Due to Hurricane Ian, Lee County Utilities (LCU) has experienced a loss of customer base and tourism that resulted in a revenue shortfall of \$1,755,167.98 from storm landfall Sept. 28, 2022 through December 31, 2022. Revenue recovery will help fund operational and maintenance repairs that provide reliable water and wastewater service to Lee County residents and guests.
