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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to high school diploma options; requiring the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability, in conjunction with the Department of Education, to conduct a study on the creation of a high school graduation option that focuses on career-technical education and workforce development and leads to a career-technical education diploma; providing requirements for the study with recommendations to the Legislature; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. (1) The Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability, in conjunction with the Department of Education, shall conduct a study on the creation of a 4-year high school graduation option that focuses on career-technical education and workforce development at the high school level.

The study shall include, but is not limited to:

(a) The feasibility of offering students the option of pursuing a career-technical education diploma, distinct from the standard high school diploma, which provides workforce readiness and requires at a minimum that a student earn at least one national industry certification identified in the Industry Certification Funding List pursuant to rules adopted by the State Board of Education.

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(b) The identification of course requirements for a career-technical education diploma and overlapping course requirements for a career-technical education diploma and the standard high school diploma, with a view to enabling a student to switch between diploma options.

- (c) The potential use of career and professional academies, internships, the Florida Ready to Work Certification Program, and other relevant career and technical education programs.
- (d) A timeframe for implementing a career-technical education graduation option and diploma if determined to be feasible.
- (2) The study shall build upon the information and findings reported in the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability Report No. 11-05.
- (3) The Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability shall submit the results of the study with recommendations to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by December 1, 2013.
 - Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
