
NOTE. Although the American Community Survey (ACS) produces population, demographic and housing unit estimates, it is the Census Bureau's Population Estimates Program that produces and disseminates the official estimates of the population for the nation, states, counties, cities and towns and estimates of housing units for states and counties.

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2005-2009 there were 189,000 households in State Senate District 30. The average household size was 2.3 people.

Families made up 61 percent of the households in State Senate District 30. This figure includes both married-couple families (49 percent) and other families (12 percent). Nonfamily households made up 39 percent of all households in State Senate District 30. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in State Senate District 30, Florida in 2005-2009



NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Twenty-two percent of the people living in State Senate District 30 in 2005-2009 were foreign born. Seventy-eight percent was native. Among people at least five years old living in State Senate District 30 in 2005-2009, 26 percent spoke a language other than English at home. Of those speaking a language other than English at home, 51 percent spoke Spanish and 49 percent spoke some other language; 46 percent reported that they did not speak English "very well."

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2005-2009, 85 percent of the people at least one year old living in State Senate District 30 were living in the same residence one year earlier; 8 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 3 percent from another county in the same state, 3 percent from another state, and 1 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of State Senate District 30, Florida in 2005-2009



EDUCATION: In 2005-2009, 90 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 33 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Ten percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in State Senate District 30 was 87,000 in 2005-2009. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 11,000 and elementary or high school enrollment was 53,000 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 22,000.

The Educational Attainment of People in State Senate District 30, Florida in 2005-2009






DISABILITY: In State Senate District 30, among people at least five years old in 2005-2009, percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2005-2009, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in State Senate District 30 were Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 19 percent, and Retail trade, 15 percent.


OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 37 percent; Sales and office occupations, 31 percent; Service occupations, 18 percent; Construction, extraction, maintenance, and repair occupations, 9 percent; and Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 6 percent. Eighty-four percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 9 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 6 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

TRAVEL TO WORK: Eighty-one percent of State Senate District 30 workers drove to work alone in 2005-2009, 10 percent carpooled, 1 percent took public transportation, and 3 percent used other means. The remaining 5 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 24.5 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in State Senate District 30 was \$52,495. Sixty-four percent of the households received earnings and 21 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Forty-five percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$17,541. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: In 2005-2009, 9 percent of people were in poverty. Twelve percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 8 percent of people 65 years old and over. Six percent of all families and 16 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.


Poverty Rates in State Senate District 30, Florida in 2005-2009

POPULATION OF State Senate District 30: In 2005-2009, State Senate District 30 had a total population of 438,000 - 230,000 (53 percent) females and 208,000 (47 percent) males. The median age was 47.1 years. Eighteen percent of the population was under 18 years and 28 percent was 65 years and older.

The Age Distribution of People in State Senate District 30, Florida in 2005-2009



For people reporting one race alone, 85 percent was White; 7 percent was Black or African American; less than 0.5 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 2 percent was Asian; less than 0.5 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 4 percent was Some other race. One percent reported Two or more races. Fifteen percent of the people in State Senate District 30 was Hispanic. Seventy-three percent of the people in State Senate District 30 was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2005-2009, State Senate District 30 had a total of 230,000 housing units, 18 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 53 percent was in single-unit structures, 43 percent was in multi-unit structures, and 4 percent was mobile homes. Thirty-two percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

The Types of Housing Units in State Senate District 30, Florida in 2005-2009





OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2005-2009, State Senate District 30 had 189,000 occupied housing units - 148,000 (79 percent) owner occupied and 40,000 (21 percent) renter occupied.

renter occupied. Three percent of the households did not have telephone service and 6 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Thirty-seven percent had two vehicles and another 10 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$1,804, nonmortgaged owners \$567, and renters \$1,221. Fifty-two percent of owners with mortgages, 26 percent of owners without mortgages, and 60 percent of renters in State Senate District 30 spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.

Data are based on a sample and are subject to sampling variability. The degree of uncertainty for an estimate arising from sampling variability is represented through the use of a margin of error. The value shown here is the 90 percent margin of error. The margin of error can be interpreted roughly as providing a 90 percent probability that the interval defined by the estimate minus the margin of error and the estimate plus the margin of error (the lower and upper confidence bounds) contains the true value. In addition to sampling variability, the ACS estimates are subject to nonsampling error (for a discussion of nonsampling variability, see [Accuracy of the Data](#)). The effect of nonsampling error is not represented in these tables.

Notes:

- Ancestry listed in this table refers to the total number of people who responded with a particular ancestry; for example, the estimate given for Russian represents the number of people who listed Russian as either their first or second ancestry. This table lists only the largest ancestry groups; see the Detailed Tables for more categories. Race and Hispanic origin groups are not included in this table because official data for those groups come from the Race and Hispanic origin questions rather than the ancestry question (see Demographic Table).
- The Census Bureau introduced a new set of disability questions in the 2008 ACS questionnaire. Because of contextual differences between the 2008-2009 disability data and disability data collected in prior years, the Census Bureau is unable to combine the 5 years of disability data in order to produce the multi-year estimate that would appear in this table. Multi-year estimates of disability status will become available once five consecutive years of data are collected. For more information about the differences between the 2008 and prior years' disability questions, see [Review of Changes to the Measurement of Disability in the 2008 ACS](#).
- Data for year of entry of the native population reflect the year of entry into the U.S. by people who were born in Puerto Rico, U.S. Island Areas or born outside the U.S. to a U.S. citizen parent and who subsequently moved to the U.S.
- While the 2005-2009 American Community Survey (ACS) data generally reflect the November 2008 Office of Management and Budget (OMB) definitions of metropolitan and micropolitan statistical areas; in certain instances the names, codes, and boundaries of the principal cities shown in ACS tables may differ from the OMB definitions due to differences in the effective dates of the geographic entities.
- Estimates of urban and rural population, housing units, and characteristics reflect boundaries of urban areas defined based on Census 2000 data. Boundaries for urban areas have not been updated since Census 2000. As a result, data for urban and rural areas from the ACS do not necessarily reflect the results of ongoing urbanization.

Explanation of Symbols:

1. An "***" entry in the margin of error column indicates that either no sample observations or too few sample observations were available to compute a standard error and thus the margin of error. A statistical test is not appropriate.
2. An "-" entry in the estimate column indicates that either no sample observations or too few sample observations were available to compute an estimate, or a ratio of medians cannot be calculated because one or both of the median estimates falls in the lowest interval or upper interval of an open-ended distribution.
3. An "-" following a median estimate means the median falls in the lowest interval of an open-ended distribution.
4. An "+" following a median estimate means the median falls in the upper interval of an open-ended distribution.
5. An "****" entry in the margin of error column indicates that the median falls in the lowest interval or upper interval of an open-ended distribution. A

statistical test is not appropriate.

6. An '*****' entry in the margin of error column indicates that the estimate is controlled. A statistical test for sampling variability is not appropriate.
7. An 'N' entry in the estimate and margin of error columns indicates that data for this geographic area cannot be displayed because the number of sample cases is too small.
8. An '(X)' means that the estimate is not applicable or not available.
