#### Florida's Domestic Security Mandate

Section 943.03(14), F.S., mandates FDLE to:

- Coordinate and direct law enforcement and initial emergency responses to terrorism, immigration enforcement incidents, and other matters related to the domestic security within Florida.
- Assist the Federal Government with enforcing federal immigration laws.
- Work closely with the Division of Emergency Management, as well as other public and private multi-disciplinary partners to accomplish the domestic security mission.



#### Florida's Domestic Security Goals

- Prepare for terrorism and other domestic security and immigration incidents and events.
- Prevent and deter acts of terrorism.
- Protect our residents, visitors, and critical infrastructure against acts of terrorism.
- *Mitigate* the impact of an incident to preserve life, property, and the environment.
- Respond in an immediate and coordinated manner focused on life safety, incident stabilization, property conservation, and community stabilization.
- Recover quickly and effectively following an incident.

#### **FDLE Roles & Responsibilities**

- Coordinate Florida's comprehensive response to acts of terrorism and other matters related to the domestic security of Florida.
- Serve as Homeland Security Advisor.
- Implement and maintain Florida's Domestic Security Strategic Plan.
- Chair the Domestic Security Oversight Council.
- Facilitate Regional Domestic Security Task Forces (RDSTF).
- Co-chair Domestic Security Coordinating Group.

#### FDLE Roles & Responsibilities

- Coordinate the annual domestic security funding process.
- Produce annual Domestic Security and Critical Infrastructure reports.
- Oversee intelligence / information exchange through the Florida Fusion Center Network.
- Prepare recommendations for the Governor and Legislature to limit the state's vulnerability to terrorism.



#### **Emergency Preparedness - Exercise**

- FDLE has created a full time Emergency Preparedness Unit with responsibilities for internal agency emergency management functions, as well as supporting external partners.
- This unit has participated in, planned, and/or delivered multiple exercises, to include the Statewide Terrorism Exercise series, Continuity of Government Exercise, FDLE Continuity of Operations Exercise, Florida State University Stadium Evacuation Exercise, and Office of the Director of National Intelligence Electrical Grid Security Tabletop Exercise.



#### **Emergency Preparedness - Training**

- FDLE's Emergency Preparedness Unit works with the Florida Division of Emergency Management (FDEM) and local agencies to provide the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved training internally and externally to ensure Florida responders and FDLE are compliant with Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 and Presidential Policy Directive 8.
- Currently, two members are approved by FDEM to teach FEMA classes. This capability will be expanded in 2025.



#### Critical Infrastructure Assessment and Evaluation Software

- FDLE sought to resolve the gap in situational awareness of critical infrastructure that occurs at the state and local level.
- FDLE's Tallahassee Regional Operations Center was able to catalog nearly 2,000 critical infrastructure facilities.
- Statewide launch occurred September 1, 2024.
- Three sworn Inspectors have been hired, and six non-sworn critical infrastructure specialists are being hired statewide with the mission of identifying, cataloging, and assessing critical infrastructure facilities.



#### **School Security Assessment Grant Program**

- FDLE was appropriated \$5 million in FY 2024-25 in pass-through grant funding for local law enforcement to support the following activities related to private K-12 schools on a voluntary basis:
  - Conduct physical site security assessments for and provide reports to Florida private schools with recommendations on improving infrastructure and safety;
  - Assist Florida private schools in developing active assailant response protocols, as well as develop/implement training related to active assailant responses (i.e., drills for students and school personnel); and/or
  - Consult with private schools in implementing a threat management program similar to those required under s. 1001.212(12), F.S., for public schools.

## Threats to Critical Infrastructure – Drones

- FDLE is strengthening the response to drones as a threat through drone detection capabilities.
  - The agency currently maintains both fixed and relocatable drone detection systems.
  - These systems are able to identify drones, assess the speed, direction, and altitude of the drone, provide remote identification information as required by the Federal Aviation Administration, and locate the pilot.



# Threats to Critical Infrastructure – Preventative Radiological/Nuclear Detection (PRND)

- FDLE currently maintains man-portable radiological detection with spectroscopic capabilities.
- The agency is currently working with our Regional Domestic Security Task Force partners to assess the PRND capabilities throughout the state.



#### Threats to Critical Infrastructure – Vehicle Barriers

- Through the domestic security funding process, as approved by Domestic Security Oversight Council, and in coordination with FDEM, all regions have either received or are in the process of receiving vehicle barrier sets.
- All vehicle barriers purchased through State Homeland Security Grant program funds or by FDEM are both shareable and deployable statewide.
- There have already been several instances of preventative success in the deployment of these barriers.


- Multi-agency criminal interdiction operations and training for those with boots on the ground. Since its inception, BITE has conducted over 15 operations throughout the state.
- On December 18, 2023, the Multi-Agency Task
   Force recovered over \$750,000 in seized assets,
   including bulk U.S. currency, narcotics, and firearms.
- On August 1, 2024, the Multi-Agency Task Force recovered over \$500,000 in assets, including narcotics, firearms, and currency.









#### **LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES**

#### Xylazine

- Will add Xylazine to the Florida's trafficking statute to hold criminals who unlawfully manufacture or sell Xylazine accountable by providing law enforcement with the tools to go after these drug dealers.

#### Luring or Enticing a Child

- Will amend current law to increase the penalty from a misdemeanor to a felony for an adult who <u>intentionally</u> lures or entices or attempts to lure or entice a child under the age of 12, other than for a lawful purpose.
- This legislation will also increase the criminal penalties for repeat offenders.





#### **DOMESTIC SECURITY**

- Sheriffs continue to work with FDLE and state fusion center on information dissemination
  - Fusion Center model works and allows for actionable intelligence to flow from all levels of government.
- Florida Model Jail Standards and New Initiatives
  - Member of the FMJS are working to ensure all jails are safely inspected.
  - Sheriffs are working to gather and collect intel to share among federal, state and local law enforcement agencies.
