1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to veterans; requiring school districts to 3 observe Veterans' Day and Veterans' Awareness Week; 4 providing requirements for such recognition; directing the 5 Department of Children and Family Services to establish up 6 to three pilot projects for the purpose of reducing 7 suicide among veterans and increasing access to services; 8 providing duties of the department; providing requirements 9 for the pilot project programs; requiring the Statewide 10 Office of Suicide Prevention, the Department of Veterans' Affairs, and the Florida National Guard to enter into 11 partnerships with the pilot projects and community 12 13 providers to implement the initiative; requiring an 14 evaluation and a report to the Governor and Legislature; 15 providing for expiration of the pilot projects; 16 establishing a veterans' suicide prevention direct-support 17 organization answerable to the Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention to assist with funding veterans' 18 19 suicide prevention initiatives; providing corporate 20 requirements; providing for a board of directors; 21 providing for a contract with the office and requirements 22 for the contract; authorizing the direct-support 23 organization to use the property, facilities, and 24 personnel services of the office; requiring the moneys of 25 the direct-support organization to be deposited in a 26 separate account in the name of the organization; 27 providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Veterans' Awareness Week.--

- (1) Each school district shall observe November 11 of each year as the Veterans' Day holiday and shall observe that week as Veterans' Awareness Week. In any year in which November 11 falls on a Saturday or Sunday, Veterans' Awareness Week shall be observed the week immediately preceding or following November 11, to coincide with the date on which Veterans' Day is observed as a federal holiday.
- (2) During Veterans' Awareness Week, each school district shall provide programs that instruct students on the role of veterans in the history of our state and country and shall recognize the contributions made by veterans to our state and country. Programs, instruction, ceremonies, or any other events conducted as part of Veterans' Awareness Week are to be organized and presented at the discretion of each individual school district.

Section 2. Veterans' suicide prevention pilot projects.--

(1) PURPOSE.--The Department of Children and Family
Services, subject to the availability of public or private
funding, shall establish up to three pilot projects in the three
areas of the state which have the largest concentration of
veteran residents. The purpose of the projects is to reduce the
incidence of suicide among veterans by increasing access to
services and support for veterans and their families who may be
in need of mental health services and who are not currently
being served by the United States Department of Veterans

57 Affairs.

(2) DEPARTMENT DUTIES. -- The department shall work with the Florida Certification Board to develop a new veteran-peer-specialist credential and develop a statewide certification process for certifying veteran peer specialists through the Florida Certification Board in order to create a cadre of certified specialists to assist in providing peer support for veterans through the pilot projects.

- (3) PILOT PROJECTS. -- Each pilot project must:
- (a) Develop a veteran-to-veteran peer support program that reaches out to veterans on a continual basis by mail, e-mail, telephone, or face-to-face contact in order to:
- 1. Reduce isolation and the risk of suicide through regular and ongoing, long-term contact;
- 2. Conduct informal assessments to determine if a referral is needed; and
 - 3. Assist in connecting veterans to local resources.
- (b) Conduct a needs assessment of local substance abuse and mental health providers in the pilot project area to determine if local providers are trained and able to meet the specific needs of veterans and the increase in demand for services.
- (c) Establish a veterans information program at each pilot project site to serve as a resource for student veterans and college and university personnel serving student veterans. The program must provide prevention education, as well as early intervention and counseling, and assist student veterans who have personal problems. The key components of the program

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<u>include:</u>

- 1. A faculty-training component under which project personnel work with a faculty coordinator from each of the colleges and universities in the pilot project area to provide training on the symptoms and warning signs of suicide to faculty members. The training must focus on the special circumstances that are unique to this population, such as posttraumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injuries, and issues specific to female veterans.
- 2. A component that disseminates information and provides education for student veterans. The program must hold regular education workshops for student veterans related to veterans issues and stress factors that are experienced in an academic setting. Printed literature that is specific to veterans shall be disseminated regularly.
- 3. An outreach component under which program personnel shall undertake outreach activities and engage and educate student veterans, their families, and the community in order to increase information on and access to services for veterans who are at risk of suicide. Outreach activities include linkage with service resources, dissemination of information, and education to:
- a. Increase public awareness about the unique needs of veterans and the risks of suicide and warning signs of suicide in veterans, without creating additional stigma.
- <u>b. Coordinate and train professionals who provide services</u> for at-risk veterans.
 - c. Identify available services and specialized assistance

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for veterans and family members.

- d. Provide education on veterans' issues and trauma.
- e. Mobilize a recovery-oriented system of care within the community for at-risk veterans.
- 4. A component for responding to critical incidents, such as traumatic death or medical crisis, campus violence, or other incidents that may have a significant emotional impact on student veterans. This includes providing trained debriefing counselors, as well as group counseling for affected student veterans and consultation services related to crisis management and veterans.
- (d) Work with community emergency response resources to more effectively address crises involving veterans and their families. This includes linking emergency responders to veterans' resources and persons trained in veterans' issues.

 Regular pilot staff shall be trained in dealing with emergency referrals, including training in being able to differentiate between the need for face-to-face intervention or phone intervention. All staff shall be made aware of the necessity for immediate documentation of all contacts inclusive of intentional self-injurious behavior, statements of threat, written forms of threat, extreme withdrawal, significant loss of appetite or weight, and crisis warning signs unique to veterans. All referrals in the areas served by the pilot projects must be followed up with telephone contact and field-based intervention services, if agreed to by the veteran or family member.
- (e) Offer postdeployment reintegration sessions for veterans who were deployed in Operation Iraqi Freedom or

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Operation Enduring Freedom through community providers at 4, 6, and 10 months after returning home to complement the reintegration efforts overseen by the United States Department of Defense. Because symptoms of stress and warning signs are often delayed, continual contact over time is important. The timing protocol for reintegration sessions may vary for each pilot project in order to evaluate the effectiveness of different models.

- (4) OTHER AGENCIES.--The Statewide Office of Suicide

 Prevention, the Department of Veterans' Affairs, and the Florida

 National Guard shall enter into partnerships with the pilot

 projects and community providers in order to implement this

 initiative.
- (5) EVALUATION.--The department, together with input from each of the pilot projects, shall design an evaluation methodology for measuring the efficacy of the pilot projects.

 The evaluation shall be presented to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by March 1, 2012. The evaluation must consider whether the pilot projects have:
- (a) Improved veteran access to community linkages and resources, including primary care, behavioral health care providers, and veterans' services, in order to provide needed services and to help veterans be self-sufficient members of the community.
- (b) Educated, increased awareness of, and mobilized the community about suicide as a public health problem, especially as it relates to veterans.

(c) Reduced the danger and incidence of suicide and self-harm among veterans.

(d) Increased the likelihood of long-term community commitment to providing support to veterans.

(6) EXPIRATION.--The pilot projects shall expire July 1, 2012.

Section 3. Veterans' suicide prevention direct-support organization.—The Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention may establish a direct-support organization to assist with securing funding for veterans' suicide prevention and other suicide prevention initiatives, including any pilot projects established by the Department of Children and Family Services to reduce the incidence of suicide among veterans.

- (1) The direct-support organization must be:
- (a) A not-for-profit Florida corporation, incorporated under chapter 617, Florida Statutes, and approved by the Secretary of State.
- (b) Organized and operated exclusively to solicit funds; request and receive grants, gifts, and bequests of money; acquire, receive, hold, invest, and administer property and funds in its own name; and make expenditures for the benefit of the purposes specified in this section.
- (c) Certified by the office, after review, to be operating in a manner consistent with the goals of this section and in the best interests of the state. Such certification must be made annually and reported to the Office of Drug Control.
- (2) The direct-support organization shall be governed by a seven-member board of directors. The members of the board shall

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be appointed by the office, shall serve at the pleasure of the office, and be appointed to terms that may not exceed 4 years.

- (3) The direct-support organization shall operate under written contract with the office. The contract must provide for:
- (a) Approval of the articles of incorporation and bylaws of the direct-support organization by the office.
- (b) The fiscal year of the direct-support organization to begin July 1 of each year and end June 30 of the following year.
- (c) Submission of an annual budget for the approval of the office.
- (d) Any procedures or conditions with which the directsupport organization must comply to use property, facilities, or
 personnel services of the office and to meet the administrative
 requirements of the office.
- (e) The disclosure of the material provisions of the contract and the distinction between the Office for Suicide Prevention and the direct-support organization to donors of gifts, contributions, or bequests and on all promotional and fundraising publications.
- (f) The reversion to the office or the state of moneys and property held in trust by the direct-support organization if the direct-support organization is no longer approved to operate or ceases to exist.
- (4) The office may authorize the use of its facilities and property, other than money, to the direct-support organization as well as personnel services. The term "personnel services" includes full-time personnel and part-time personnel as well as payroll processing.

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(5) Moneys of the direct-support organization shall be
held in a separate depository account in the name of the direct-
support organization and subject to the provisions of the
contract with the office. Such moneys may include membership
fees, private donations, income derived from fundraising
activities, and grants applied for and received by the direct-
support organization.

- (6) The direct-support organization is subject to an annual financial audit in accordance with s. 215.981, Florida Statutes.
 - Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2009.
