Hurricane Debby - August 5, 2024

Immediate: RESPONSE

Human Services

More than 104,000 hot meals, 6,800 food boxes, 218,000 shelf-stable meals, 321,000 bottles of water, 20 truckloads of ice and 18,000 tarps distributed

Emergency Services

 7 State USAR Teams and 4 EMAC Swiftwater teams deployed for search and rescue

Infrastructure

- Full power restoration to over 307,900 customers within four days
- 119 Starlinks deployed

Logistics

- 12,200 linear feet of Flood Control Systems deployed to fight flooding effects, as well as 48 pumps that pumped over 591 million gallons of water
- 97 generators deployed





Hurricane Debby - August 5, 2024

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

 The state is currently estimated to receive \$45.4 million in hazard mitigation funding to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures in communities impacted by Hurricane Debby







Hurricane Helene – September 26, 2024

Immediate: RESPONSE

Human Services

 More than 977,000 hot meals, 48,000 food boxes, 1 million shelf-stable meals, 1.5 million bottles of water, 70 truckloads of ice and 54,000 tarps distributed

Emergency Services

• 1,250 personnel deployed for search and rescue

Infrastructure

- Full power restoration to over 1.2 million customers within seven days
- 183 Starlinks deployed

Logistics

- 10,700 linear feet of Flood Control Systems deployed to fight flooding effects, as well as 106 pumps that pumped 1.4 billion gallons of water
- 581 generators deployed





Hurricane Helene - September 26, 2024

Ongoing: RECOVERY

Debris Task Force

- Following Hurricane Helene and prior to Hurricane Milton, the Debris Task Force quickly coordinated with local officials on how to better address the counties' needs
- As of December 2024, more than 37 million cubic yards of upland debris and 311,000 cubic yards of waterway debris have been removed post-Helene and Milton

Public Assistance

Obligated: \$386 million





Hurricane Milton – October 9, 2024

Immediate: RESPONSE

Human Services

- Over 1.1 million hot meals, 124,000 food boxes, 1.2 million shelf stable meals,
 1.5 million bottles of water, 70 truckloads of ice and 83,900 tarps distributed
- Over 200 Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (VOADs) assisted in response and recovery

Emergency Services

• 1,700 personnel deployed for search and rescue

Infrastructure

- Full power restoration to nearly 3.4 million customers within seven days
- Prevention of over \$2 million dollars in economic losses for Florida's strawberry and aquaculture producers due to generators provided by the SERT

Logistics

- **35,500** linear feet of Flood Control Systems deployed to fight flooding effects, as well as **235** pumps that pumped **3.3 billion** gallons of water
- 819 generators deployed







Hurricane Milton – October 9, 2024

Ongoing: RECOVERY

State Non-Congregate Sheltering Program

- Survivors in 52 counties whose homes were impacted by both Helene and Milton were eligible to apply for Non-Congregate Sheltering through Hope Florida
- Over 1,000 displaced households sheltered
- Over 650 travel trailers donated to local jurisdictions and non-profit partners

Volunteer Village

 Sarasota County – At its peak, provided lodging for up to 250 volunteers to serve surrounding impacted communities

Public Assistance

Obligated: \$1.1 billion





Florida Recovery Obligation Calculation (F-ROC)

What is F-ROC?

- Florida Recovery Obligation Calculation (F-ROC) is a new initiative that standardizes, streamlines, and simplifies the Public Assistance process.
- Accelerates Public Assistance funding distribution using a risk-based approach.
- Provides a framework for managing costs associated with response and recovery projects, particularly those funded under federal programs.



Key Pillars of F-ROC

Standardization

Form standardization simplifies the process, making it easier to submit documentation for Public Assistance.

Procurement

Understanding the procurement process and having contracts and vendors in place is critical in successful submission for Public Assistance.

Procedures

Applicants prepare for events by ensuring they have a plan in place that includes policies and procedures.

Assessment

The Disaster Readiness
Assessment provides Applicants
the insights needed for them to
be successful in navigating the
Public Assistance program.



Florida Recovery Obligation Calculation (F-ROC)

Features of F-ROC

Risk reduction

 F-ROC is intended to reduce risk for Applicants related to negative audit findings and common deobligations.

Compliance and Transparency


 It ensures that financial data aligns with state and federal regulations, providing accountability for the use of recovery funds.

Proactive Approach to Recovery

The term "Recovery" implies a reactive approach.
 Through F-ROC, Applicants are encouraged to be proactive and "Prepare to Recover".

Streamlined Processes

 It includes a document repository for Applicants to easily access and automated processes to create reimbursement requests.





Mitigation Grant Programs

Mitigation: Actions taken to reduce or eliminate long-term risk to people and property

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

- Federal grant program designed to assist states, local governments, certain private non-profit organizations and tribes in implementing long-term hazard mitigation measures following a major disaster declaration
- Period of Performance: 3 years
- Cost Share: Cost reimbursement grant, 75% federal / 25% non-federal

Building Resilient Infrastructures and Communities (BRIC)

- Federal grant program designed to support states, local governments and tribes in reducing hazard risk through proactive investment in community resilience and support of adoption of building codes
- Period of Performance: 3 years
- Cost Share: Cost reimbursement grant, 75% federal / 25% non-federal



Mitigation Grant Programs, Cont.

Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA)

- Federal grant program designed to reduce or eliminate claims under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) by reducing or eliminating risk of repetitive flood damage to insured buildings and structures
- Period of Performance: 3 years
- Cost Share: Cost reimbursement grant; Varies based on project type

Hurricane Loss Mitigation Program (HLMP)

- State grant program designed to improve flood and wind resilience of residences and community buildings
- Period of Performance: 1 year
- Cost Share: 100% state-funded, \$3.5 million annually for counties, cities and non-profit organizations
- Other Allocations:
 - Hurricane Public Shelter Development Program: \$3 million
 - Mobile Home Tie Down Program: \$2.8 million
 - FIU International Hurricane Research Center: \$700,000



Mitigation Projects

Elevations

The physical raising and/or retrofitting of an existing structure

Mitigation Reconstruction

- Involves the demolition of the existing structure and the construction of an improved, elevated structure
 - Only when an existing structure is not structurally sound enough to be elevated



Mitigation Projects, Cont.

Acquisition

- Purchase of an existing at-risk structure to convert the land to open green space in perpetuity
 - Intended to eliminate 100% damages
 - Restores floodplain

Floodproofing

- Techniques applied to keep structures dry by sealing the structure to keep floodwaters out
 - 500-year flood protection
 - Not permitted for residential structures



Mitigation Projects, Cont.

Flood Risk Reduction

- Designed to lessen the frequency of flooding or depth of flood water
 - Stormwater Diversion and Storage
 - Seawalls
 - Road Elevation





Secondary Power Source

- Increase power system resilience and mitigate the impacts of natural hazards while increasing the resilience of critical functions
 - Generators, batteries, diesel bypass pumps
 - Only for critical facilities and infrastructure



Mitigation Projects, Cont.

Infrastructure Retrofit

- Actions to increase the resilience and mitigate the impacts of natural hazards while increasing the resilience of critical functions
 - Intended to avoid utility disruptions and losses
 - Allows community to recover faster





Code Plus

- A wind retrofit project designed to exceed local codes and requirements to achieve a greater level of protection
 - Usually for new construction



Elevate Florida - State Residential Mitigation Program

- Florida's first Statewide Residential Mitigation Program
- Designed to enhance community resilience by mitigating private residences against natural hazards
- Coordinated and streamlined approach, removing burden from communities
- Brings structures into compliance with Florida Building Code and local ordinances
- Potential for reduced home and flood insurance premiums for participants
- Period of Performance: 1 year
- Cost Share: Residents responsible for up to 25% of total project cost

Funding

- Funding amount based upon 30-day estimates for HMGP funds
 - Will fluctuate until the 12-month lock in
- Counties receive HMGP allocation based on total disaster funding to county
 - Counties may elect to re-allocate a portion of funding back to Elevate Florida for projects in their communities

Office of Long-Term Resiliency

- □ FloridaCommerce is the governor-designated state authority responsible for administering all United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funds awarded to the state.
- The Office of Long-Term Resiliency (OLTR) supports communities following disasters by addressing long-term recovery needs for housing, infrastructure and economic development.
- □CDBG-DR funds are intended to be the funding of last resort for unmet needs after Federal Emergency Management Agency and insurance funding is exhausted. Funds are focused on the most vulnerable populations.

CDBG-DR National Objectives Requirements

□ To be eligible, a CDBG-DR activity must align with one of the three established national objectives:
 □ Benefit Low- and Moderate-Income (LMI) Individuals: This means the activity primarily helps individuals or households with low to moderate incomes. (Note: Federal requirement that 70 percent of funds be used for activities that benefit LMI persons)
 □ Duplication of Benefits:
 □ CDBG-DR recipients must ensure that individuals or entities receiving assistance are not getting duplicate aid from other disaster recovery programs for the same purpose.
 □ Disaster-related impact:
 □ All activities must be directly tied to the disaster and address the impacts within the most affected areas.

OLTR funding for Housing Programs

- ☐ The OLTR Housing Program is responsible for the direct implementation of disaster recovery housing programs for impacted Floridians.
- Housing Program accounts for an allocation of more than \$1.4 billion in CDBG-DR funds under the following Programs.


Funding by Allocation

Total Projects Completed by County








FloridaCommerce Calhoun Liberty Hospital Funding

- Calhoun Liberty Hospital (CLH) earned a placement on the list of Top 100 Critical Access Hospitals.
- Since Hurricane Michael left its devastating effects in 2018, the hospital has focused on growth and improvement.
- FloridaCommerce CDBG-DR funding (\$18.7 million) is a major part of allocations enabling CLH to entirely rebuild the hospital.
- Opening of their new facility is forecast for June of 2025.

CDBG-DR Funding Allocated to Communities Impacted by 23/24 Disasters

- On January 7, 2025, the State of Florida received more than \$925 million in funding to support longterm resiliency and mitigation efforts.
- Funds will support recovery from <u>Hurricane Helene</u>, <u>Hurricane Milton</u>, <u>Hurricane Idalia</u>, as well as other <u>2023 and 2024 eligible disasters</u>, which include storms and flooding.
- In addition to the funding announced for the State of Florida, more than \$3 billion was announced for 11 grantees throughout Florida in direct HUD funding that are all considered a HUD Entitlement Community.
