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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to art therapy; creating part XVII of ch. 468, F.S., entitled "Art Therapy"; creating s. 468.901, F.S.; providing legislative findings and intent; creating s. 468.902, F.S.; defining terms; creating s. 468.903, F.S.; creating the Advisory Council of Professional Art Therapists within the Division of Medical Quality Assurance in the Department of Health; providing for membership of the council; requiring the council to meet at least annually or by call of the director of the division; requiring the council to provide the director with certain expertise and assistance; requiring the director to consult with the council before issuing rules; creating s. 468.904, F.S.; prohibiting an individual from practicing professional or clinical art therapy unless he or she holds a certain license; providing exceptions; prohibiting use of the titles "professional art therapist" or "clinical art therapist" except by certain individuals; providing a penalty; providing for construction; creating s. 468.905, F.S.; establishing requirements for licensure as a professional art therapist and a clinical art therapist; authorizing the director to determine that certain programs are substantially equivalent to accredited art therapy programs; providing for licensure by reciprocity; exempting certain applicants from licensure requirements; requiring certain fees to be deposited into the Medical Quality Assurance Trust

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Fund; creating s. 468.906, F.S.; requiring a license to be renewed biennially, subject to certain requirements; requiring the director to establish continuing education requirements; providing that failure to renew shall result in forfeiture of the license; creating s. 468.907, F.S.; specifying disciplinary grounds and actions; authorizing the division, in consultation with the advisory council, to conduct investigations into violations; requiring the division to adopt rules for the administration of disciplinary procedures and actions; creating s. 468.908, F.S.; authorizing the division to adopt rules; amending s. 1002.66, F.S.; adding art therapy to the list of specialized instructional services that parents of children eligible for the prekindergarten program for children with disabilities may select; amending s. 1003.572, F.S.; including professional art therapists as private instructional personnel to provide specialized services in public schools; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Part XVII of chapter 468, Florida Statutes, consisting of ss. 468.901-468.908, Florida Statutes, is created and entitled "Art Therapy."

Section 2. Section 468.901, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

468.901 Legislative findings and intent.—The Legislature

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finds that understanding the power of art and art-making to stimulate memories and reveal emotions, and the skill to safely manage and interpret the reactions different art processes may evoke, are competencies that are unique to professionally trained art therapists. The Legislature further finds that the practice of art therapy presents a danger to public health, safety, and welfare if applied beyond the competence of the practitioner or if applied by individuals without appropriate training. It is the intent of this act to secure the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and to assist the public in making informed choices regarding art therapy services, by establishing minimum qualifications for the practice of clinical and professional art therapy.

Section 3. Section 468.902, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

468.902 Definitions.—As used in this part, the term:

- (1) "Accredited art therapy program" means a master's degree program in art therapy at a nationally accredited college or university which was approved by the American Art Therapy Association at the time an applicant's degree was granted, or, beginning January 1, 2020, a master's degree program in art therapy accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs.
- (2) "Advisory council" means the Advisory Council of Professional Art Therapists established in s. 468.903.
- (3) "Art therapy" means the integrated use of psychotherapeutic principles, art media, and creative processes to assist individuals, families, or groups in increasing an awareness of self and others, coping with stress and the

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symptoms that arise from traumatic experiences, enhancing cognitive abilities, and identifying and implementing therapeutic interventions to meet developmental, behavioral, mental, and emotional needs.

- (4) "Art therapy certified supervisor" means a board-certified art therapist holding the Art Therapy Certified
 Supervisor credential from the Art Therapy Credentials Board.
- (5) "Board-certified art therapist" means an individual who holds national board certification in good standing with the Art Therapy Credentials Board.
- (6) "Director" means the director of the Division of Medical Quality Assurance.
- (7) "Division" means the Division of Medical Quality
 Assurance within the Department of Health.
- (8) "Licensed clinical art therapist" means an individual who is licensed by the division to practice clinical art therapy pursuant to s. 468.905(3).
- (9) "Licensed professional art therapist" means an individual who is licensed by the division to practice professional art therapy pursuant to s. 468.905(1).
- of professional art therapy by an independent or adjunctive therapist who provides services to an individual, family, or group using the application of art therapy principles and methods in the diagnosis, prevention, treatment, and amelioration of psychological problems and emotional or mental conditions.
- (11) "Practice of professional art therapy" means to engage professionally and for compensation in art therapy by providing

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services that involve application of art therapy principles and methods that include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Evaluation and treatment activities during individual, couples, family, or group sessions which provide opportunities for expression through the creative process;
- (b) Using the process and products of art creation to tap into clients' inner fears, conflicts, and core issues with the goal of improving physical, mental, and emotional functioning and well-being;
- (c) Using diagnostic art therapy assessments to determine treatment goals and implement therapeutic art interventions that meet developmental, mental, behavioral, and emotional needs; and
- (d) Employing art media, the creative process, and the resulting artwork to assist clients to:
- 1. Reduce psychiatric symptoms that include, but are not limited to, depression, anxiety, posttraumatic stress, and attachment disorders;
- 2. Enhance neurological, cognitive, and verbal abilities, develop social skills, aid sensory impairments, and improve developmental capabilities;
- 3. Cope with symptoms of stress, anxiety, traumatic experiences, and grief;
- 4. Explore feelings, gain insight into behaviors, and reconcile emotional conflicts;
- 5. Improve or restore functioning and a sense of personal well-being;
- 6. Increase coping skills, self-esteem, awareness of self,
 and empathy for others;
 - 7. Improve healthy channeling of anger and guilt; and

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8. Promote developmentally appropriate academic and social interaction and relationships.

(12) "Supervised experience" means the regular oversight of the functions and activities of an art therapy student as part of an internship or practicum, or an art therapy graduate trainee engaged in the practice of professional art therapy to fulfill the requirements for licensure pursuant to s. 468.904, by an art therapy certified supervisor, board-certified art therapist, or other qualified mental health professional as determined by rule.

Section 4. Section 468.903, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

468.903 Advisory Council of Professional Art Therapists.-

- (1) There is created within the division an Advisory
 Council of Professional Art Therapists, composed of five members
 appointed by the director to serve 3-year terms. The advisory
 council shall consist of two members who are licensed
 professional art therapists, two members who are licensed
 clinical art therapists, and one member who is a licensed health
 care provider and who is not connected with the practice of
 professional art therapy.
- (a) Advisory council members shall serve staggered terms as determined by rule. Initial appointments to fill the professional art therapist positions on the advisory council shall be for a term of at least 1 year. Appointees shall be credentialed art therapists who meet the requirements for licensure under this part and who have engaged in the practice of professional art therapy in this state for at least 4 years immediately before appointment.

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(b) Advisory council members may serve consecutive terms at the will of the director.

- (c) Advisory council members shall serve without compensation, but shall be entitled to reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses pursuant to s. 112.061.
- (2) The advisory council shall meet at least annually or as called by the director.
- (3) The advisory council shall provide the director with expertise and assistance in carrying out his or her duties and responsibilities pursuant to this part, including:
- (a) Advising the director in developing rules relating to procedures and requirements for licensure and the biennial renewal of licenses, fees, licensure examinations, and approval of art therapy programs;
- (b) Evaluating the professional qualifications of applicants for licensure;
- (c) Developing materials that the division may use to educate the public about art therapy and the licensure of clinical and professional art therapists; and
- (d) Reviewing complaints of improper or unethical practice by licensed art therapists and providing advice regarding disciplinary actions.
- (4) The director shall consult with the advisory council before issuing rules pursuant to s. 468.908.
- Section 5. Section 468.904, Florida Statutes, is created to read:
 - 468.904 Licensure requirement; use of title.—
- (1) An individual may not, for or without compensation, engage in the practice of professional art therapy or clinical

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art therapy unless the individual holds a license issued by the division pursuant to s. 468.905. The requirement for licensure pursuant to this section does not apply to:

- (a) A student enrolled in a postgraduate program in art therapy approved by the director while engaged in supervised experiences that are part of an approved course of study; and
- (b) A person holding a master's or doctoral degree from an approved program in art therapy who is engaged in the practice of clinical or professional art therapy while under supervision as part of clinical training, approved by the division, to satisfy the supervised experience requirement for licensure pursuant to s. 468.905.
- (2) An individual may not, for or without compensation, use in connection with his or her name the professional designations "professional art therapist" or "clinical art therapist," or use any letters, words, or insignia, or otherwise represent himself or herself to the public as licensed or qualified to practice professional art therapy, either directly or through a governmental or private organization, entity, or agency, unless the individual holds a license issued by the division pursuant to s. 468.905.
- (3) An individual who violates this section commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.
- (4) This section may not be construed to restrict the activities or practice of an individual licensed or certified under any other law of this state from engaging in the profession or practice for which he or she is licensed or certified if he or she is providing services that are consistent

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with the individual's professional training and he or she does
not represent, imply, or claim that he or she is a professional
art therapist or clinical art therapist licensed under this
part.

Section 6. Section 468.905, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

468.905 Issuance of licenses.-

- (1) The division shall issue a professional art therapist license to each applicant who files an application using a form and in such manner as the division prescribes, accompanied by applicable fees, and who furnishes evidence satisfactory to the division that the applicant:
- (a) Holds a master's degree or higher from an accredited art therapy program or a substantially equivalent program approved by the director;
- (b) Has completed not less than 3 years, with a minimum of 3,000 hours, of supervised experience in art therapy under the supervision of an art therapy certified supervisor, board-certified art therapist, or other qualified mental health professional, as determined by the director, of which:
- 1. A minimum of 2 years, or 2,000 hours, was completed following completion of the graduate degree;
- 2. A minimum of 1,500 hours of postgraduate supervised experience involved the practice of professional art therapy face-to-face with clients, some part of which may have included participation in a doctoral internship; and
- 3. At least 1 hour of direct contact between a graduate trainee and an approved supervisor was provided per 15 hours of practice face-to-face with clients, with a minimum of 1 hour of

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direct supervision every 2 weeks;

- (c) Has passed the Art Therapy Credentials Board Examination.
- (2) The director may determine that a master's degree program in art therapy or a related field at a nationally accredited college or university is substantially equivalent to an accredited art therapy program if the program includes at least 60 semester credit hours, or the equivalent, of graduate-level courses that include courses and training in the following areas:
 - (a) The art therapy profession.
 - (b) Theory and practice of art therapy.
 - (c) Human growth and developmental dynamics in art.
- (d) Application of art therapy with people in different treatment settings.
 - (e) Art therapy appraisal, diagnosis, and assessment.
 - (f) Ethical and legal issues of art therapy practice.
- (g) Matters of cultural and social diversity bearing on the practice of art therapy.
 - (h) Standards of good art therapy practice.
 - (i) Group art therapy.
- (j) An art therapy internship of at least 600 hours which is performed under appropriate supervision and is part of an approved course of study.
- (3) The division shall issue a clinical art therapist license to each applicant who files an application using a form and in such manner as the division prescribes, accompanied by applicable fees, and who furnishes evidence satisfactory to the division that the applicant:

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- (b) Has completed at least 9 semester credit hours, or the equivalent, of graduate-level courses specifically related to diagnosis, treatment, appraisal, and assessment of mental, emotional, behavioral, and addiction disorders, either as part of an approved course of study for the master's or doctoral degree or following completion of such degree.
- (c) Has completed postgraduate supervised experience in clinical art therapy in a clinical setting that provides substantial opportunities to diagnose, treat, appraise, and assess mental, emotional, behavioral, and addiction disorders in both individual and group settings.
- (4) The division shall issue a professional art therapist license to an applicant who completes and submits an application using a form and in such manner as the division prescribes, accompanied by applicable fees, and who furnishes evidence satisfactory to the division that the applicant holds a license in good standing as a professional art therapist issued by another state or jurisdiction where the qualifications required for licensure are equal to or greater than those required by subsection (1).
- (5) The division shall waive the requirements of subsection (1) and issue a professional art therapist license to an applicant who, before July 1, 2018, files an application using a form and in a manner as the division prescribes, accompanied by applicable fees, and who furnishes evidence satisfactory to the division that the applicant:
 - (a) Is a board-certified art therapist in good standing

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with the Art Therapy Credentials Board; and

(b) Has not less than 5 years of relevant experience in the practice of art therapy before July 1, 2016, which may include not more than 1 year of supervised experience as determined by the director.

(6) Fees collected pursuant to this part shall be deposited into the Medical Quality Assurance Trust Fund as provided under s. 456.025.

Section 7. Section 468.906, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

468.906 License renewal.-

- (1) A license issued by the division under this part must be renewed biennially by submission of an application using a form and in a manner as the division prescribes, payment of a renewal fee, and submission by the licensee of evidence of satisfactory completion of required continuing education.
- (2) The director shall establish by rule the requirements for the number of credit hours and content of continuing education, approval of qualified providers of continuing education, and procedures for verifying and issuing credit for satisfactory completion of continuing education, which shall incorporate the requirements and standards for maintaining national board certification in good standing with the Art Therapy Credentials Board.
- (3) Failure to renew a license shall result in forfeiture of the license. Licenses that have been forfeited may be restored within 1 year of the expiration date upon the licensee's payment of renewal and restoration fees. Failure to restore a forfeited license within 1 year of the date of its

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expiration results in the automatic termination of the license, and the division may require the individual to reapply for licensure as a new applicant.

Section 8. Section 468.907, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

- 468.907 Disciplinary grounds and actions.-
- (1) The following acts constitute violations of this part and grounds for denial of a license or disciplinary action, as specified in s. 456.072(2):
- (a) Attempting to obtain, obtaining, or renewing a license issued by the division under this part by fraudulent misrepresentation, by bribery, or through an error of the division.
- (b) Being convicted or found guilty of, or entering a plea of guilty or nolo contendere to, regardless of adjudication, a crime in any jurisdiction which directly relates to the practice of professional art therapy or the ability to practice art therapy.
- (c) Engaging in false, deceptive, or misleading advertising or attempting to practice under a name other than one's own.
- (d) Failing to meet the minimum standards of performance in professional activities when measured against generally prevailing peer performance, including performing any treatment or therapy for which the licensee is not qualified by training or experience or performing services that have not been duly authorized by the client or his or her legal representative.
- (e) Making or filing a report that the licensee knows to be false, intentionally or negligently failing to file a report or record required by state or federal law, willfully impeding or

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obstructing such filing, or inducing another person to do so.

(f) Failing to keep a written record for each client, which includes client history, examination results, and the course of prescribed treatment.

- (g) Failing to make available, upon the written request of a client or client's legal representative, copies of tests, reports, art products, or documents in the possession of the licensee which have been prepared for and paid for by the client.
- (h) Committing any act upon a client which would constitute sexual battery or which would constitute sexual misconduct as defined pursuant to s. 394.4593.
- (i) Failing to respond within 30 days to a written communication from the division or the Department of Health concerning any investigation by the division or the department, or failing to make available any relevant records with respect to any investigation about the licensee's conduct or background.
- (j) Failing or being unable to practice art therapy with reasonable skill or competence as a result of any mental or physical condition, or by reason of illness, drunkenness, or excessive use of drugs, narcotics, or chemical substances.
- (k) Violating a rule relating to the regulation of the art therapy profession or a lawful order of the department previously entered in a disciplinary hearing involving the licensee.
- (2) The division, in consultation with the advisory council, may conduct investigations into alleged violations of this section.
 - (3) The division shall adopt rules for the administration

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of this section, including determinations of the actions that constitute a substantial violation of this section; the sanctions necessary to protect the public or to compensate clients; circumstances that allow for probation or corrective actions rather than sanctions; and the conditions under which a license may be reinstated after a licensee has undergone disciplinary action.

Section 9. Section 468.908, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

468.908 Rules.—The division is authorized to adopt rules to implement this part.

Section 10. Paragraph (f) is added to subsection (2) of section 1002.66, Florida Statutes, to read:

1002.66 Specialized instructional services for children with disabilities.—

- (2) The parent of a child who is eligible for the prekindergarten program for children with disabilities may select one or more specialized instructional services that are consistent with the child's individual educational plan. These specialized instructional services may include, but are not limited to:
 - (f) Art therapy as defined in s. 468.902.

Section 11. Paragraph (g) is added to subsection (1) of section 1003.572, Florida Statutes, to read:

1003.572 Collaboration of public and private instructional personnel.—

- (1) As used in this section, the term "private instructional personnel" means:
 - (g) Professional art therapists licensed under part XVII of
