The rules to establish uniform core curricula for each 67 (b) 68 state-approved teacher preparation program must include, but are 69 not limited to, the following: 70 The Florida Educator Accomplished Practices. 1. 71 2. The state-adopted student content standards. 72 3. Scientifically researched reading instruction. 73 4. Content literacy and mathematical practices. 74 5. Strategies appropriate for instruction of English 75 language learners. 76 6. Strategies appropriate for instruction of students with 77 disabilities. a State Board of Education identified foundation 78 in scientifically researched, knowledge-based reading literacy 79 and computational skills acquisition; classroom management; 80 school safety; professional ethics; educational law; human 81 development and learning; and understanding of the Sunshine 82 State Standards content measured by state achievement tests, 83 reading and interpretation of data, and use of data to improve 84 student achievement.

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85 Each candidate shall receive instruction and be (C) 86 assessed on the uniform core curriculum in his or her area of 87 program concentration during course work and field experiences. 88 Before program completion, each candidate must (d) 89 demonstrate his or her ability to positively impact student 90 learning growth in his or her area of program concentration during a prekindergarten through grade 12 field experience and 91 92 must pass each portion of the Florida Teacher Certification 93 Examination required for a professional certificate in the area 94 of program concentration. 95 (c) These rules shall not require an additional period of 96 time-to-degree but may be phased in to enable teacher 97 preparation programs to supplant courses, including pedagogy courses, not required by law or State Board of Education rule 98 99 with the courses identified pursuant to paragraph (b). (3) DEVELOPMENT OF TEACHER PREPARATION PROGRAMS. - A system 100 101 developed by the Department of Education in collaboration with 102 postsecondary educational institutions shall assist departments 103 and colleges of education in the restructuring of their programs 104 in accordance with this section to meet the need for producing 105 quality teachers now and in the future. 106 (a) The system must be designed to assist teacher 107 educators in conceptualizing, developing, implementing, and 108 evaluating programs that meet state-adopted standards. These 109 standards shall emphasize quality indicators drawn from 110 research, professional literature, recognized guidelines, 111 Florida essential teaching competencies and educator-112 accomplished practices, effective classroom practices, and the Page 4 of 31

115	(b) Departments and colleges of education shall emphasize
116	the state system of school improvement and education
117	accountability concepts and standards, including Sunshine State
118	Standards.
119	(c) State-approved teacher preparation programs must
120	incorporate:
121	1. Appropriate English for Speakers of Other Languages
122	instruction so that program graduates will have completed the
123	requirements for teaching limited English proficient students in
124	Florida public schools.
125	2. Scientifically researched, knowledge-based reading
126	literacy and computational skills instruction so that program
127	graduates will be able to provide the necessary academic
128	foundations for their students at whatever grade levels they
129	choose to teach.
130	(3)-(4) INITIAL STATE PROGRAM APPROVAL
131	(a) A program approval process based on standards adopted
132	pursuant to <u>this subsection and subsection</u> subsections (2) and
133	(3) must be established for postsecondary teacher preparation
134	programs, phased in according to timelines determined by the
135	Department of Education, and fully implemented for all teacher
136	preparation programs in the state. Each program shall be
137	approved by the department, consistent with the intent set forth
138	in subsection (1) and based primarily upon <u>evidence of the</u>
139	institution's and the program's capacity to meet the
140	requirements for continued approval established in subsection

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141 (4) and rules of the State Board of Education significant,
 142 objective, and quantifiable graduate performance measures.

(b) Each teacher preparation program approved by the
Department of Education, as provided for by this section, shall
require students to meet, at a minimum, the following as
prerequisites for admission into the program:

Have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 147 1. 148 scale for the general education component of undergraduate 149 studies or have completed the requirements for a baccalaureate 150 degree with a minimum grade point average of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale 151 from any college or university accredited by a regional 152 accrediting association as defined by State Board of Education 153 rule or any college or university otherwise approved pursuant to State Board of Education rule. 154

155 2. Demonstrate mastery of general knowledge sufficient for 156 entry into the program, including the ability to read, write, 157 and perform mathematics compute, by passing the General 158 Knowledge Test of the Florida Teacher Certification Examination 159 or, for graduate-level programs, by obtaining a baccalaureate 160 degree from an institution that is accredited or approved, the 161 College Level Academic Skills Test, a corresponding component of 162 the National Teachers Examination series, or a similar test 163 pursuant to rules of the State Board of Education.

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Each teacher preparation program may waive these admissions requirements for up to 10 percent of the students admitted. Programs shall implement strategies to ensure that students admitted under a waiver receive assistance to demonstrate

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169 competencies to successfully meet requirements for certification 170 and shall annually report to the department the status of each 171 candidate admitted under such a waiver.

172 Each teacher preparation program approved by the (C) 173 Department of Education, as provided for by this section, shall 174 provide a certification ombudsman to facilitate the process and 175 procedures required for graduates to obtain educator 176 professional or temporary certification pursuant to s. 1012.56.

177 (4) (5) CONTINUED PROGRAM APPROVAL.-Continued approval of a 178 teacher preparation program shall be based upon evidence that 179 the program continues to implement the requirements for initial 180 approval and upon significant, objective, and quantifiable 181 measures of program and program completer performance.

182 The criteria for continued approval shall include the (a) 183 following:

184 1. Documentation from the program that each program 185 candidate met the admission requirements provided in subsection 186 (3).

187 2. Documentation from the program that the program and 188 each program completer met the requirements provided in 189 subsection (2).

190 3. Evidence of performance in each of the following 191 categories of data:

192 a. Placement rate of program completers into instructional 193 positions in Florida public schools.

194 b. Rate of retention for employed program completers in 195 instructional positions in Florida public schools. 196

c. Performance of the prekindergarten through grade 12

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students assigned to in-field program completers on statewide

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assessments using the results of the student learning growth formula adopted under s. 1012.34. d. Performance of prekindergarten through grade 12 students assigned to in-field program completers aggregated by federal reporting subgroup as a measure of how well the program prepares teachers to work with a diverse population of students in a variety of settings in Florida public schools. Results of program completers' annual evaluations as e. determined by s. 1012.34. f. Production of program completers in statewide critical teacher shortage areas as identified under s. 1012.07. Notwithstanding subsection (4), failure by a public or nonpublic teacher preparation program to meet the criteria for continued program approval shall result in loss of program approval. The Department of Education, in collaboration with the departments and colleges of education, shall develop procedures for continued program approval that document the continuous improvement of program processes and graduates' performance. (a) Continued approval of specific teacher preparation programs at each public and nonpublic postsecondary educational institution within the state is contingent upon the passing of the written examination required by s. 1012.56 by at least 90 percent of the graduates of the program who take the examination. The Department of Education shall annually provide an analysis of the performance of the graduates of such institution with respect to the competencies assessed by the examination required by s. 1012.56.

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225	(b) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules for
226	continued approval of teacher preparation programs that include
227	the program review process, the continued approval timelines,
228	and the performance level targets for each of the continued
229	approval criteria in paragraph (a). Additional criteria for
230	continued program approval for public institutions may be
231	approved by the State Board of Education. Such criteria $\underline{\sf may}$
232	include must emphasize instruction in classroom management and
233	must provide for the evaluation of the teacher candidates'
234	performance in this area. The criteria shall also require
235	instruction in working with underachieving students. Program
236	evaluation procedures must include, but are not limited to,
237	program <u>completers'</u> graduates' satisfaction with instruction and
238	employers' satisfaction with the program's responsiveness to
239	local school districts. The Commissioner of Education shall make
240	the determination for the continued approval of each program
241	based on the data collected pursuant to this section and rules
242	of the State Board of Education. Additional criteria for
243	continued program approval for nonpublic institutions shall be
244	developed in the same manner as for public institutions;
245	however, such criteria must be based upon significant,
246	objective, and quantifiable graduate performance measures.
247	Responsibility for collecting data on outcome measures through
248	survey instruments and other appropriate means shall be shared
249	by the postsecondary educational institutions and the Department
250	of Education. By January 1 of each year, the Department of
251	Education shall report this information for each postsecondary
252	educational institution that has state-approved programs of
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253 teacher education to the Governor, the State Board of Education, 254 the Board of Governors, the Commissioner of Education, the 255 President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of 256 Representatives, all Florida postsecondary teacher preparation 257 programs, and interested members of the public. This report must 258 analyze the data and make recommendations for improving teacher 259 preparation programs in the state.

260 (C) Each program must prepare and submit to the department 261 Continued approval for a teacher preparation program is 262 contingent upon the results of periodic reviews, on a schedule 263 established by the State Board of Education, of the program 264 conducted by the postsecondary educational institution, using 265 procedures and criteria outlined in an institutional program 266 evaluation plan approved by the Department of Education. Each 267 institutional program evaluation This plan must incorporate data 268 related to the criteria established in paragraphs (a) and (b) 269 and may include additional data chosen by the program. The plan 270 must provide information on how the institution addresses continuous program improvement and include provisions for 271 272 involving primary stakeholders, such as program completers 273 graduates, public district school personnel, classroom teachers, 274 principals, community agencies, and business representatives in 275 the evaluation process. Upon request by an institution, the 276 department shall provide assistance in developing, enhancing, or 277 reviewing the institutional program evaluation plan and training 278 evaluation team members.

279 (d) Continued approval for a teacher preparation program
 280 is contingent upon standards being in place that are designed to

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281 adequately prepare elementary, middle, and high school teachers 282 to instruct their students in reading and higher-level 283 mathematics concepts and in the use of technology at the 284 appropriate grade level.

285 (d) (e) Continued approval of teacher preparation programs 286 is contingent upon compliance with the student admission 287 requirements of subsection (4) and upon the receipt of at least 288 a satisfactory rating from public schools and private schools 289 that employ graduates of the program. Each teacher preparation 290 program shall guarantee the high quality of its program 291 completers graduates during the first 2 years immediately after 292 completion of following graduation from the program or after 293 following initial certification, whichever occurs first. Any 294 program completer who is employed in a public school during this 295 2-year period and who earns an evaluation result of developing or unsatisfactory on the district's evaluation system 296 implemented under s. 1012.34 educator in a Florida school who 297 298 fails to demonstrate the essential skills specified in 299 subparagraphs 1.-5. shall be provided additional training by the 300 teacher preparation program at no expense to the educator or the 301 employer, if requested by the employing school district or 302 charter school. Such training must consist of an individualized 303 plan agreed upon by the school district and the postsecondary 304 educational institution that includes specific learning 305 outcomes. The postsecondary educational institution assumes no 306 responsibility for the educator's employment contract with the 307 employer. Employer satisfaction shall be determined by an 308 annually administered survey instrument approved by the

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309	Department of Education that, at a minimum, must include
310	employer satisfaction of the graduates' ability to do the
311	following:
312	1. Write and speak in a logical and understandable style
313	with appropriate grammar.
314	2. Recognize signs of students' difficulty with the
315	reading and computational process and apply appropriate measures
316	to improve students' reading and computational performance.
317	3. Use and integrate appropriate technology in teaching
318	and learning processes.
319	4. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of Sunshine
320	State Standards.
321	5. Maintain an orderly and disciplined classroom conducive
322	to student learning.
323	(e)(f)1. Each Florida public and private institution that
324	offers a state-approved teacher preparation program must
325	annually report information regarding <u>its approved</u> these
326	programs to the state and the general public. <u>The report to the</u>
327	state must include candidates who are admitted to, enrolled in,
328	and complete a teacher preparation program; additional evidence
329	necessary to document requirements for continued approval; and
330	data necessary to complete applicable federal reporting
331	requirements. State reporting requirements must minimize a
332	program's reporting burden whenever possible without
333	compromising data quality. The report to the general public must
334	include, at a minimum, the annual progress data reported under
335	paragraph (f) and may include other information chosen by the
336	institution or program. This information shall be reported in a

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337 uniform and comprehensible manner that is consistent with 338 definitions and methods approved by the Commissioner of the National Center for Educational Statistics and that is approved 339 by the State Board of Education. This information must include, 340 at a minimum: 341 342 a. The percent of graduates obtaining full-time teaching 343 employment within the first year of graduation. 344 b. The average length of stay of graduates in their full-345 time teaching positions. 346 c. Satisfaction ratings required in paragraph (e). 347 2. Each public and private institution offering training 348 for school readiness related professions, including training in 349 the fields of child care and early childhood education, whether 350 offering career credit, associate in applied science degree 351 programs, associate in science degree programs, or associate in 352 arts degree programs, shall annually report information 353 regarding these programs to the state and the general public in 354 a uniform and comprehensible manner that conforms with 355 definitions and methods approved by the State Board of 356 Education. This information must include, at a minimum: 357 -Average length of stay of graduates in their positions. a. 358 b. Satisfaction ratings of graduates' employers. 359 360 This information shall be reported through publications, 361 including college and university catalogs and promotional 362 materials sent to potential applicants, secondary school 363 quidance counselors, and prospective employers of the 364 institution's program graduates.

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365 (f) By January 1 of each year, the Department of Education 366 shall report to the Governor, the State Board of Education, the 367 Board of Governors, the Commissioner of Education, the President 368 of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, all 369 Florida postsecondary teacher preparation programs, district 370 school superintendents, and the public the results of each 371 approved program's annual progress on the performance measures 372 in paragraph (a) and the current approval status of each program. This report may include results of other continued 373 374 approval requirements provided in State Board of Education rules 375 and recommendations for improving teacher preparation programs 376 in the state.

377 <u>(5)(6)</u> PRESERVICE FIELD EXPERIENCE.—All postsecondary 378 instructors, school district personnel and instructional 379 personnel, and school sites preparing instructional personnel 380 through preservice field experience courses and internships 381 shall meet special requirements. District school boards are 382 authorized to pay student teachers during their internships.

383 (a) All instructors in postsecondary teacher preparation 384 programs who instruct or supervise preservice field experience 385 courses or internships in which a candidate demonstrates his or 386 her impact on student learning growth shall have at least one of 387 the following: specialized training in clinical supervision; a 388 valid professional teaching certificate pursuant to ss. 1012.56 389 and 1012.585; and or at least 3 years of successful teaching 390 experience in prekindergarten through grade 12.

391 (b) All school district personnel and instructional392 personnel who supervise or direct teacher preparation students

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393	during field experience courses or internships in which a
394	candidate demonstrates his or her impact on student learning
395	growth must:
396	1. Have evidence of "clinical educator" training approved
397	by the State Board of Education.
398	2. Hold a valid professional certificate issued pursuant
399	to s. 1012.56.
400	3. Have at least 3 years of prekindergarten through grade
401	12 teaching experience.
402	4. Have earned either an effective or highly effective
403	rating on the previous year's evaluation under s. 1012.34 or be
404	a peer evaluator under the district's evaluation system approved
405	under s. 1012.34 and must successfully demonstrate effective
406	classroom management strategies that consistently result in
407	improved student performance. The State Board of Education shall
408	approve the training requirements.
409	(c) Preservice field <u>experiences must include candidate</u>
410	practice experience programs must provide specific guidance and
411	demonstration of the uniform core curriculum specific to the
412	area of program concentration with a diverse population of
413	students in a variety of settings effective classroom management
414	strategies, strategies for incorporating technology into
415	classroom instruction, strategies for incorporating
416	scientifically researched, knowledge-based reading literacy and
417	computational skills acquisition into classroom instruction, and
418	ways to link instructional plans to the Sunshine State
419	Standards, as appropriate. The length of structured field
420	experiences may be extended to ensure that candidates achieve

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421 the competencies needed to meet certification requirements.

422 Postsecondary teacher preparation programs in (d) 423 cooperation with district school boards and approved private 424 school associations shall select the school sites for preservice 425 field experience activities based upon the qualifications of 426 supervising faculty as described in this subsection and the 427 needs of the candidates. These sites must represent the full spectrum of school communities, including, but not limited to, 428 429 schools located in urban settings. In order to be selected, 430 school sites must demonstrate commitment to the education of 431 public school students and to the preparation of future 432 teachers.

433 (7) STANDARDS OF EXCELLENCE. The State Board of Education
434 shall approve standards of excellence for teacher preparation.
435 These standards must exceed the requirements for program
436 approval pursuant to subsection (4) and must incorporate state
437 and national recommendations for exemplary teacher preparation
438 programs.

439 (8) NATIONAL BOARD STANDARDS. The State Board of Education
 440 shall review standards and recommendations developed by the
 441 National Board for Professional Teaching Standards and may
 442 incorporate those parts deemed appropriate into criteria for
 443 continued state program approval, standards of excellence, and
 444 requirements for inservice education.

445 (9) FLORIDA COLLECE SYSTEM INSTITUTIONS.—To the extent 446 practical, postsecondary educational institutions offering 447 teacher preparation programs shall establish articulation 448 agreements on a core of liberal arts courses and introductory

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449 professional courses with field experience components which 450 shall be offered at Florida College System institutions. 451 (10) SHORT-TERM EXPERIENCES AS TEACHER ASSISTANTS .-452 Postsecondary institutions offering teacher preparation programs 453 and Florida College System institutions, in collaboration with 454 school districts, may develop and implement a program to provide 455 short-term experiences as teacher assistants prior to beginning 456 a teacher preparation program or alternative certification 457 program. The program shall serve individuals with baccalaureate 458 degrees who are interested in the teaching profession. This 459 experience may be accepted for use in teacher preparation 460 programs and competency-based alternative certification 461 programs, where applicable. 462 (6) (11) RULES.-The State Board of Education shall adopt 463 necessary rules pursuant to ss. 120.536(1) and 120.54 to 464 implement this section. 465 Section 2. Section 1004.85, Florida Statutes, is amended 466 to read: 467 1004.85 Postsecondary educator preparation institutes.-468 As used in this section, "educator preparation (1)469 institute" means an institute created by a postsecondary 470 institution or qualified private provider and approved by the 471 Department of Education. 472 (2) (a) Postsecondary institutions that are accredited or 473 approved as described in state board rule may seek approval from 474 the Department of Education to create educator preparation 475 institutes for the purpose of providing any or all of the 476 following:

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477 <u>1.(a)</u> Professional development instruction to assist
478 teachers in improving classroom instruction and in meeting
479 certification or recertification requirements.

480 <u>2.(b)</u> Instruction to assist potential and existing
 481 substitute teachers in performing their duties.

482 <u>3.(c)</u> Instruction to assist paraprofessionals in meeting
483 education and training requirements.

484 <u>4.(d)</u> Instruction for baccalaureate degree holders to
485 become certified teachers as provided in this section in order
486 to increase routes to the classroom for mid-career professionals
487 who hold a baccalaureate degree and college graduates who were
488 not education majors.

(b) Private providers that have a proven history of delivering high-quality teacher preparation, which is based upon evidence provided from recipients of their services and data showing the successful performance of their completers based upon student achievement, may seek approval to offer a competency-based certification program under subsection (3).

495 Educator preparation institutes approved pursuant to (3) 496 this section may offer competency-based alternative 497 certification programs specifically designed for noneducation 498 major baccalaureate degree holders to enable program 499 participants to meet the educator certification requirements of 500 s. 1012.56. Such programs shall be competency based educator 501 certification preparation programs that prepare educators 502 through an alternative route. An educator preparation institute 503 choosing to offer a competency-based an alternative 504 certification program pursuant to the provisions of this section

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505 must implement a program previously approved by the Department 506 of Education for this purpose or a program developed by the 507 institute and approved by the department for this purpose. 508 Approved programs shall be available for use by other approved 509 educator preparation institutes.

510 Within 90 days after receipt of a request for (a) 511 approval, the Department of Education shall approve an educator 512 preparation an alternative certification program pursuant to the 513 requirements of this subsection or issue a statement of the 514 deficiencies in the request for approval. The department shall 515 approve a an alternative certification program if the institute 516 provides sufficient evidence of the institute's capacity to 517 implement a competency-based program that includes the 518 following:

519 1. Participant instruction and assessment in the Florida 520 Educator Accomplished Practices, the state-adopted student 521 content standards, scientifically researched reading 522 instruction, content literacy and mathematical practices, 523 strategies appropriate for instruction of English language 524 learners, and strategies appropriate for instruction of students 525 with disabilities. 526 2. An educational plan for each participant to meet

527 certification requirements and demonstrate his or her ability to 528 teach the subject area for which the participant is seeking 529 certification, which plan is based on an assessment of his or 530 her competency in the areas listed in subparagraph 1. 531 1. Instruction must be provided in professional knowledge 532 and subject matter content that includes educator-accomplished

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533 practices and competencies specified in State Board of Education 534 rule and meets subject matter content requirements, professional 535 competency testing requirements, and competencies associated 536 with teaching scientifically based reading instruction and 537 strategies that research has shown to be successful in improving 538 reading among low-performing readers.

539 <u>3.2.</u> Field experiences appropriate to the certification 540 subject specified in the educational plan with a diverse 541 population of students in a variety of settings under The 542 program must provide field experience with supervision from 543 qualified educators.

544 <u>4.3. The program must provide</u> A certification ombudsman to 545 facilitate the process and procedures required for participants 546 who complete the program to meet any requirements related to the 547 background screening pursuant to s. 1012.32 and educator 548 professional or temporary certification pursuant to s. 1012.56.

549

(b) Each program participant must:

550 1. Meet certification requirements pursuant to s.
551 1012.56(1) by obtaining a statement of status of eligibility <u>in</u>
552 <u>the certification area of the educational plan</u> and meet the
553 requirements of s. 1012.56(2)(a)-(f).

2. Participate in <u>course work</u> field <u>experiences that are</u> cxperience that is appropriate to his or her educational plan prepared under paragraph (a).

3. <u>Before completion of the program</u>, fully demonstrate his or her ability to teach the subject area for which he or she is seeking certification <u>by documenting a positive impact on</u> student learning growth in a prekindergarten through grade 12

567 Upon completion of all requirements for a an (C) 568 alternative certification program approved pursuant to this 569 subsection, a participant shall receive a credential from the 570 sponsoring institution signifying that the participant has 571 completed a state-approved competency-based certification 572 program in the certification subject area specified in the 573 educational plan satisfaction of the requirements of s. 574 1012.56(6) relating to mastery of professional preparation and 575 education competence. A participant shall be eligible for 576 educator certification through the Department of Education upon 577 satisfaction of all requirements for certification set forth in s. 1012.56(2), including demonstration of mastery of general 578 579 knowledge, subject area knowledge, and professional preparation 580 and education competence, through testing or other statutorily 581 authorized means.

Education in 826 "clinical educator" training pursuant to s. 1004.04(5)(b) 827 1004.04(6)(b) and credits or points that provide training in the area of scientifically researched, knowledge-based reading 828 829 literacy and computational skills acquisition, exceptional 830 student education, normal child development, and the disorders 831 of development may be applied toward any specialization area. 832 Credits or points that provide training in the areas of drug 833 abuse, child abuse and neglect, strategies in teaching students 834 having limited proficiency in English, or dropout prevention, or 835 training in areas identified in the educational goals and 836 performance standards adopted pursuant to ss. 1000.03(5) and 837 1008.345 may be applied toward any specialization area.
