FLHSMV Fleet Overview



Increases in conventional purchase fleet vehicles must be authorized by the Legislature

The types of vehicles purchased are defined by the intended use and availability on state term contract.

Vehicles are designated to be replaced according to minimum age and mileage requirements established by DMS in FAC 60B.

Regarding damaged or disabled vehicles, evaluation of value vs cost to repair and cost to repair vs agency need.

DMS approval is required to dispose of and replace agency fleet vehicles.

Vehicle Disposition



Approximately 25-30 vehicles will be out of service for maintenance or repairs on any given date.



Units can be down for several reasons to include crashes (regardless of fault) or mechanical defect repairs.



Operational units are not placed out of service until the replacement arrives regardless of mileage.

Fleet Maintenance



Maintenance Costs:

- FY 19/20: \$18,673.193
- FY20/21: \$18,320,895

Figures include all operating costs:

- Fuel; crash repair (regardless of fault); mechanical repairs; maintenance; and tires.

Maintenance Cost Tracking:

- Wright Express (WEX) fleet expense program;
- FLAIR object codes;
- HSMV organization codes.

Local supervisors determine where repairs are done. Considerations include:

- unique need of the business unit including geography;
- ability to expedite service
- Warranty status and unique vehicle requirements, e.g. use of OEM parts

Contracts are in place for repair and replacement of upfitted law enforcement equipment.

- Does not include general vehicle repairs.

Statewide vehicle repair contracts have been piloted previously

- Previous pilots did not realize any operational or fiscal efficiencies.

Vehicle repairs are initiated at the local level and monitored centrally

- Repairs over \$2499 require approval from headquarters
- Helps ensure best cost and value to the state.

Vehicle Upfitting

Non-law enforcement vehicles are not outfitted.

Law enforcement vehicles are upfitted at the FHP's Central Install Facility in Middleburg.

Upfitting times vary by vehicle type:

Fuel and Repair Cards



Fuel and Maintenance Card program established in conjunction with Department of Management Services and Department of Financial Services

Use of cards governed by policy and training



Fuel cards assigned to vehicle

Purchases tracked by vehicle number, driver identification number and mileage.
Fuel, oil changes, batteries, windshield wipers, etc.



Driver Card assigned to supervisors

Used to pay for vehicle repairs under \$2,500 but over \$150



Office Card assigned to office managers

Used for fuel or maintenance of other gas-powered equipment (chainsaws, lawn mowers, generators)



All purchases monitored by Bureau of Accounting and Wright Express, and periodically reviewed by the Department's Inspector General.

Justification required when suspicious activity identified

- The FDC fleet would grow numerically if:
 - ✓ New FTE requiring additional vehicles are authorized.



Vehicle Disposition

- Generally, non-pursuit vehicles should either be 12 years old or have 120,000 miles prior to disposal.
- FDC sells operable vehicles at auction or sells as scrap if inoperable.
- From 2018 to 2020, FDC vehicle disposals were as follows:
 - ✓ Sold at auction - 24%
 - ✓ Sold as scrap metal - 76%

Vehicle Maintenance

- FDC Maintenance Expenditures
 - ✓ FY 19/20 - \$2,543,571 (excludes fuel)
 - ✓ FY 20/21 - \$2,531,820 (excludes fuel)
- FDC has 47 vehicle maintenance shops located at institutions throughout the State. Routine maintenance is performed at FDC shops by inmate vocational skills programming supervised by a maintenance mechanic or Correctional Officer. More difficult repairs beyond routine may be performed at an FDC facility if the skill set is available, otherwise a commercial vendor is used based on the best quote.
- FDC uses State vehicle contracted dealers for outfitting inmate transport vans. Both General Motors and Ford offer upfitting for commercial vehicles through their dealerships. This provides one-stop shopping for FDC, ensures accountability for the work and keeps warranties intact.
- FDC has an agency term contract for inmate transport buses which is inclusive of both the purchase and outfitting of the bus.



Fuel/Maintenance Card

- FDC utilizes the Wright Express Card (WEX Card) to purchase retail fuel and specific maintenance needs for state vehicles.
 - ✓ The WEX Card, by design, is limited in its functions by virtue of the retail outlets that accept the card. Within this self-imposed constraint, FDC provides the policies for employees on how to use the card.
 - ✓ Fleet staff within the FDC Office of Administration monitors WEX Card use daily and audits transactions monthly prior to authorizing payment of the invoice.
- FDC policy related to WEX is designed to maximize efficiency and rebates. Wright Express provides agencies a 1.70% rebate on all purchases. FDC's unique position related to its motor vehicle maintenance shops and bulk fuel purchases, provides for, and requires, flexibility when using the WEX Card.



FleetWave

- Employees within the various program areas of the Department as well as within the Office of Administration are responsible for data entry for vehicles. Data is input monthly. FDC's Office of Administration monitors all agency data for timeliness and accuracy.
- There are several required data fields within the FleetWave system. These fields include vehicle description information and vehicle maintenance data.
- FDC utilizes the following vehicle types:
 - ✓ Buses
 - ✓ Inmate transport vans (includes ADA)
 - ✓ Trucks
 - ✓ Sedans
 - ✓ Passenger/cargo vans
 - ✓ Utility trailers (various types)

Fleet Disposition and Utilization

Fleet Disposition

- Vehicles being repaired due to accidents, damage, or mechanical issues are considered “temporarily unusable” or “out of service”
- Vehicles at the end of service life, unable to be repaired, or too costly to repair are moved to a holding pool and DMS - Fleet Management is notified for disposal.
- Vehicle trade-in procedures comply with DMS - Fleet Management criteria based on minimum age, mileage, or hours.

Fleet Utilization

- The goal is to fully utilize all the fleet which reduces temporarily unusable fleet.
- The utilization criteria (miles driven or hours used) was established in 2013.
- Utilization reports are provided to the Fleet Managers monthly for review and adjustments to fleet management.



Fleet Maintenance

- Maintenance Expenditures -
 - FY 19-20 - **\$2.475M**
 - FY 20-21 - **\$2.067M**
- Most routine and periodic maintenance and repairs are made at 32 Department shops.
 - Commercial shops are used, based on best quote, when the work requires special tools or equipment or is beyond the skill set.
- Department shops typically outfit vehicles with light bars, wenchers, radios, first aid kits, fire extinguishers, toolboxes, service bodies, etc.



Fuel Cards

- Wright Express (WEX) fuel cards are used to purchase retail fuel, access bulk fuel, and perform emergency repairs.
- **Procedure 400-000-005** Fuel and Maintenance Card outlines the proper employee use and management of fuel cards.
 - This procedure is developed and updated by the Office of Maintenance in collaboration with the Districts.
- Fleet Managers monitor and audit fuel card data to identify any potential inappropriate use. The Office of Maintenance performs yearly Quality Assurance Reviews to ensure compliance with policies and procedures.
 - WEX fraud unit notifies the Fleet Managers if there are abnormal transactions.

PURPOSE:

FleetWave

- Shop Supervisors and Fleet Managers enter data into the fleet management system (FleetWave) when there is an activity or at least once per month for odometer readings.
- **Procedure 400-000-001** Mobile Equipment Manual outlines the responsibilities for data entry into the fleet management system and the management of the fleet. This procedure is developed and updated by the Office of Maintenance in collaboration with the Districts.
- Each District establishes a Quality Control Plan to ensure proper data entry and quality and fleet management. The Office of Maintenance performs yearly Quality Assurance Reviews to ensure compliance with policies and procedures.
- FleetWave has established required data entry fields such as vehicle identification number, type of vehicle, maintenance data, etc.

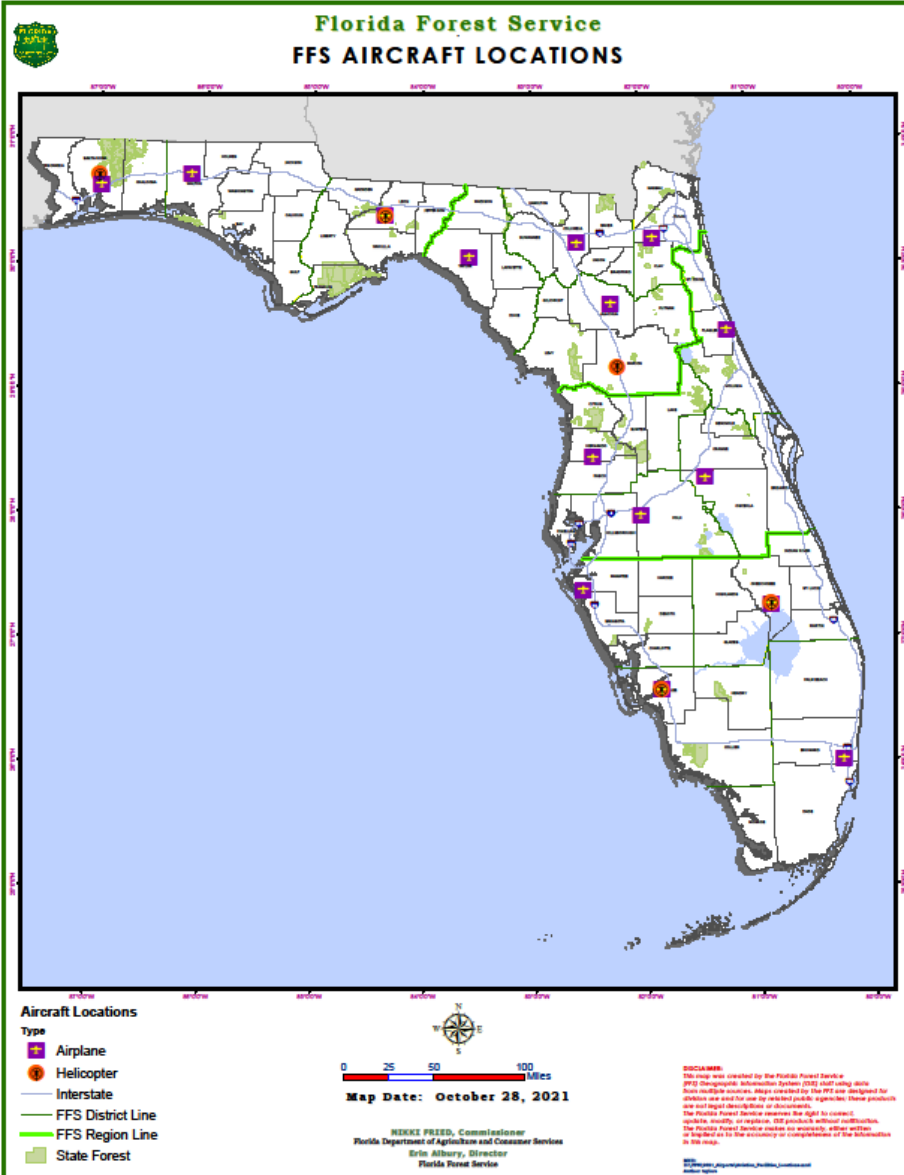
FLORIDA FOREST SERVICE

- 2000 Soft Track CME800 is a specialized low ground pressure track vehicle that operates in areas inaccessible to standard suppression equipment.





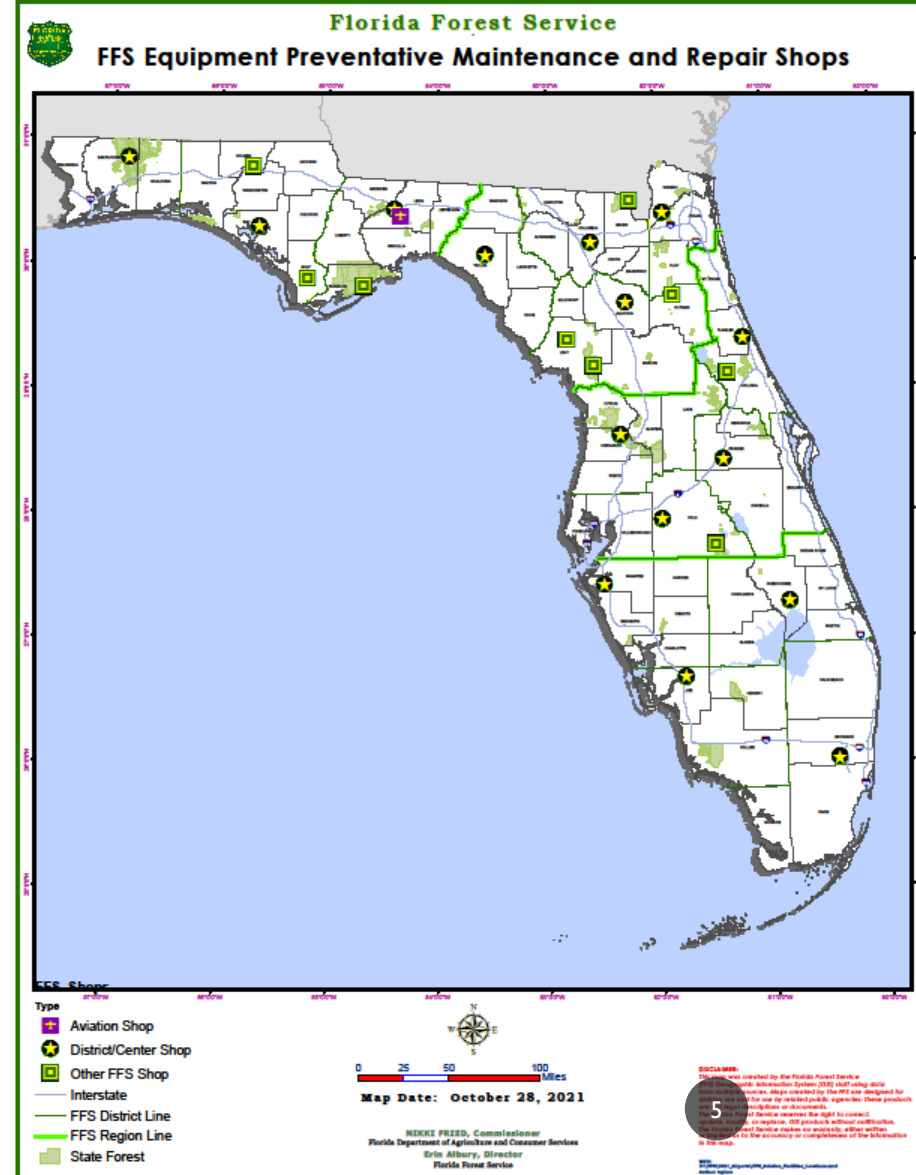
AIRCRAFT

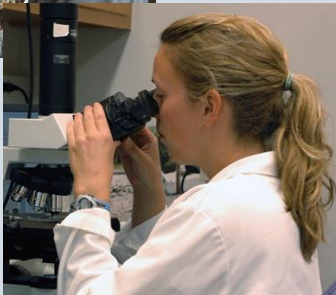

Fleet:

- 2,954 assets make up FWC's fleet: airboats, aircraft, ATVs, heavy equipment, vehicles, and vessels
- 1,899 assets are considered passenger, light, medium and heavy-duty vehicles
 - 943 of these assets are law enforcement vehicles

3 Year Vehicle Acquisitions Total: 441*

- FY 18/19 – 158
- FY 19/20 – 173
- FY 20/21 – 110

Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Fleet Management

Pool Vehicles:

- 483 pool vehicles at various locations around the state

- 16 vehicles are currently inoperable; these vehicles are at the end of their useful life and awaiting replacement

Disposition of Vehicles:

- DMS criteria is utilized (Minimum Equipment Replacement Criteria) in the determination for the disposal of a vehicle

2 Year Vehicle Maintenance Cost Total: \$1,769,571

- FY 19/20 – \$857,164
- FY 20/21 – \$912,407

Maintenance and Repairs:

- Costs are tracked in the DMS system FleetWave
- Maintenance and repairs are handled by local regions; price, location, and quality of service are factors in determining service providers

Vehicle Equipping:

- DLE's North Florida Shop staff provide all equipment rigging for law enforcement vehicles



Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Fuel Card Administration

Policies and Procedures:

- FWC's General Services Section develops and maintains internal policies and procedures on the appropriate use of the WEX state fuel card
- Monitoring for discrepancies is completed through monthly audit and review of equipment logs by management and accounting staff



Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission FleetWave

FleetWave Date Entry:

- FWC's General Services Section administers the input of information for new acquisitions; the asset custodian or their designee input monthly data for fuel, maintenance and repair usage
- FWC's General Services Section monitors for timeliness and accuracy of asset information
