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14. Program Performance

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a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The purpose of the funds are to invest in our community by mitigating or eliminating barriers to healthy eating and moving families from a place of needing assistance to a place of economic self-sufficiency.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Feeding South Florida will work to stabilize a family unit or household helping to build a solid foundation of support that includes distribution of healthy food and meals, assisting families with benefits, enrolling families and individuals in Feeding South Florida's workforce training programs to help families achieve economic self-sufficiency.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Feeding South Florida will provide direct distribution of food and other grocery items; application assistance to citizens who may be potentially eligible for benefits; as well as hands-on workforce development and soft skill training for all individuals interested in making themselves more marketable in the workforce and gaining employment with a living wage.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Feeding South Florida will focus its efforts on families who are low income and have a combined household income of less than 185% of the federal poverty line. The goal is to ensure government assistance is temporary and families work on becoming self-sufficient. The project estimates that 10,000 families will be served.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected benefit is more families and individuals will become economically self-sufficient. This will help students increase performance, behavior and attendance at school, as well as help working adults be more productive and reduce sick time and accidents in the workplace.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Feeding South Florida will work on a reimbursement basis. Once benchmarks or outcomes are met at regular intervals, Feeding South Florida will submit an invoice to the State for payment. If targets are not met, Feeding South Florida does not receive the funding.
