This Central Receiving Facility (CRF) will provide evidence-based coordinated receiving for Baker and Marchman Acts. This facility will provide immediate crisis intervention, assessment, and care coordination services 24/7 for individuals who enter through voluntary or involuntary means. The CRF will: (1) decrease the time that law enforcement and/or first responders are engaged and provide interagency transportation in order to better utilize the limited community resources; and (2) reduce the burden and cost on Emergency Medical facilities and speed access to care for individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis.

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



The CRF will provide evidence-based coordinated receiving for Baker and Marchman Acts. This facility will provide immediate crisis intervention, assessment, and care coordination 24/7 for anyone in need, both voluntary or involuntary. Decrease the time that law enforcement and first responders are engaged and will provide interagency transportation in order to better utilize the limited community resources. Reduce the burden and cost on Emergency Medical facilities and speed access to care for a behavioral health crisis.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Coordinated receiving by law enforcement and voluntary for citizens experiencing a mental health or substance abuse crisis, including immediate crisis intervention, assessment, and care coordination 24/7 for anyone in need, regardless of their ability to pay. Coordination of care based on all available system resources will reduce the use of costly and less effective emergency departments.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Includes direct access to psychiatric inpatient services, including evaluation and assessment, nursing care, integrated primary care services, therapy and life skills education, brief and intensive stabilization services, medication management, discharge services, and care management and coordination.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

All citizens in need of behavioral health crisis services. Approximately 4500 individuals will be served annually.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Improved coordination of care, Lower readmissions rates, diversion from acute care, successful linkage to community services in a more timely manner. Better coordinated and quicker law enforcement access resulting in improved speed of return to patrol areas.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

If there is an area in which Meridian is deficient, it is suggested that a corrective action plan be implemented and monitored to ensure that the deficient area(s) is/are corrected timely. If Meridian is not meeting the deliverables or performance outlined in the contract, the State has the option to cancel the contract for these services.
