, archery, theater, music, nature, archery, boating, fishing, miniature golf, sports, and arts and crafts on our 232 acre property. This program will include cabin talks and intentional times for campers to connect around the adversity they've been through, and learning how adversity can become strength and resilience.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Campers and their families will be given technical support in the application process, transportation assistance as needed to travel from any location in Florida to our Eustis camp, and either 5-day, overnight Summer sessions for individual campers or 3-day overnight Family Retreat Weekend sessions for the camper and their household (as appropriate to their circumstances and diagnosis). We will also help families identify ongoing mental health services in their home communities to continue the work they begin at Camp.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

We will be serving children ages 7 to 17 with a primary focus on low-income households. The children will either need to have a formal diagnosis of PTSD, depression, or anxiety or be in a circumstance that we would identify as indicative of a primary cause of those conditions so we may intervene before more formal care is needed. These children must be Florida residents. We expect to serve at least 100 children as well as parents, siblings, and other household members, especially for those invited to Family Retreat Weekends.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Expected outcomes:

- >80% of campers will display an increased willingness to try new things, self-identification skills, self-confidence, perseverance, and increased ability to form friendships
- >70% of campers will feel a greater quality of life, have a stronger sense of responsibility, understand emotional self-advocacy, and have an increased understanding related to emotional self-care
- >66% of campers will have increased awareness of emotional regulation and self-regulation techniques, as well as medical, emotional, and physiological independence/resilience
- We will measure these outcomes using pre and post surveys designed and administered by a mental health professional.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Failing to meet our objectives would jeopardize any future funding first and foremost. If we serve fewer children than expected, we would return those camperships to the state at the rate of \$2,500 per camper.
