HR 9069 2015

House Resolution

A resolution recognizing April 2015 as "Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month" in the State of Florida.

WHEREAS, Parkinson's disease is the second most common neurodegenerative condition and occurs most frequently in men and women over 60 years of age, and

WHEREAS, as many as one million Americans live with Parkinson's disease and approximately 50,000 new cases are diagnosed in the United States each year, and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that another four to six million worldwide suffer from the condition, and

WHEREAS, Parkinson's disease causes the deterioration of neurons in the brain that produce dopamine, an essential neurotransmitter that controls smooth, coordinated muscle function, and

WHEREAS, the most typical symptoms of Parkinson's disease are tremor, rigidity, postural instability, and speech and swallowing dysfunction, which appear when approximately 50 to 80 percent of a person's dopamine neurons are damaged, and

WHEREAS, diagnosis can be difficult because there is no standard confirming test for Parkinson's disease, and, although there have been considerable advances in treatment and care, the cause of the disease is still unknown and there is no cure, and

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WHEREAS, the health and well-being of the citizens of Florida are enhanced by state recognition and increased public awareness, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

That April 2015 is recognized as "Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month" in the State of Florida, and all citizens are urged to support greater understanding of Parkinson's disease and increased funding for the search for a cure and to assist those individuals and families who struggle daily with this disabling disease.
