1 T A P E D P R O C E E D I N G S

2 MR. FERRIN: Okay, all right, it is
3 shortly after 11:00. So we will go ahead and
4 get started here.

5 The purpose of this meeting is to generate
6 a set of random district numbers per the
7 directions of Chairman Galvano who in his memo,
8 that was sent out last night expressed his
9 desire to put forth an amendment that was
10 randomly numbered in committee tomorrow.

11 I would like to thank the Auditor General
12 and her staff for making themselves available
13 today to help us with the random assignment of
14 even and odd numbers to the districts that are
15 currently identified in the base map 9070.

16 The Auditor General will use the random
17 number generator function of Excel to generate
18 random number values for each of the 40
19 districts identified in plan S000S 9078.

20 The random number value assigned to each
21 district by the random number generator will be
22 sorted by value from smallest to largest and
23 the first 20 districts identified on the list
24 will be assigned even district numbers. The
25 remaining 20 districts identified on the list

1 will be assigned odd district numbers. The
2 Auditor General staff will perform the random
3 number generation and the Auditor General will
4 witness the results.

5 I think the description of the methodology
6 here is, I can walk through that, where we will
7 have a -- each district identified by the
8 placeholder number from 1 through 40 in plan
9 S000S 9078.

10 We will then generate a random number
11 value for each district identified. Then we
12 will sort the districts identified by the
13 random number value from smallest to largest
14 and select the first 20 districts identified
15 from this sorted list of random values to
16 assign even district numbers.

17 We will then assign the remaining
18 districts from the sorted list of random values
19 to odd district numbers, and I will make a copy
20 of this specific methodology available to
21 anybody who would like one. And I think with
22 that we are ready to go.

23 SENATOR CLEMENS: Do we have an
24 opportunity -- I don't know how this is an
25 official meeting, if it -- is it -- do we have

1 an opportunity to ask any questions?

2 MR. FERRIN: Well, the purpose of this
3 meeting was to publicly conduct the random
4 assignment. I mean, is your question about
5 that or is it --

6 SENATOR CLEMENS: Yes. And if you can't
7 answer the question because you are a staff
8 member I completely understand that. But I am
9 -- I am trying to figure out why we would do a
10 random number generation before we have a
11 finalized map. This is likely not to be the
12 map that we are going to finish up with, and I
13 think it creates more problems to do this prior
14 to the amendments and things of that nature
15 than it would if we did it after. Unless the
16 plan is to do it random number generation now
17 and then also a random number generation once
18 the map has been complete. Do you have a sense
19 of that?

20 MR. FERRIN: I don't know at this point.
21 You know, if the map changes and needs to be
22 renumbered again, then we can discuss probably,
23 you know. I mean, that would be a conversation
24 to have with the Chairman for the Legislature
25 to make if they want to conduct the random

1 renumbering again.

2 SENATOR CLEMENS: Can I follow up on that?

3 MR. FERRIN: Sure.

4 SENATOR CLEMENS: So my worry is that we
5 are politically tainting the process by doing
6 the numbering beforehand. You get into
7 knowing, you know, that potentially we are
8 going to treat all even numbered districts one
9 way, whether it is two or four-year terms,
10 treat all odd numbers districts another way
11 whether it is two or four-year terms and they
12 will be grouped up that way and it creates a
13 potential opportunity for a lot of political
14 maneuvering and amendment filing that I think
15 actually would violate our constitutional
16 position of not -- not filing amendments or
17 doing maps for any political purpose or to
18 benefits any of the incumbents.

19 So that is the worry I have with doing
20 this beforehand and I don't know if that is a
21 discussion that the attorneys had or anyone
22 else had.

23 MR. LeVESQUE: Well, if I could weigh in
24 on that. We are not actually determining the
25 way the even districts are being treated or the

1 odd districts are being treated.

2 The constitution dictates that. Odd
3 numbered districts are to stand for election
4 years that are divisible by four, and even
5 numbered districts stand for election in even
6 numbered years that are not divisible by four.

7 SENATOR CLEMENS: May I follow up?

8 MR. FERRIN: Yes.

9 SENATOR CLEMENS: Probably the question, I
10 don't know if the question is better addressed
11 to the attorney. So that, that even gives me
12 more concern because what that -- what that
13 will do is that will set up a map where even
14 before amendments are made we know ostensibly
15 which terms are going to be two-year terms and
16 which terms are going to be four-year terms,
17 and then sets up a process, an amendatory
18 process whereby everybody is trying to jostle
19 politically to support their Senate President
20 candidate, to support the candidates who want
21 to support a certain President candidate, who
22 wouldn't a two-year term rather than a
23 four-year term.

24 I just, I find doing this process before
25 we actually have a map actually put us in a

1 position that will cause greater difficulty in
2 having the Supreme Court pass it, and I am
3 curious why we would want to do it right now
4 when that exists.

5 MR. LEVESQUE: Well, I believe that is a
6 question for Senator Galvano as to whether --
7 why he wants to do the numbering for his map
8 now in this manner. Certainly if somebody
9 wants to change it or propose something
10 different, they are free to do that. Whether
11 they are -- how their map is numbered and
12 whether it addresses any of those things or the
13 intent behind that is something I think that
14 would be appropriate for legislative inquiry,
15 and I don't think this necessarily indicates
16 one way or another how that future amendment
17 might be perceived.

18 SENATOR GIBSON: I have a question. So
19 yesterday when we had discussion about numbers
20 and how that was going to play out and I
21 thought we were having that discussion tomorrow
22 actually, it was said that we would number
23 districts the same if they didn't change
24 drastically, although we didn't have a
25 definition for what drastically was.

1 So today instead of doing it that way we
2 are doing the random, the random, the random
3 drawing?

4 And my second question goes to, I was on
5 the Reapportionment Committee when we came up
6 with the current map, and we did the Senate
7 Lotto after the map was already done.

8 We had two ball cages that did the number
9 whether it was going to be even or odd, it just
10 came out of the thing. So why would we be
11 assigning numbers now when we don't have a
12 completed map? So those two, if you could
13 address those or Justice Cantero.

14 MR. FERRIN: I think the second part of
15 that, or the second question there was very
16 similar to Senator Clemens just asked and
17 probably the same answer would apply.

18 But the first question as to you thought
19 we were -- there has been -- the Chairman has
20 made clear in his memo last night that he put
21 forth the amendment, that his plan 9078 as was
22 renumbered by commonality with the enacted
23 districts. He has also directed me to conduct
24 this random process today because we would like
25 to have an alternative that is randomly

1 numbered available for the committee members to
2 exercise their -- their ability as a member of
3 the committee to voice their preference for one
4 numbering method over the other.

5 SENATOR GIBSON: Well, the difference is
6 between today and I thought the Justice said we
7 didn't have to go through this kind of a
8 process. The difference is when we did the
9 numbering before it was in the blind.

10 So if we place numbers on districts, odd,
11 even, which obviously affects terms, then it is
12 not in the blind anymore. So I don't
13 understand that. It is -- it is prejudicial as
14 far as I am concerned.

15 MR. LEVESQUE: If I may, and while I was
16 just an observer the last time you renumbered
17 the districts, it was my understanding that
18 they renumbered the districts in an open
19 meeting. But as a matter of passing a Bill,
20 the members were still in a position where they
21 would know how they were affected before they
22 voted on a Bill, because that language
23 designating this geographic area as District 1
24 and this geographic area as District 2 was
25 something that would have had to have been in

1 the legislation before you voted on it.

2 It wasn't something where you could pass a
3 map and then somebody could come in after the
4 fact and fill those things out. So there is
5 always going to be the issue of, I am voting on
6 something and I know who the winners and losers
7 are going to be, at least in terms of the two
8 and four-year term aspects of it.

9 SENATOR GIBSON: This is my last comment.
10 And I know the reason we did Senate Lotto was
11 because the Court sent it back and said that
12 the way we did it the first time did -- was not
13 a neutral numbering system. So they sent it
14 back to us to do the ball cages.

15 SENATOR BRANDES: Mr. Ferrin, I have a
16 question. So my understanding of this is that
17 it is going to provide us two different
18 methodologies. One being the current
19 methodology, that if we do nothing and the
20 current methodology of we are going to use the
21 numbers from 2012, is that would be option one
22 and for today that is the only option.

23 This simply provides us another
24 methodology which the Senate may consider at
25 some future date for option two, which would be

1 a new set of random numbers, is that correct?

2 MR. FERRIN: That is correct, Senator
3 Brandes, and I brief it is the Chairman's
4 intention and he has expressed this publicly as
5 well, to offer the carry over numbering as the
6 main amendment on to SJR 2-C tomorrow and then
7 offer a substitute amendment that is the random
8 number.

9 And so if the random numbering amendment
10 is defeated tomorrow then the amendment before
11 the committee would be the one with the carry
12 over numbers.

13 If the randomly numbered amendment is
14 accepted, that would then be the substance of
15 that amendment as it moves forward.

16 SENATOR BRANDES: But barring this process
17 today there will be no substitute amendment
18 tomorrow?

19 MR. FERRIN: Correct.

20 SENATOR BRANDES: So we have some type of
21 random numbers. So the only reason we have --
22 the reason that we are doing it today is so
23 that there is that ability?

24 MR. FERRIN: Correct, yes, sir.

25 SENATOR BRANDES: Thank you.

1 SENATOR CLEMENS: Mr. Ferrin, just as a
2 follow up to that. So what happens if we just
3 don't accept that one map and if there are
4 changes made to the map that change the
5 numbers?

6 It -- I just don't -- there has been no
7 good reason given why we have to do that, why
8 we have to do this right now. There has really
9 been no good reason for why this has to happen
10 and -- and I think I truly believe and I don't
11 know if you are going to answer this question
12 because it is more of a statement, but I truly
13 believe that what we are doing right now here
14 is setting up another marker, yet another one
15 and we had one earlier this week that is going
16 to cause the courts to look at what we are
17 doing with consternation and say that we are
18 being overly political in this process.

19 So I just wanted to get that on the record
20 somewhere in a public meeting that when this
21 comes back to bite us because there was some
22 sort of fete accompli with the maps and they
23 are not going to accept any amendments and they
24 are going to -- we are going to know what all
25 the numbers are beforehand this is another

1 moment in time where somebody has made a really
2 poor decision to do something that we didn't
3 need to do for political purposes.

4 MR. FERRIN: Go ahead, Senator Montford.

5 SENATOR MONTFORD: Thank you, Mr. Ferrin.
6 Let me try to make a couple of observations.
7 It seems to where we are, the Committee Chair
8 has directed your staff director to do this
9 today. To me that is a moot point. I don't
10 think we have a decision to make here today as
11 to whether or not we are going to do this.

12 My question though is, are we not getting
13 the horse before the cart and I think,
14 Mr. Justice, you may have answered the
15 question, but you may have to help me again.

16 Would, if we go through this process, when
17 we go through this process today and the
18 numbers are assigned to districts, if the map,
19 itself, is amended and changed, even if it is
20 by unanimous consent, would we not have to
21 renumber those districts again?

22 MR. LeVESQUE: I don't believe you would
23 necessarily have to, but you certainly could to
24 address -- to address that issue. Practically
25 speaking, and I think this may go to Senator

1 Clemens' earlier point, that the district, the
2 districts and the numbers represent geography
3 and they also represent who stands for election
4 when based upon the way the constitution
5 operates.

6 Even without the numbers there is already
7 at least from my understanding of the process,
8 people generally know, okay, well, I currently
9 live in this area and that is where I am and
10 that is where I would likely run, or I might
11 move or do something different.

12 So the idea that -- that the numbering
13 somehow puts everybody on the line and limits
14 or restricts the ability to make changes, I
15 think might be something that is not looking at
16 the broader scope in that every change could be
17 criticized from that standpoint, whether the
18 numbers are randomly numbered or whether they
19 are assigned by the staff or not.

20 SENATOR MONTFORD: A follow up to that
21 then if I may. We are about to assign numbers
22 to a proposed map, and that proposed map has a
23 legal description in terms of what those
24 districts are. Take District 3, for example,
25 it is real simple.

1 You follow the -- you got 11 counties
2 there, and it will be assigned a number. If in
3 the process that one county is changed for
4 another one, then that legal description of
5 that particular district has changed, and would
6 that not bring into question even though it is
7 a simple change maybe, would that not bring
8 into question the validity of that number for a
9 district that is not -- that does not carry the
10 same legal description as previously?

11 MR. LEVESQUE: I think if you -- if the
12 number remained the same it would be in the
13 situation where the newly drawn district would
14 reflect a geographical change, but I don't
15 believe there is nothing or there is anything
16 specific regarding the carrying over of the
17 number that is problematic, because for all
18 other intents and purposes, the numbers' main
19 determiner is when that district is supposed to
20 stand for election.

21 Odd numbers in years that are divisible by
22 four, even numbers in year -- even numbered
23 years that are not divisible by four.

24 SENATOR MONTFORD: A follow up to that.
25 But that is my point, and it is maybe splitting

1 hairs, but when we are talking about a district
2 that has a number, to me if that district
3 changes at all it is not the same district.
4 And so I don't see how you can lay claim to a
5 number if it is not -- if it does not carry the
6 same legal description for that particular
7 district.

8 It, I am not a lawyer, but I have been
9 sued a lot now. So that is what I am
10 wondering, and I -- I asked the question
11 yesterday, well, if this is such a big issue
12 why don't we just go ahead and renumber it.

13 That is what we are trying to do. Now I
14 am asking the other question, why are we doing
15 it now. So I -- I have a serious question
16 about the process. That is -- I don't want to
17 get involved in a process that can be
18 questioned later on.

19 To me I -- it is probably quite frankly is
20 a discussion that may be need to be taken
21 tomorrow when the full committee is here and
22 certainly when our Chair has an advantage, an
23 opportunity to hear and not Mr. Ferrin as our
24 staffer.

25 MR. FERRIN: Right. I think we are here

1 today to conduct an administrative, you know,
2 ministerial process. I think if we want to
3 discuss the policy tomorrow is the appropriate
4 time for that when we are in the full
5 committee. So is there anything else?

6 All right, are we ready?

7 (Brief pause.)

8 MR. FERRIN: Okay, so the districts'
9 numbers are in the left most column there and
10 the -- the order that they are sorted in is
11 smallest to largest which was the methodology
12 that has been established.

13 And so the first 20 in the number, in the
14 column there on the left, 1 through 20, the
15 districts associated with those will receive
16 even numbers and the remaining districts will
17 receive odd numbers.

18 I will go back this afternoon and renumber
19 the plan and publish it and make it available
20 later this afternoon. If it is -- yes.

21 SENATOR GIBSON: Where does the number
22 come from, because I don't know the
23 methodology? So where does the random number
24 assigned come from? Where does that number
25 come from, the middle column?

1 MR. FERRIN: That is the randomly assigned
2 value, that is an Excel function.

3 SENATOR GIBSON: Huh.

4 SENATOR THOMPSON: Would you say again how
5 you determine whether it is an even number or
6 an odd number?

7 MR. FERRIN: The districts right now in
8 the left most column, everything is ranked
9 according to the random value that was
10 assigned. The smallest random value is at the
11 top, the largest random value is at the bottom.
12 And so the districts as they were numbered in
13 the placeholder, the placeholder numbers
14 associated with the plan are in the left most
15 column.

16 The first 20 districts there in the
17 placeholder numbering in plan 9078 will receive
18 even numbers. The last 20 will receive odd
19 numbers. And I will go, I will start in the
20 north end of the state with 2 and then 4 and
21 then number the way down the state.

22 SENATOR THOMPSON: So the first 20 are
23 even, the last 20 are odd?

24 MR. FERRIN: Correct.

25 SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you.

1 MR. FERRIN: The first 20 districts in the
2 left most column will receive even numbers.
3 The last 20 will receive odd numbers.

4 SENATOR GIBSON: So first you put them in
5 numerical order in column A.

6 MR. FERRIN: Correct.

7 SENATOR GIBSON: And then in column B --
8 what happened in column B?

9 MR. FERRIN: I am passing down a
10 description of the methodology that explains
11 probably in more detail. But the districts
12 were listed 1 through 40 in the left most
13 column.

14 SENATOR GIBSON: Right.

15 MR. FERRIN: Then a random value was
16 associated with that.

17 SENATOR GIBSON: Right.

18 MR. FERRIN: In the center column, then it
19 was all sorted.

20 SENATOR GIBSON: In C.

21 MR. FERRIN: It was sorted in B. C is
22 just a list to show us which one is the 20th
23 district. So it is just sequentially numbered.
24 That is the rank essentially, associated with
25 the value. Is that correct?

1 MR. LeVESQUE: Yes.

2 MR. FERRIN: Everybody is nodding their
3 head yes.

4 SENATOR GIBSON: And so now you will take
5 the column C and start with the number 2?

6 MR. FERRIN: No, district -- District 17
7 will be the first district. District 17 in the
8 left column there down through, if you will
9 scroll down District 1 will receive even
10 numbers. And I will do that in a manner in
11 which the low district numbers are in the north
12 end of Florida and the higher numbers are in
13 the south. That is pretty consistent with
14 Senate practice.

15 Anything else?

16 SENATOR THOMPSON: Yes. Are those the
17 current numbers or the placeholder numbers?

18 MR. FERRIN: Those are the placeholder
19 numbers in 9078. A new plan will be published
20 with the new numbers. I will send out an
21 e-mail to the world with that plan attached
22 when I get it done.

23 SENATOR GIBSON: How are the numbers in
24 column A are the placeholder numbers that are
25 on the map, they are not --

1 MR. FERRIN: Yes.

2 SENATOR GIBSON: -- current.

3 MR. FERRIN: Correct. I want to thank you
4 all very much for your time, I appreciate it.

5 (Whereupon, the proceedings were
6 adjourned.)
