I. Summary:

SB 1508 substantially revises chapter 333, F.S., containing airport zoning provisions relating to the management of airspace and land use at or near airports. Generally, the bill:

- Updates statutory definitions and terms in accordance with federal regulations.
- Streamlines the current local airport protection zoning process to a simpler permitting model.
- Provides local governments the flexibility to structure and incorporate the airport protection zoning review process into existing local zoning review processes and repeals duplicative requirements for a variance process.
- Makes other grammatical, editorial, and conforming changes.

The bill is expected to present an indeterminate but positive fiscal impact resulting from simplification and streamlining of the state and local processes. See Section V.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2016.

II. Present Situation:

Due to the extensive chapter revision, the present situation for each section of the bill is discussed below in conjunction with the Effect of Proposed Changes.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Airport Zoning

Chapter 333, Florida Statutes, contains airport zoning provisions relating to the management of airspace and land use at or near airports. Generally, the chapter:

- Addresses permitting for structures exceeding federal obstruction standards;
- Requires adoption of certain airport zoning regulations;

- Provides a process for seeking variances from the zoning regulations;
- Sets out a process for appeal of decisions based on the zoning regulations;
- Requires boards of adjustment to hear and decide appeals;
- Provides for judicial review of any board of adjustment decision; and
- Establishes penalties and remedies for violations.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) in 2012 created a stakeholder working group to address problems with implementing this chapter. Representatives from airports, local planning and zoning departments, the Florida Defense Alliance, the League of Cities, the Florida Airports Council, the real estate development community, and the FDOT participated in the working group. The FDOT advises that ch. 333, F.S., "contains outdated and inconsistent provisions when compared to applicable federal regulations, contains internal inconsistencies, and requires a local government airport protection zoning process that can be cumbersome and confusing."

The FDOT advises it expects no substantive changes as a result of the bill's proposed revisions; e.g., the existing requirements for issuance of permits are substantively unchanged. The number of permits issued or denied is not expected to change. Rather, the changes are designed to facilitate more uniform permitting, appeals, and review processes applied at the local level and provide clarity and predictability for those subject to airport zoning regulations.²

Definitions

Present Situation

Section 333.01, F.S., contains definitions related to airport zoning that need updating for internal chapter consistency and for consistency with federal regulations.

Effect of Proposed Changes

Section 1 amends s. 333.01, F.S., to provide, revise, and delete definitions to:

- Reflect terminology used in federal regulations;
- Provide for consistency with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) advisements;
- Remove antiquated terminology;
- Delete variances from definitions to reflect the streamlined permitting process effected in the bill: and
- Otherwise provide clarity through editorial and grammatical changes.

Permitting for Structures Exceeding Federal Obstruction Standards

Present Situation

The Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) sets forth standards for structures that present a hazard within an area in an airport due to obstruction of the airspace required for aircraft to take off,

maneuver, or land.³ Section 333.025, F.S., requires a permit from the FDOT for any proposed construction or alteration of a structure that would exceed the federal standards.⁴ A permit from the FDOT is not required if a political subdivision⁵ has adopted adequate airspace protection regulations and filed them with the FDOT.

The FDOT must issue or deny a permit within 30 days of receipt of an application for any structure that would exceed the federal obstruction standards. The FDOT is prohibited from approving a permit unless the applicant submits both documentation showing compliance with federal notification requirements and a valid aeronautical evaluation.

Effect of Proposed Changes

Section 2 amends s. 333.025, F.S., to replace the term "geographic center" with "airport reference point," which is located at the approximate geometric center of all usable runways and to update references to current federal regulations.

If a political subdivision has adopted adequate airport protection zoning regulations, placed the regulations on file with the FDOT, *and* the political subdivision has established a permitting process, a permit from the FDOT is not required for construction or alteration of an obstruction. Upon receipt of a complete permit application, the local government must provide a copy of the application to the FDOT. The bill provides a 15-day FDOT review period following receipt of the application, which must run concurrently with the established local permitting process.

The FDOT is required to review permit applications in conformity with s. 120.60, F.S., relating to licensing. The list of factors to be considered by the FDOT is revised to remove ambiguity and duplication, and to provide clarity. The FDOT must require the owner of a permitted obstruction to install, operate, and maintain marking and lighting in conformance with FAA standards, at the owner's expense. The denial of a permit is subjected to the administrative review provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act.

Adoption of Airport Zoning Regulations

Present Situation

Section 333.03, F.S., requires political subdivisions with an airport hazard area⁶ to adopt, administer, and enforce airport zoning regulations for the area. If the airport is owned or controlled by a political subdivision and has a hazard area outside of its territorial limits, the political subdivision and the political subdivision within which the hazard area is located must either adopt zoning regulations by interlocal agreement or create a joint airport zoning board with the power to do so. The airport zoning regulations must, at a minimum, require:

• A variance for any structure that would exceed the federal obstruction standards;

- Obstruction marking and lighting per s. 333.07(3);
- Documentation of compliance with federal proposed construction notification and a valid aeronautical evaluation submitted by each person applying for a variance;
- Consideration of the same factors when determining whether to issue or deny a variance as required of the FDOT when considering permit applications; and
- No variance be approved solely on the basis that a structure will not exceed the federal obstruction standards.

The FDOT is required to issue copies of the federal obstruction standards in the CFR to each political subdivision with an airport hazard area, and issue certain airport zoning maps at no cost.

Interim land use compatibility zoning regulations must be adopted and must consider whether sanitary landfills are located within certain areas and whether any landfill will attract or sustain hazardous bird movements. If a public-use airport has conducted a federal noise study, residential construction and educational facilities are prohibited within the area. If no study is conducted, the same construction is prohibited within a certain distance.

Airport zoning regulations restricting new incompatible uses within runway clear zones must be adopted. Certain limited exceptions for construction of educational facilities in specified areas are authorized.

Effect of Proposed Changes

Section 3 amends s. 333.03, F.S., to eliminate the duplicative requirement for obtaining a variance for structures that would exceed federal obstruction standards, in favor of a local permitting process. Every political subdivision having an airport hazard area is required to adopt airport *protection* zoning regulations. In addition to editorial and grammatical revisions, this section revises language to:

- Replace citations to the federal obstruction standards contained in the CFR with terminology used in the CFR; *i.e.*, permits for the "construction or alteration of any obstruction."
- Remove the FDOT's duty to provide copies of the federal obstruction standards contained in the CFR and to issue maps, and replace it with making the FDOT available to provide assistance with respect to the standards.
- Update citations to the CFR.
- Eliminate the reporting requirements related to birds at airports near landfills in favor of requiring the landfill operator to incorporate bird management techniques.
- Include substantial modification of existing incompatible uses in the required adopted regulations restricting such uses within runway *protection* zones.
- Remove the limited exceptions for construction of educational facilities when a noise study has been conducted in accordance with the federal regulations;
- Delete outdated language.
- Authorize an airport authority, local government, or other governing body operating a publicuse airport to adopt more restrictive airport protection zoning regulations, per the FDOT, to allow restrictions appropriate to the local context of the airport.⁷

Guidelines Regarding Land Use Near Airports

Present Situation

Section 333.065, F.S., requires the FDOT, after consultation with the Department of Economic Opportunity, local governments, and other interested persons, to adopt by rule recommended guidelines regarding compatible land uses in the vicinity of airports. The guidelines must use certain acceptable and established quantitative measures.

Effect of Proposed Changes

Section 7 repeals s. 333.065, F.S. The FDOT advises the deletion reflects completion of the FDOT's Airport Compatible Land Use Guidebook.⁸

Permits, Variances, and Appeals

Present Situation

Section 333.07, F.S., authorizes any adopted airport zoning regulations to require a permit be obtained before any new structure or use is constructed or established and before any existing use or structure may be substantially changed or repaired. All such regulations must require a permit before any nonconforming structure or tree may be replaced, substantially altered or repaired, rebuilt, allowed to grow higher, or replanted.

If a nonconforming use, structure, or tree has been abandoned or is more than 80 percent torn down or deteriorated, a permit may not be issued under certain conditions. The owner of a nonconforming structure or tree may be compelled, at the owner's expense, to undergo certain actions to conform.

Any person desiring to erect any structure, increase the height of any structure, permit the growth of any tree, or otherwise use his or her property in violation of the adopted airport zoning regulations is authorized to apply to a board of adjustment for a variance from the regulations. Conditions for allowance of variations are provided. The FDOT is authorized to appeal any variance granted and to apply for judicial relief.

As a condition of any granted permit or variance, the administrative agency or board of adjustment must require the structure or tree owner to install, operate, and maintain at the owner's expense marking and lighting necessary to indicate to aircraft pilots the presence of an obstruction.

Section 333.08, F.S., authorizes any affected person or taxpayer; or any governing body of a political subdivision, the FDOT, or any joint airport zoning board, to appeal any decision of an administrative agency in its administration of adopted airport zoning regulations to the board of adjustment authorized to hear and decide appeals from the decisions of such administrative agency.

Effect of Proposed Changes

Section 8 amends s. 333.07, F.S., to streamline the permitting process, repeal the duplicative variance process, and facilitate implementation of the permitting process by local entities. More specifically, rather than authorizing any adopted airport zoning regulations to require a permit be obtained before any new structure or use is constructed or established and before any existing use or structure may be substantially changed or repaired, the bill simply requires a permit to construct, alter, or allow an airport obstruction in an airport hazard area in violation of the adopted airport protection zoning regulations.

The political subdivision or its administrative agency must consider virtually the same standards as must be considered by the FDOT when issuing or denying a permit for structures exceeding federal obstruction standards. All variance provisions are removed in favor of the permitting process. In addition, provisions relating to a lien resulting from an owner's failure to take action to bring a nonconforming structure or tree into regulatory compliance are removed. The FDOT's 45-day comment period is removed in favor of the shortened 15-day period of review for technical consistency described above. Obstruction marking and lighting is required in conformance with specific standards established by the FAA. Outdated language is repealed.

Section 9 repeals s. 333.08, F.S., authorizing and providing requirements for appeals of zoning regulation decisions, in favor of relocated, modified appeals language in s. 333.09, F.S.

Administration of Airport Zoning Regulations

Present Situation

Section 333.09, F.S., requires all adopted airport zoning regulations to provide for administration and enforcement by an administrative agency; by any official, board, or other existing agency of the political subdivision adopting the regulations; or by one of the subdivisions that participated in creating a joint airport zoning board adopting the regulations. The duties of any such administrative agency include hearing and deciding all permits under s. 333.07, F.S., but not any of the powers delegated to the board of adjustment.

Section 333.10, F.S., currently requires all adopted airport zoning regulations to provide for a board of adjustment to hear and decide appeals and variances.

Effect of Proposed Changes

Section 10 amends s. 333.09, F.S., to remove the list of entities that may be an administrative agency, per the FDOT, to reflect correct community planning terminology. Administration and enforcement is left to the affected political subdivision or its administrative agency. Also removed is the prohibition against an administrative agency exercising the powers delegated to the board of adjustment.

Political subdivisions required to adopt airport zoning regulations must establish a process to:

- Issue or deny permits consistent with s. 333.07, F.S.;
- Provide the FDOT with a copy of a complete permit application; and
- Enforce the issuance or denial of a permit or other determination made by the administrative agency with respect to airport zoning regulations.

Appeals must be taken within a reasonable time provided by the political subdivision or its administrative agency by filing a notice of appeal. An appeal stays all proceedings in the underlying action, unless the entity from which the appeal is taken certifies that a stay would cause imminent peril to life or property.

The political subdivision or its administrative agency must set a reasonable time for the hearing of appeals and decide appeals within a reasonable time. A party may appear in person, by agent, or by attorney. The subdivision or agency may affirm, reverse, or modify the decision on the permit or other determination from which the appeal is taken.

Section 11 repeals s. 333.10, F.S., currently requiring all adopted airport zoning regulations to provide for a board of adjustment to hear and decide appeals and variances, in favor of the local government permitting and appeals process established by the bill in revised s. 333.09, F.S.

Judicial Review

Present Situation

Section 333.11, F.S., authorizes any person aggrieved or any taxpayer affected by a decision of a board of adjustment, any governing body of a political subdivision, the FDOT, any joint airport zoning board, or any administrative agency to apply for judicial relief in the judicial circuit court where the board of adjustment is located. The section provides procedural provisions related to the board of adjustment, describes the court's authorized review of a decision by a board of adjustment, and prohibits judicial review in provisions related to a board of adjustment.

Effect of Proposed Changes

Section 12 amends s. 333.11, F.S., to allow any person, political subdivision, or joint airport zoning board affected by a decision of a political subdivision or its administrative agency to apply for judicial relief and to remove references to the board of adjustment, but otherwise leaves the authorization to apply for judicial review in place. The judicial review prohibition is revised. An appellant is required to exhaust all remedies through application for local government permits, exceptions, and appeals before seeking judicial review.

Transition Provisions

Section 15 of the bill creates s. 333.135, F.S., to:

• Provide that any airport zoning regulation in effect on July 1, 2016, and in conflict with the revised ch. 333, F.S., must be amended to conform by July 1, 2017.

- Require any political subdivision with an airport that has not adopted airport zoning regulations to do so by July 1, 2017, consistent with the revised chapter.
- Require the FDOT to administer the permitting process as provided in s. 333.025, F.S., for political subdivisions that have not yet adopted the required regulations.

Technical Revisions

Sections 4, 5, 6, 13, and 14, amending ss. 333.04, 333.05, 333.06, 333.12, and 333.13, F.S., respectively, primarily make grammatical and editorial revisions to existing language and modify sections of the chapter for internal consistency with definitions.

Section 16 repeals s. 333.14, F.S., containing the short title of chapter 333, F.S., the "Airport Zoning Law of 1945."

V. Fiscal Impact Statement:

B. Private Sector Impact:

According to the FDOT, property owners near airports and property development businesses should benefit from a more timely, consistent, and predictable land development process. The re-write is intended to save property owners and businesses time and resources, while protecting the airspace and state aviation facilities from encroachment.¹⁰

C. Government Sector Impact:

According to the FDOT, by restructuring the local government process away from zoning variances to local permitting, uniformity with state permitting provisions is facilitated and local governments are granted flexibility to implement the bill's provisions consistent with existing local zoning enforcement processes and structures.¹¹

VI. Technical Deficiencies:

The FDOT notes the following technical deficiencies:

- Insertion of the word "protection" on line 324 is inappropriate, as the requirement to adopt airport zoning regulations includes both airport protection zoning regulations and land use compatibility zoning regulations. "Airport zoning regulations" is the generic term that includes both protection and land use zoning. The word "protection" in the title of s. 333.03, F.S., could cause confusion and should be removed.
- In addition, with respect to the revisions on lines 333 through 337, the FDOT again notes technical inaccuracy. Obstructions are not constructed or altered under 14 C.F.R. Part 77. That part governs creation of airport surfaces.

The FDOT suggests the following technical amendment:

Strike lines 324 through 342 and insert:

- 333.03 Requirement Power to adopt airport zoning regulations.—
- (1)(a) In order to prevent the creation or establishment of airport hazards, Every political subdivision having an airport hazard area within its territorial limits shall, by October 1, 1977, adopt, administer, and enforce, under the police power and in the manner and upon the conditions hereinafter prescribed in this section, airport protection zoning regulations for such airport hazard area.
- (b) If Where an airport is owned or controlled by a political subdivision and any other political subdivision has land, upon which an obstruction may be constructed or altered, underlying any of the 14 C.F.R. Part 77, subpart C surfaces of the airport, the political subdivision airport hazard area appertaining to such airport is located wholly or partly outside the territorial limits of said political subdivision, the political subdivision owning or controlling the airport and the political subdivision within which the airport hazard area is located, shall either:

I. **Summary:**

PCS/SB 114 creates 29 honorary designations of transportation facilities around the state and directs the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to erect suitable markers designating the transportation facilities. It also amends two previously enacted designations.

The expected fiscal impact is \$31,000.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2016.

II. **Present Situation:**

Section 334.071, F.S., provides that legislative designations of transportation facilities are for honorary or memorial purposes, or to distinguish a particular facility. Such designations are not to be construed as requiring any action by local governments or private parties regarding the changing of any street signs, mailing addresses, or 911 emergency telephone number system listings, unless the legislation specifically provides for such changes.¹

When the Legislature establishes road or bridge designations, the FDOT is required to place markers only at the termini specified for each highway segment or bridge designated by the law creating the designation, and to erect any other markers it deems appropriate for the transportation facility.²

The FDOT may not erect the markers for honorary road or bridge designations unless the affected city or county commission enacts a resolution supporting the designation. When the designated road or bridge segment is located in more than one city or county, resolutions

supporting the designations must be passed by each affected local government prior to the erection of the markers.³

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill creates 29 honorary transportation facility designations around the state and amends two previously enacted designations.

Section 1 of the bill creates the following designations:

Private First Class Joey Moody Bridge

Upon completion of replacement construction, bridge number 380096 on U.S. 221/S.R. 55 over the Econfina River in Taylor County is designated as "Private First Class Joey Moody Bridge."

Private First Class Joey Moody grew upon in Shady Grove on the Econfina River. He attended Shady Grove Grammar School and graduated from Taylor County High School before attending the University of Florida. On June 21, 1952, PFC Moody, serving in Korea, was one of three men sent into enemy fire to repair a crucial communications line and lost his life when a mortar round exploded. He was posthumously awarded the National Defense Medal, the Korean Combat Medal, the Korean Battle Medal, and the Purple Heart.

Corporal Joseph R. Bertrand Memorial Highway

The portion of S.R. 80 between Hickey Creek Road and Carter Lane in Lee County is designated as "Corporal Joseph R. Bertrand Memorial Highway."

Corporal Joseph R. Bertrand was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol who served the citizens of the State of Florida for 16 years. On December 22, 1967, Corporal Bertrand was shot and killed while conducting a driving-under-the-influence investigation on State Road 80 in Fort Myers.

Lieutenant Benedict J. Thomas Memorial Highway

The portion of Interstate 75/S.R. 93A between Fowler Avenue and Fletcher Avenue in Hillsborough County is designated as "Lieutenant Benedict J. Thomas Memorial Highway."

Lieutenant Benedict J. Thomas was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol who served the citizens of the State of Florida for 11 years. On June 9, 1989, Lieutenant Thomas was struck and killed by a passing car while walking back to his vehicle after investigating an abandoned vehicle on Interstate 75 in Tampa.

Trooper Patrick Ambroise Memorial Highway

The portion of the Homestead Extension of the Florida Turnpike/S.R. 821 between mile marker 34 and mile marker 36 in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Trooper Patrick Ambroise Memorial Highway."

Trooper Patrick Ambroise was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol who served the citizens of the State of Florida for four years. On May 15, 2010, while parked in his patrol vehicle on the shoulder of northbound State Road 821, a passing vehicle veered onto the paved emergency shoulder and struck the left rear section of the patrol vehicle, killing Trooper Ambroise.

SP4 Robert Clifford Millender Memorial Highway

The portion of U.S. 98/S.R.30 between Ryan Drive/W. 11th Street and N.E./S.E. 12th Street in Franklin County is designated as "SP4 Robert Clifford Millender Memorial Highway."

SP4 Robert Clifford Millender was inducted into the United States Army on August 7, 1968. After boot camp training, he was transferred to Vietnam, where he served for two months before being injured in a land mine explosion. He was returned to Walter Reed General Hospital and discharged from the Army on July 22, 1969. SP4 Millender died of his war-related injuries on January 14, 1970. He received the Purple Heart, the National Defense Service Medal, and the Vietnam Service Medal.

Lauren F. Book Boulevard

The portion of U.S. 1/S.R. 5/North Federal Highway between S.R. 842/Broward Boulevard and S.R. 838/Sunrise Boulevard in Broward County is designated as "Lauren F. Book Boulevard."

Lauren F. Book is the founder and Chief Executive Officer of Lauren's Kids. Lauren's Kids educates adults and children about sexual abuse prevention through in-school curricula, awareness campaigns, and speaking engagements around the country and the world. The organization also leads an annual, statewide awareness walk, called "Walk in My Shoes," and provides more than seven million education and awareness materials statewide through direct mail every year.

C.K. Steele Memorial Highway

The portion of S.R. 371/373/Orange Avenue between S.R. 263/Capital Circle and S.R. 61/Monroe Street in Leon County is designated as "C.K. Steele Memorial Highway."

In 1956, 38 year-old C.K. Steele moved to Tallahassee where he served as minister at the Bethel Baptist Church until his death in 1980. He organized a bus boycott in Tallahassee in 1956 after two black college students were arrested for sitting in the "whites only" section of a city bus, successfully integrating bus service in the community. He also worked to integrate Tallahassee's schools, restaurants, theaters, and other public facilities. He became a national figure in the civil rights movement, helping to organize the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and serving

as its vice-president. He participated in many national civil rights protests, including the famous march in Selma, Alabama.

Danny A. Pino Way

The portion of U.S. 90/S.R. 10 between N. Woodward Avenue and Wadsworth Street in Leon County is designated as "Danny A. Pino Way."

Danny A. Pino was born in Miami-Dade County in 1995 and aspired to serving his country and becoming a professional baseball player. After playing baseball for the United States Merchant Marine Academy, Danny returned home to study at Florida International University, where he joined the ROTC and received his uniform on September 11, 2014. Danny was struck by a car while visiting Tallahassee and passed away on September 28, 2014. His final act was the donation of his organs to two boys, ages 7 and 12, and a 63-year-old man.

Emmitt G. Coakley Memorial Highway

The portion of U.S. 1/S.R. 15 between 5th Avenue and C.R. 108 in Nassau County is designated as "Emmitt G. Coakley Memorial Highway."

Emmitt G. Coakley was a teacher, mentor, and principal in Nassau who retired after 30 years of service. He returned as a substitute teacher for an additional 23 years. He served his community in many ways, including 30 years on the Nassau County Planning and Zoning Board and nine years on the Conditional Use and Variance Board. He was an active member of the Retired Teachers' Association of Nassau County, Chairman of the Deacon Ministry of Second Baptist Church, and served his country as a member of the United States Army.

Potter's Field Memorial Highway

The portion of Interstate 95/S.R. 9 between West Broward Boulevard/S.R. 842 and West Sunrise Boulevard/S.R. 838 in Broward County is designated as "Potter's Field Memorial Highway."

In May of 2015, a news article reported at least 65 bodies buried beside Interstate 95 near Sunrise Boulevard in Broward County and that some unmarked graves may have been paved over when the highway was originally built.⁴ The article reports in part:

The graves are in a potter's field that was part of the five-acre Woodlawn Cemetery, established in the 1920s because blacks during segregation were not allowed to bury their loved ones in the main cemeteries.

The state now owns some of that land, which it uses as a right-of-way for the highway. Only a chain-link fence separates the neglected, decaying markers from the road.

The cemetery is eligible for listing with the National Register of Historic Places.

The article quotes a county commissioner: "We need to ensure that there is some memorialization of what is there, a historic site that means a lot to a lot of people."

Purple Heart Trail

The portion of S.R. 60 between the Hillsborough County line and Mandalay Avenue in Pinellas County is designated as "Purple Heart Trail."

The purpose of the Purple Heart Trail, according to the Purple Heart website, "is to create a symbolic and honorary system of roads, highways, bridges, and other monuments that give tribute to the men and women who have been awarded the Purple Heart medal. ... Signs placed at various locations annotate those roads and highways where legislation has been passed to designate parts of the national road system as The Purple Heart Trail.⁵

Elizabeth Inez and Elijah Davis Highway

The portion of S.R. 35/N.E. 58th Avenue between C.R. 314/N.E. 7th Street and S.E. 20th Street in Marion County is designated as "Elizabeth Inez and Elijah Davis Highway."

Elizabeth Inez Davis was a devoted children's advocate and community leader in the Ocala area. She founded the Mount Canaan Community Youth Center. Ms. Davis passed away on December 6, 2002. Elijah Davis volunteered for over 60 years at the Mount Canaan Community Youth Center and still volunteers at the age of 102.⁶

Mary Ellen Hawkins Street

The portion of Golden Gate Parkway between U.S. 41/S.R. 45/Tamiami Trail and C.R. 851 in Collier County is designated as "Mary Ellen Hawkins Street."

Mary Ellen Hawkins was Collier County's first female state representative. She served in the Florida House of Representatives from 1974 to 1994 and subsequently remained active in promoting and improving her community.

Col. William W. Wood Memorial Highway

The portion of S.R. 368 between U.S. 98/S.R. 30 and S.R. 390 in Bay County is designated as "Col. William W. Wood Memorial Highway."

Col. William W. Wood was a regular United States Army Soldier assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 184th Infantry Regiment. He was a Lt. Colonel while directing security operations following an explosion when another bomb went off in Baghdad, Iraq. He died on October 27, 2005, leaving his wife and daughter, and was posthumously promoted to Colonel.

Deputy Scott Pine Way

The portion of C.R. 435/Apopka Vineland Road between Old Winter Garden Road and C.R. 439/Conroy-Windermere Road in Orange County is designated as "Deputy Scott Pine Way."

Deputy Scott Pine took his oath as Deputy Sheriff on May 23, 2011, promising to protect and defend the citizens of Orange County. He received the Deputy of the Month in 2014 and was encouraged to assist and mentor new assigned deputies. On February 11, 2014, Deputy Pine was working patrol on the midnight shift when he responded to a call of vehicle burglary. Upon arrival at the scene, Deputy Pine gave chase to a suspect, and the suspect shot Deputy Pine. He succumbed to his injuries, leaving his wife and three young children.

Pat Frank Road

The portion of East Street between East Twiggs Street and U.S. 41B/S.R. 60/East Kennedy Boulevard in Hillsborough County is designated as "Pat Frank Road."

A former chair of the Hillsborough County Board of County Commissioners, and, currently, the Hillsborough County Clerk of the Circuit Court, Pat Frank is noted for her distinguished career in public service. Starting with her election to the Hillsborough County School Board – which she later chaired – voters then sent her to the Florida House of Representatives, followed by the Florida Senate for a decade. Lauded for her legislative service, she was the first woman to receive recognition as a House "Most Effective First Term Member" and, later, as "Most Respected Senator," and has received over 50 awards for her public service and volunteer activities.

Sandra Warshaw Freedman Street

The portion of N. Franklin Street between East Twiggs Street and U.S. 41B/S.R. 60/East Kennedy Boulevard in Hillsborough County is designated as "Sandra Warshaw Freedman Street."

On July 16, 1986, Sandra Warshaw Freedman became Tampa's first woman mayor and broke a glass ceiling by appointing many minorities and women to top management positions in city government. She also organized Tampa's first march against hate crimes and banned city employees from using racist, sexist, and religious slurs.

Helen Gordon Davis Boulevard

The portion of Davis Boulevard between Adalia Avenue and Adriatic Avenue in Hillsborough County is designated as "Helen Gordon Davis Boulevard."

Helen Gordon Davis was born in New York City and moved to Tampa in 1948. In 1952, she was the first white woman in Florida to join the NAACP. Ms. Davis founded Florida's first women's center in 1971, and in 1974, she was the first woman elected from Hillsborough County to the Florida House of Representatives. She was reelected for six consecutive terms and, in 1988, was

elected to the Florida Senate. Ms. Davis served as a Florida legislator for almost two decades and she championed the civil rights of women and minorities.

Francisco Rodriguez Avenue

The portion of North Willow Avenue between West Cypress Street and West Cass Street in Hillsborough County is designated is designated as "Francisco Rodriguez Avenue."

The son of a Cuban cigar maker, Francisco Rodriguez was a key organizer in the Civil Rights Movement in the late 1950's. Prior to becoming a prominent civil rights attorney, Mr. Rodriguez was a school teacher and a U.S. Marine, barred from officer training because of his skin color (though he still applied). He later became a leader with the NAACP and led the fight in the courts to end segregation in Hillsborough County's schools, parks, and other public facilities.

Olympian Theresa Manuel Way

The portion of N. Garcia Avenue between W. Palm Avenue and W. Ross Avenue in Hillsborough County is designated as "Olympian Theresa Manuel Way."

Theresa Manuel was a National AAU Junior 80-meter hurdles champion and was a member of the Junior 400-meter relay team that won the championship. She held the National AAU Senior 50-meter hurdles championship in which she set a new indoor record in Chicago on April 24, 1948. She was a member of the United States 1948 Olympic Team.

Vyrle Davis Avenue

The portion of U.S. 19A/S.R. 595/5th Avenue North between 25th Street North and 28th Street North in Pinellas County is designated as "Vyrle Davis Avenue."

Vyrle Davis was St. Petersburg High School's first black principal, later becoming the county's first black area superintendent. He founded the Ebony Scholars program in 1984, which has awarded high-achieving black students more than \$500,000 in scholarships. He founded COQUEB and AVEREC, which advocate for quality education of black students and voter education, respectively.

Trooper Patrick Ambroise Memorial Highway

The portion of the Homestead Extension of the Florida Turnpike/S.R. 821 between mile marker 34 and mile marker 36 in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Trooper Patrick Ambroise Memorial Highway."

Trooper Patrick Ambroise was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol who served the citizens of the State of Florida for four years. On May 15, 2010, while parked in his patrol vehicle on the shoulder of northbound State Road 821, a passing vehicle veered onto the paved emergency shoulder and struck the left rear section of the patrol vehicle, killing Trooper Ambroise.

Lee Klein Way

The portion of S.R. 973/87th Avenue between S.R. 94/Kendall Drive and S.W. 92nd Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Lee Klein Way."

Lee Klein began her career as a volunteer charity worker for children's causes in 1956 and, in 1965, founded what is now known as the Children's Cancer Caring Center. Ms. Klein serves as the Chief Executive Officer, Chairman of the Board, and as Patient Program Director of the Center. She has received numerous awards for her work on behalf of children with cancer.

Sergeant Marvin L. Roberts Memorial Highway

The portion of S.R. 19 between S.R. 50 and C.R. 478/Cherry Lake Road in Lake County is designated as "Sergeant Marvin L. Roberts Memorial Highway.

Sergeant Roberts graduated in 1942 from Groveland High School in Groveland, Florida. He married his high school sweetheart before enlisting in the U.S. Army in February 1943. He lost his life fighting in the Battle of the Bulge on January 15, 1945. He was honored, among other recognitions, with the Invasion Bronze Arrow-Head, Bronze Star, two Presidential Unit Citations, and the Purple Heart.

John Jacob 'JJ' Curry Memorial Highway

The portion of U.S. 17/S.R. 15 between Golden Hills Boulevard and Lake Winona Road in Volusia County is designated as "John Jacob 'JJ' Curry Memorial Highway."

John Jacob "JJ" Curry was a 30-year old firefighter in Volusia County, having received his Emergency Medical Technician certified in March of 2006 and completing his Certificate of Compliance in Fire Standards and Training in September of 2006. Firefighters were practicing with chainsaws on November 27, 2007, when a tree fell on him. Emergency responders were unable to save him. Married and the father of two, he had been a member of the fire department for just ten months.

Nona and Popa Road

The portion of the San Juan Street Extension in Anastasia State Park between Santander Street and Park Road in St. John County is designated as "Nona and Popa Road."

This designation is in honor of all grandmothers and grandfathers who take grandchildren to state parks.

Irene U. Hooper Memorial Bridges

The pair of bridges (Nos. 900110 and 900111) over Pine Channel on U.S. 1/S.R. 5 in Monroe County are designated as the "Irene U. Hooper Memorial Bridges."

In 1966, Irene U. Hooper began her life-long leadership and service developing "Seacamp," a year round, non-profit marine science camp and educational facility located on Big Pine Key.

Today, campers 12 – 17 years old continue to enjoy numerous activities in marine science education. From 1968 to 1971, she successfully spearheaded the effort to earn Aquatic Preserve designation for Coupon Bight in the Florida Keys. Over the years, her leadership and service earned her numerous recognitions, including but not limited to, the national Take Pride in America Award in 1986, the Florida Governor's Environmental Education Award in 1993, the League of Environmental Educators in Florida Founders Award for Education Leadership in 1996.

Stanley G. Tate Boulevard

The portion of S.R. 922 from N.E. 10th Avenue east to the North Miami city limits in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Stanley G. Tate Boulevard."

Stanley G. Tate has been a North Miami business owner for over 30 years. He has been actively involved in both civic and charitable organizations and devoted extensive time to service on various boards and organizations. He has been honored multiple times for his service, including the Arete Award for Volunteer Advocate of the Year.

Robert L. Shevin Memorial Boulevard

The portion of Miami Avenue between N.E. 5th Street and U.S. 41/S.R. 90/S.E. 7th Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Robert L. Shevin Memorial Boulevard."

Robert L. Shevin was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 1964 and served in the Florida Senate from 1966 to 1970. He served as Florida's Attorney General from 1971-1979. In 1996, Governor Lawton Chiles appointed him to the Third District Court of Appeal, where he served with distinction until early 2005. He passed away on July 11, 2005.

The bill directs the FDOT to erect suitable markers for each of the described designations.

Section 2 of the bill revises a previously enacted designation, the "Broad Causeway" in Miami-Dade County, to the "Shepard Broad Causeway." The Broad Causeway was designated in honor of Shepard Broad, the founder of Bay Harbor Islands. The Town of Bay Harbor Islands and the Miami-Dade County Commission have requested the designation be revised to reflect his full name.

Section 3 of the bill also revises a previously enacted designation, "Larcenia Bullard Way," to "Senator Larcenia J. Bullard Way," in honor of the late Senator Bullard.

The bill takes effect on July 1, 2016.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

I. Summary:

CS/SB 114 creates 32 honorary designations of transportation facilities around the state and directs the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to erect suitable markers designating the transportation facilities. It also amends two previously enacted designations.

The expected fiscal impact is \$34,000.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2016.

II. Present Situation:

Section 334.071, F.S., provides that legislative designations of transportation facilities are for honorary or memorial purposes, or to distinguish a particular facility. Such designations are not to be construed as requiring any action by local governments or private parties regarding the changing of any street signs, mailing addresses, or 911 emergency telephone number system listings, unless the legislation specifically provides for such changes.¹

When the Legislature establishes road or bridge designations, the FDOT is required to place markers only at the termini specified for each highway segment or bridge designated by the law creating the designation, and to erect any other markers it deems appropriate for the transportation facility.²

The FDOT may not erect the markers for honorary road or bridge designations unless the affected city or county commission enacts a resolution supporting the designation. When the designated road or bridge segment is located in more than one city or county, resolutions supporting the designations must be passed by each affected local government prior to the erection of the markers.³

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill creates 32 honorary transportation facility designations around the state and amends two previously enacted designations.

Section 1 of the bill creates the following designations:

Private First Class Joey Moody Bridge

Upon completion of replacement construction, bridge number 380096 on U.S. 221/S.R. 55 over the Econfina River in Taylor County is designated as "Private First Class Joey Moody Bridge."

Private First Class Joey Moody grew upon in Shady Grove on the Econfina River. He attended Shady Grove Grammar School and graduated from Taylor County High School before attending the University of Florida. On June 21, 1952, PFC Moody, serving in Korea, was one of three men sent into enemy fire to repair a crucial communications line and lost his life when a mortar round exploded. He was posthumously awarded the National Defense Medal, the Korean Combat Medal, the Korean Battle Medal, and the Purple Heart.

Corporal Joseph R. Bertrand Memorial Highway

The portion of S.R. 80 between Hickey Creek Road and Carter Lane in Lee County is designated as "Corporal Joseph R. Bertrand Memorial Highway."

Corporal Joseph R. Bertrand was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol who served the citizens of the State of Florida for 16 years. On December 22, 1967, Corporal Bertrand was shot and killed while conducting a driving-under-the-influence investigation on State Road 80 in Fort Myers.

Lieutenant Benedict J. Thomas Memorial Highway

The portion of Interstate 75/S.R. 93A between Fowler Avenue and Fletcher Avenue in Hillsborough County is designated as "Lieutenant Benedict J. Thomas Memorial Highway."

Lieutenant Benedict J. Thomas was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol who served the citizens of the State of Florida for 11 years. On June 9, 1989, Lieutenant Thomas was struck and killed by a passing car while walking back to his vehicle after investigating an abandoned vehicle on Interstate 75 in Tampa.

Trooper Patrick Ambroise Memorial Highway

The portion of the Homestead Extension of the Florida Turnpike/S.R. 821 between mile marker 34 and mile marker 36 in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Trooper Patrick Ambroise Memorial Highway."

Trooper Patrick Ambroise was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol who served the citizens of the State of Florida for four years. On May 15, 2010, while parked in his patrol vehicle on the shoulder of northbound State Road 821, a passing vehicle veered onto the paved emergency shoulder and struck the left rear section of the patrol vehicle, killing Trooper Ambroise.

SP4 Robert Clifford Millender Memorial Highway

The portion of U.S. 98/S.R.30 between Ryan Drive/W. 11th Street and N.E./S.E. 12th Street in Franklin County is designated as "SP4 Robert Clifford Millender Memorial Highway."

SP4 Robert Clifford Millender was inducted into the United States Army on August 7, 1968. After boot camp training, he was transferred to Vietnam, where he served for two months before being injured in a land mine explosion. He was returned to Walter Reed General Hospital and discharged from the Army on July 22, 1969. SP4 Millender died of his war-related injuries on January 14, 1970. He received the Purple Heart, the National Defense Service Medal, and the Vietnam Service Medal.

Lauren F. Book Boulevard

The portion of U.S. 1/S.R. 5/North Federal Highway between S.R. 842/Broward Boulevard and S.R. 838/Sunrise Boulevard in Broward County is designated as "Lauren F. Book Boulevard."

Lauren F. Book is the founder and Chief Executive Officer of Lauren's Kids. Lauren's Kids educates adults and children about sexual abuse prevention through in-school curricula, awareness campaigns, and speaking engagements around the country and the world. The organization also leads an annual, statewide awareness walk, called "Walk in My Shoes," and provides more than seven million education and awareness materials statewide through direct mail every year.

C.K. Steele Memorial Highway

The portion of S.R. 371/373/Orange Avenue between S.R. 263/Capital Circle and S.R. 61/Monroe Street in Leon County is designated as "C.K. Steele Memorial Highway."

In 1956, 38 year-old C.K. Steele moved to Tallahassee where he served as minister at the Bethel Baptist Church until his death in 1980. He organized a bus boycott in Tallahassee in 1956 after two black college students were arrested for sitting in the "whites only" section of a city bus, successfully integrating bus service in the community. He also worked to integrate Tallahassee's schools, restaurants, theaters, and other public facilities. He became a national figure in the civil rights movement, helping to organize the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and serving

as its vice-president. He participated in many national civil rights protests, including the famous march in Selma, Alabama.

Danny A. Pino Way

The portion of U.S. 90/S.R. 10 between N. Woodward Avenue and Wadsworth Street in Leon County is designated as "Danny A. Pino Way."

Danny A. Pino was born in Miami-Dade County in 1995 and aspired to serving his country and becoming a professional baseball player. After playing baseball for the United States Merchant Marine Academy, Danny returned home to study at Florida International University, where he joined the ROTC and received his uniform on September 11, 2014. Danny was struck by a car while visiting Tallahassee and passed away on September 28, 2014. His final act was the donation of his organs to two boys, ages 7 and 12, and a 63-year-old man.

Emmitt G. Coakley Memorial Highway

The portion of U.S. 1/S.R. 15 between 5th Avenue and C.R. 108 in Nassau County is designated as "Emmitt G. Coakley Memorial Highway."

Emmitt G. Coakley was a teacher, mentor, and principal in Nassau who retired after 30 years of service. He returned as a substitute teacher for an additional 23 years. He served his community in many ways, including 30 years on the Nassau County Planning and Zoning Board and nine years on the Conditional Use and Variance Board. He was an active member of the Retired Teachers' Association of Nassau County, Chairman of the Deacon Ministry of Second Baptist Church, and served his country as a member of the United States Army.

Potter's Field Memorial Highway

The portion of Interstate 95/S.R. 9 between West Broward Boulevard/S.R. 842 and West Sunrise Boulevard/S.R. 838 in Broward County is designated as "Potter's Field Memorial Highway."

In May of 2015, a news article reported at least 65 bodies buried beside Interstate 95 near Sunrise Boulevard in Broward County and that some unmarked graves may have been paved over when the highway was originally built.⁴ The article reports in part:

The graves are in a potter's field that was part of the five-acre Woodlawn Cemetery, established in the 1920s because blacks during segregation were not allowed to bury their loved ones in the main cemeteries.

The state now owns some of that land, which it uses as a right-of-way for the highway. Only a chain-link fence separates the neglected, decaying markers from the road.

The cemetery is eligible for listing with the National Register of Historic Places.

The article quotes a county commissioner: "We need to ensure that there is some memorialization of what is there, a historic site that means a lot to a lot of people."

Purple Heart Trail

The portion of S.R. 60 between the Hillsborough County line and Mandalay Avenue in Pinellas County is designated as "Purple Heart Trail."

The purpose of the Purple Heart Trail, according to the Purple Heart website, "is to create a symbolic and honorary system of roads, highways, bridges, and other monuments that give tribute to the men and women who have been awarded the Purple Heart medal. ... Signs placed at various locations annotate those roads and highways where legislation has been passed to designate parts of the national road system as The Purple Heart Trail.⁵

Elizabeth Inez and Elijah Davis Highway

The portion of S.R. 35/N.E. 58th Avenue between C.R. 314/N.E. 7th Street and S.E. 20th Street in Marion County is designated as "Elizabeth Inez and Elijah Davis Highway."

Elizabeth Inez Davis was a devoted children's advocate and community leader in the Ocala area. She founded the Mount Canaan Community Youth Center. Ms. Davis passed away on December 6, 2002. Elijah Davis volunteered for over 60 years at the Mount Canaan Community Youth Center and still volunteers at the age of 102.⁶

Mary Ellen Hawkins Street

The portion of Golden Gate Parkway between U.S. 41/S.R. 45/Tamiami Trail and C.R. 851 in Collier County is designated as "Mary Ellen Hawkins Street."

Mary Ellen Hawkins was Collier County's first female state representative. She served in the Florida House of Representatives from 1974 to 1994 and subsequently remained active in promoting and improving her community.

Col. William W. Wood Memorial Highway

The portion of S.R. 368 between U.S. 98/S.R. 30 and S.R. 390 in Bay County is designated as "Col. William W. Wood Memorial Highway."

Col. William W. Wood was a regular United States Army Soldier assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 184th Infantry Regiment. He was a Lt. Colonel while directing security operations following an explosion when another bomb went off in Baghdad, Iraq. He died on October 27, 2005, leaving his wife and daughter, and was posthumously promoted to Colonel.

Deputy Scott Pine Way

The portion of C.R. 435/Apopka Vineland Road between Old Winter Garden Road and C.R. 439/Conroy-Windermere Road in Orange County is designated as "Deputy Scott Pine Way."

Deputy Scott Pine took his oath as Deputy Sheriff on May 23, 2011, promising to protect and defend the citizens of Orange County. He received the Deputy of the Month in 2014 and was encouraged to assist and mentor new assigned deputies. On February 11, 2014, Deputy Pine was working patrol on the midnight shift when he responded to a call of vehicle burglary. Upon arrival at the scene, Deputy Pine gave chase to a suspect, and the suspect shot Deputy Pine. He succumbed to his injuries, leaving his wife and three young children.

Pat Frank Road

The portion of East Street between East Twiggs Street and U.S. 41B/S.R. 60/East Kennedy Boulevard in Hillsborough County is designated as "Pat Frank Road."

A former chair of the Hillsborough County Board of County Commissioners, and, currently, the Hillsborough County Clerk of the Circuit Court, Pat Frank is noted for her distinguished career in public service. Starting with her election to the Hillsborough County School Board – which she later chaired – voters then sent her to the Florida House of Representatives, followed by the Florida Senate for a decade. Lauded for her legislative service, she was the first woman to receive recognition as a House "Most Effective First Term Member" and, later, as "Most Respected Senator," and has received over 50 awards for her public service and volunteer activities.

Sandra Warshaw Freedman Street

The portion of N. Franklin Street between East Twiggs Street and U.S. 41B/S.R. 60/East Kennedy Boulevard in Hillsborough County is designated as "Sandra Warshaw Freedman Street."

On July 16, 1986, Sandra Warshaw Freedman became Tampa's first woman mayor and broke a glass ceiling by appointing many minorities and women to top management positions in city government. She also organized Tampa's first march against hate crimes and banned city employees from using racist, sexist, and religious slurs.

Helen Gordon Davis Boulevard

The portion of Davis Boulevard between Adalia Avenue and Adriatic Avenue in Hillsborough County is designated as "Helen Gordon Davis Boulevard."

Helen Gordon Davis was born in New York City and moved to Tampa in 1948. In 1952, she was the first white woman in Florida to join the NAACP. Ms. Davis founded Florida's first women's center in 1971, and in 1974, she was the first woman elected from Hillsborough County to the Florida House of Representatives. She was reelected for six consecutive terms and, in 1988, was

elected to the Florida Senate. Ms. Davis served as a Florida legislator for almost two decades and she championed the civil rights of women and minorities.

Francisco Rodriguez Avenue

The portion of North Willow Avenue between West Cypress Street and West Cass Street in Hillsborough County is designated is designated as "Francisco Rodriguez Avenue."

The son of a Cuban cigar maker, Francisco Rodriguez was a key organizer in the Civil Rights Movement in the late 1950's. Prior to becoming a prominent civil rights attorney, Mr. Rodriguez was a school teacher and a U.S. Marine, barred from officer training because of his skin color (though he still applied). He later became a leader with the NAACP and led the fight in the courts to end segregation in Hillsborough County's schools, parks, and other public facilities.

Olympian Theresa Manuel Way

The portion of N. Garcia Avenue between W. Palm Avenue and W. Ross Avenue in Hillsborough County is designated as "Olympian Theresa Manuel Way."

Theresa Manuel was a National AAU Junior 80-meter hurdles champion and was a member of the Junior 400-meter relay team that won the championship. She held the National AAU Senior 50-meter hurdles championship in which she set a new indoor record in Chicago on April 24, 1948. She was a member of the United States 1948 Olympic Team.

Vyrle Davis Avenue

The portion of U.S. 19A/S.R. 595/5th Avenue North between 25th Street North and 28th Street North in Pinellas County is designated as "Vyrle Davis Avenue."

Vyrle Davis was St. Petersburg High School's first black principal, later becoming the county's first black area superintendent. He founded the Ebony Scholars program in 1984, which has awarded high-achieving black students more than \$500,000 in scholarships. He founded COQUEB and AVEREC, which advocate for quality education of black students and voter education, respectively.

Trooper Patrick Ambroise Memorial Highway

The portion of the Homestead Extension of the Florida Turnpike/S.R. 821 between mile marker 34 and mile marker 36 in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Trooper Patrick Ambroise Memorial Highway."

Trooper Patrick Ambroise was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol who served the citizens of the State of Florida for four years. On May 15, 2010, while parked in his patrol vehicle on the shoulder of northbound State Road 821, a passing vehicle veered onto the paved emergency shoulder and struck the left rear section of the patrol vehicle, killing Trooper Ambroise.

Lee Klein Way

The portion of S.R. 973/87th Avenue between S.R. 94/Kendall Drive and S.W. 92nd Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Lee Klein Way."

Lee Klein began her career as a volunteer charity worker for children's causes in 1956 and, in 1965, founded what is now known as the Children's Cancer Caring Center. Ms. Klein serves as the Chief Executive Officer, Chairman of the Board, and as Patient Program Director of the Center. She has received numerous awards for her work on behalf of children with cancer.

Sergeant Marvin L. Roberts Memorial Highway

The portion of S.R. 19 between S.R. 50 and C.R. 478/Cherry Lake Road in Lake County is designated as "Sergeant Marvin L. Roberts Memorial Highway.

Sergeant Roberts graduated in 1942 from Groveland High School in Groveland, Florida. He married his high school sweetheart before enlisting in the U.S. Army in February 1943. He lost his life fighting in the Battle of the Bulge on January 15, 1945. He was honored, among other recognitions, with the Invasion Bronze Arrow-Head, Bronze Star, two Presidential Unit Citations, and the Purple Heart.

John Jacob 'JJ' Curry Memorial Highway

The portion of U.S. 17/S.R. 15 between Golden Hills Boulevard and Lake Winona Road in Volusia County is designated as "John Jacob 'JJ' Curry Memorial Highway."

John Jacob "JJ" Curry was a 30-year old firefighter in Volusia County, having received his Emergency Medical Technician certification in March of 2006 and completing his Certificate of Compliance in Fire Standards and Training in September of 2006. Firefighters were practicing with chainsaws on November 27, 2007, when a tree fell on him. Emergency responders were unable to save him. Married and the father of two, he had been a member of the fire department for just ten months.

Nona and Popa Road

The portion of the San Juan Street Extension in Anastasia State Park between Santander Street and Park Road in St. John County is designated as "Nona and Popa Road."

This designation is in honor of all grandmothers and grandfathers who take grandchildren to state parks.

Irene U. Hooper Memorial Bridges

The pair of bridges (Nos. 900110 and 900111) over Pine Channel on U.S. 1/S.R. 5 in Monroe County are designated as the "Irene U. Hooper Memorial Bridges."

In 1966, Irene U. Hooper began her life-long leadership and service developing "Seacamp," a year round, non-profit marine science camp and educational facility located on Big Pine Key.

Today, campers 12 – 17 years old continue to enjoy numerous activities in marine science education. From 1968 to 1971, she successfully spearheaded the effort to earn Aquatic Preserve designation for Coupon Bight in the Florida Keys. Over the years, her leadership and service earned her numerous recognitions, including but not limited to, the national Take Pride in America Award in 1986, the Florida Governor's Environmental Education Award in 1993, the League of Environmental Educators in Florida Founders Award for Education Leadership in 1996.

Stanley G. Tate Boulevard

The portion of S.R. 922 from N.E. 10th Avenue east to the North Miami city limits in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Stanley G. Tate Boulevard."

Stanley G. Tate has been a North Miami business owner for over 30 years. He has been actively involved in both civic and charitable organizations and devoted extensive time to service on various boards and organizations. He has been honored multiple times for his service, including the Arete Award for Volunteer Advocate of the Year.

Robert L. Shevin Memorial Boulevard

The portion of Miami Avenue between N.E. 5th Street and U.S. 41/S.R. 90/S.E. 7th Street in Miami-Dade County is designated as "Robert L. Shevin Memorial Boulevard."

Robert L. Shevin was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 1964 and served in the Florida Senate from 1966 to 1970. He served as Florida's Attorney General from 1971-1979. In 1996, Governor Lawton Chiles appointed him to the Third District Court of Appeal, where he served with distinction until early 2005. He passed away on July 11, 2005.

Murray Kalish Way

The portion of Atlantic Avenue between Military Trail and the Florida Turnpike in Palm Beach County is designated as "Murray Kalish Way."

Murray Kalish was active in several county boards and Democratic organizations and founded the United South County Democratic Club. He spent years in Florida assisting candidates in elections and, in 1999, won an election to the Lake Worth Drainage District board, serving for 12 years. He passed away on November 20, 2015.

Andre Fladell Avenue

The portion of Atlantic Avenue between Swinton Avenue and S. Ocean Boulevard in Palm Beach County is designated as "Andre Fladell Avenue."

Andre Fladell, known as "The Prince of Palm Beach," has been recognized for his many years of community involvement. He created a Jobs Program for Senior Citizens and participates in fundraising efforts for the Special Olympics and aid to victims of domestic violence. The South County Civic Center was named in his honor in 2003. He has been active in creating police

support organizations and involved in the formation of Palm Beach County fire rescue. He is active in Palm Beach County politics.

Joe C. Peavy Highway

The portion of S.R. 53 from U.S. 90 to the Georgia state line in Madison County is designated as "Joe C. Peavy Highway."

Joe. C. Peavy served as Madison County Sheriff from 1968 until 1996.

The bill directs the FDOT to erect suitable markers for each of the described designations.

Section 2 of the bill revises a previously enacted designation, the "Broad Causeway" in Miami-Dade County, to the "Shepard Broad Causeway." The Broad Causeway was designated in honor of Shepard Broad, the founder of Bay Harbor Islands. The Town of Bay Harbor Islands and the Miami-Dade County Commission have requested the designation be revised to reflect his full name.

Section 3 of the bill also revises a previously enacted designation, "Larcenia Bullard Way," to "Senator Larcenia J. Bullard Way," in honor of the late Senator Bullard.

The bill takes effect on July 1, 2016.

I. Summary:

SB 7062 directs the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) to develop a number of new specialty license plates.

The bill also modifies the distribution and use of annual use fees for the "In God We Trust" and the "Share the Road" specialty plate, as well as modifies the use of fees for the "Conserve Wildlife" specialty plate.

The bill takes effect October 1, 2016, if SB 1390 or similar legislation is adopted this session or an extension thereof and becomes law. SB 1390 increases the minimum pre-sale requirement for specialty license plates to be manufactured.

II. Present Situation:

Presently, there are over 120 specialty license plates available for purchase, and two in the presale phase. Specialty license plates are available to an owner or lessee of a motor vehicle who is willing to pay an annual use fee, ranging from \$15 to \$25, paid in addition to required license taxes and service fees. The annual use fees are distributed to an organization or organizations in support of a particular cause or charity signified in the plate's design and designated in statute. ²

In order to establish a specialty license plate, the plate must first be adopted into statute. Upon becoming law:

- Within 60 days, the organization must submit an art design for the plate, in a medium prescribed by the DHSMV;
- Within 120 days, the DHSMV must establish a method to issue pre-sale vouchers for the approved specialty license plate; and

• Within 24 months after the pre-sale vouchers are established, the organization must obtain a minimum of 1,000 voucher sales before manufacturing may begin.

If, at the end of the 24-month pre-sale period, the minimum sales requirement has not been met, the DHSMV will de-authorize the specialty plate, discontinue development, and discontinue issuance of the pre-sale voucher. Upon deauthorization of the plate, a purchaser of a presale voucher may use the annual use fee as a credit towards any other specialty license plate or apply for a refund with the DHSMV.³

The annual use fees collected by an organization and any interest earned from the fees may be expended only for use in this state unless the annual use fee is derived from the sale of United States Armed Forces and veterans-related specialty plates.⁴ Additionally, the fees may not be used for the purpose of marketing to, lobbying, entertaining, or rewarding a member or employee of the Legislature.⁵

DHSMV Costs Defrayed

The DHSMV retains sufficient annual use fees, from the sale of the specialty license plates, to defray its costs for inventory, distribution, and other direct costs associated with the specialty license plate program. The remainder of the proceeds collected are distributed as provided by law.⁶

Discontinuance of Specialty Plates

The DHSMV must discontinue the issuance of an approved specialty license plate if the number of valid specialty plate registrations falls below 1,000 plates for at least 12 consecutive months. A warning letter is mailed to the sponsoring organization following the first month in which the total number of valid specialty plate registrations is below 1,000 plates. Collegiate plates are exempt from the minimum plate requirement. Additionally, the specialty license plate must be discontinued if the organization no longer exists, stops providing services that are authorized to be funded from the annual use fee proceeds, or pursuant to an organizational recipient's request.

Organizations must adhere to certain accountability requirements, including an annual attestation document affirming that funds received have been spent in accordance with applicable statutes.⁹

Moratorium

Currently, there is a statutory moratorium on the issuance of new specialty license plates. Except for a specialty license plate proposal which has submitted a letter of intent to the DHSMV prior to May 2, 2008, and which has submitted a survey, marketing strategy, and application fee prior

to October 1, 2008, or was included in a bill filed during the 2008 Legislative Session, the DHSMV may not issue any new specialty license plates. ¹⁰

The moratorium ends July 1, 2016, and does not affect the plates included in this bill.

Florida Professional Sports Team License Plates

Section 320.08058(9), F.S., directs the DHSMV to develop Florida Professional Sports Team license plates for Major League Baseball, National Basketball Association, National Football League, Arena Football League, National Hockey, and Major League Soccer teams domiciled in this state. Fifty-five percent of the annual use fee proceeds from these plates is distributed to the Professional Sports Development Trust Fund within the Department of Economic Opportunity to attract and support major sports events in the state. The remaining proceeds are allocated to Enterprise Florida, Inc., to:

- Promote the economic development of the sports industry;
- Distribute licensing and royalty fees to participating professional sports teams;
- Promote education programs in Florida schools that provide an awareness of the benefits of physical activity and nutrition standards;
- Recognize schools whose students demonstrate excellent physical fitness or fitness improvement;
- Institute a grant program for communities bidding on minor sporting events that create an economic impact for the state;
- Distribute funds to Florida based charities designated by Enterprise Florida and the participating professional sports teams; and
- Fulfill the sports promotion responsibilities of the Department of Economic Opportunity.

Organizations

Organizations receiving money from the sale of proposed specialty plates are described below under their corresponding specialty plate.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Proposed Specialty Plates

The bill directs the DHSMV to develop 36 new specialty license plates. All the proposed specialty plates have an annual use fee of \$25.

Sun Sea Smiles License Plate

The Sun Sea Smiles plate annual use fees will be distributed as follows:

- 35 percent to the Florida Caribbean Charitable Foundation, Inc. Of the funds received, 5 percent is for marketing the plate. From the remaining funds:
 - o 60 percent is for a college scholarship program;
 - 15 percent is to promote health and wellness among Florida residents of Caribbean descent; and

- o 25 percent is to promote awareness of Caribbean Culture within the state.
- 20 percent to the American Friends of Jamaica, Inc., for use as grants to promote social and community development among Florida residents;
- 10 percent to the Sant La Haitian Neighborhood Center, Inc., to promote social and community development;
- 10 percent to Fanm Ayisyen nan Miyami, Inc., to promote social and community development;
- 20 percent to Greater Caribbean American Cultural Coalition, Inc., to promote awareness of Caribbean culture within the state; and
- 5 percent to Little Haiti Optimist Foundation, Inc., to promote awareness of Caribbean culture and youth development within the state.

In addition, each organization receiving funds may use up to 5 percent for administrative expenses.

Florida Caribbean Charitable Foundation, Inc. 11

The Florida Caribbean Charitable Foundation, Inc., a civic and social organization, is a domestic non-profit corporation located in North Miami Beach, established in 2007.

American Friends of Jamaica, Inc. 12

The organization is a non-profit "dedicated to supporting Jamaican charitable organizations and social initiatives targeted at improving the lives of Jamaicans through systemic development in the areas of education, healthcare, and economic development."

Sant La Haitian Neighborhood Center, Inc. 13

The mission of the Center is to "empower, strengthen, and stabilize South Florida's Haitian community, through access for free services and resources, to ensure its successful integration." This is accomplished through services such as citizenship assistance, college scholarships, community outreach, employment services, community partnerships, and educational services.

Fanm Ayisyen nan Miyami, Inc.¹⁴

Fanm Ayisyen nan Miyami, Inc., also known as Haitian Women of Miami, has a mission to empower Haitian women and their families socially and politically, and facilitate their adjustments to South Florida. The organization has provided counseling, outreach, education, access to care, and advocacy services to low and moderate-income families for the past 16 years.

Greater Caribbean American Cultural Coalition, Inc. 15

The Coalition is "an umbrella organization serving the Caribbean people and other members of the community, by bringing together the various Caribbean countries and islands, and their rich cultural heritage." The coalition's mission is to enrich the cultural environment by fostering multicultural understanding through an appreciation of Caribbean cultures.

Little Haiti Optimist Foundation, Inc. 16

Little Haiti Optimist Foundation, Inc., is a charitable organization located in Miami, established in 2010 to provide assistance, guidance, and programs to the youth of Little Haiti.

Support Special Needs Kids License Plate

Annual use fees from the sale of the plate will be distributed to the Dan Marino Foundation, Inc. 10 percent of fees are to promote and market the plate. The remaining fees are to be invested and reinvested. Interest thereon is to assist Floridians with developmental and intellectual disabilities by funding scholarships, assisting with job placement, and promoting education, independence, and awareness.

Dan Marino Foundation, Inc. ¹⁷

The Foundation was established in 1992. Its mission is "empowering individuals with autism and other developmental disabilities." The Foundation has raised over \$50 million since its inception, which has been used to perform quality-of-life research, build the Miami Children's Hospital Dan Marino Center, and the Marino Campus.

America the Beautiful License Plate

Annual use fees from the sale of the plate are to be distributed to the American the Beautiful Fund. Up to 10 percent of funds may be used to offset administrative costs and to market and promote the plate. The remaining proceeds are for programs in support of military service members and their families and:

- Advancing self-sufficiency in children and families;
- Educational scholarships; and
- Land and wildlife conservation.

America the Beautiful Fund

America the Beautiful Fund is a fictitious name registered by Live Laugh Love Give, Inc. 18

The mission statement of Live Laugh Love Give, Inc., is "Empowering children and families against dependency. Animal assistance, sanctuaries, and wildlife preservation. Education grants to better the world. Enhancing lives of military families." ¹⁹

Team Hammy License Plate

Annual use fees will be distributed to Team Hammy, Inc., to grant wishes to families living with ALS, provide continuing education to caretakers and physicians, and increase ALS awareness in the community. Up to 10 percent of fees may be used for administrative costs and marketing the plate.

Team Hammy, Inc.²⁰

Team Hammy is an organization created in the name of Hamilton Vance Paris, who was diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) in July of 2010. Team Hammy strives to bring awareness, education, and hope to people with ALS and their families through fundraising and participating in events.

Vision for Excellence License Plate

Annual use fees will be distributed to Vision for Excellence, Inc., which will use the proceeds for direct support of programs, services, and activities provided to children who participate in the organization's youth development programs. Up to 10 percent may be used for promotion and marketing of the plate, and up to 10 percent may be used for administrative costs directly associated with the programs.

Vision for Excellence, Inc.²¹

The organization was established in 2011 as a non-profit youth organization that provides social development programs and services to low-income and at-risk males, ages 9-15. The organization was designed to help Jacksonville's youth develop assets that enable them to become healthy productive adults with a focus to give back to their community. Its programs link male youth with local law enforcement and other professional adults for relationship building, and efforts to educate, motivate, and inspire participants to stay on the right path and become successful law abiding citizens.

Go Boating License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to Eckerd College to fund the Eckerd College Search and Rescue Team, which provides 24-hour assistance to the Tampa Boating community. Up to 10 percent of the proceeds may be used for promotion and marketing of the plate. Remaining funds must be used to acquire boats and other equipment or for operation expenses.

Eckerd College Search and Rescue Team²²

The team was founded in 1971 and extended its rescue services to the Tampa Bay boating community in 1977. The team is a highly trained group of full-time, degree seeking, student volunteers who work closely with the U.S. Coast Guard, 911 Emergency Medical response, and other state and local agencies to answer more than 500 maritime distress calls per year. The team is the only marine rescue team in the country. The members are trained in technical rescue,

boating safety, seamanship, searching, firefighting, dewatering, navigation, medical response, and evening piloting rescue vessels.

Paddle Florida License Plates

Annual use fees from the plate are distributed to Paddle Florida, Inc., to be used by the Florida Forever program to support activities that further outdoor recreation and natural resource protection. Up to 10 percent of proceeds may be used for administrative costs and marketing of the plate.

Paddle Florida, Inc.²³

Paddle Florida, Inc., is a non-profit organization that supports canoeing and kayaking in Florida. The organization holds events to "expose paddlers to Florida's natural beauty and rich cultural heritage while promoting water conservation, wildlife preservation, springs restoration, and waterways protection." Paddle Florida also promotes Florida as an international destination for nature-based tourism, by providing trips featuring Florida's most scenic rivers, canoe trails, and coastal environments.

I Stand with Israel License Plate

Annual use fees from the plate are distributed to I Stand with Israel, Inc., to be used for the direct support of the Israeli Youth Program to send Florida university students between the ages of 18 and 26 and program chaperones to Israel. Up to 10 percent of the proceeds may be used for marketing and promotion of the plate, and up to 10 percent may be used for administrative costs directly associated with its programs.

I Stand with Israel, Inc.²⁴

According to corporate filings with the Department of State, the organization was created in 2016 for the specific purpose of managing the proceeds of the license plate sales and distribute such proceeds for the purpose stated in law.

Save our Shores Florida License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to Adore the Shore, Inc., which may use up to 15 percent for administrative costs of the organization and up to 10 percent for promotion and marketing of the plate program. The remaining proceeds are to fund activities on the beaches of this state following natural or manmade occurrences that threaten the pristine nature of the beaches, and for any other legal purpose as allowed by the Internal Revenue Code.

Adore the Shore, Inc.²⁵

According to corporate filings with the Department of State, the organization states that it is a not-for-profit corporation whose purpose is "to conduct activities that are charitable, religious,

educational, scientific, literary, testing for public safety, fostering national or international amateur sports competition, or preventing cruelty to children or animals."

Furry Friends License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to Furry Friends of Florida, Inc., which may use up to 15 percent of proceeds for administrative, handling, and disbursement of expenses, and up to 10 percent for promotion, advertising, and marketing costs. The remaining proceeds are to be used for activities, programs, and projects, including, but not limited to, pet rescue, animal shelters, pet vaccinations, veterinary services, and service animals.

Furry Friends of Florida, Inc.²⁶

According to corporate filings with the Department of State, the organization states that it is a not-for-profit corporation whose purpose is "to conduct activities that are charitable, religious, educational, scientific, literary, testing for public safety, fostering national or international amateur sports competition, or preventing cruelty to children or animals."

Orlando City Soccer Club License Plate

The Orlando City Soccer Club is a professional Major League Soccer team based in Orlando, Florida. The team was formed in 2010, and became the league's twenty-first franchise on November 19, 2013.²⁷

Annual use fees are provided as specified for Florida Professional Sports Team license plates.

Support Our Constitution License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to The Constitution Foundation, Inc., which may use up to 15 percent for administrative costs of the organization and 10 percent for promotion and marketing of the license plate. The remaining proceeds are used to fund activities, programs, projects, and mission of the Foundation to increase awareness and understanding of the United States Constitution in Florida's public schools. Funds are also used to recruit and train school leaders to make presentations and provide students learning materials and a pocket constitution.

The Constitution Foundation, Inc. 28

The Constitution Foundation, Inc., is a non-partisan educational organization founded in 2011 in Kissimmee, Florida. The foundation's mission is to increase awareness and understanding of the United States Constitution in Florida's schools, recruit and train leaders to make presentations in each school district, and provide to each student, at no cost, learning materials and a pocket Constitution.

Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed as follows:

• 5 percent for the United Negro College Fund (UNCF) to be used for scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities

- 10 percent to the Florida Federation of Alpha Chapters to market the plate; and
- 85 percent to the Florida Federation of Alpha Chapters to promote community awareness and action though educational, economic, and cultural service activities.

United Negro College Fund (UNCF)²⁹

The UNCF is the nation's largest minority education organization. UNCF provides operating funds for historically black colleges and universities, scholarships and internships for students, and provides for faculty and administrative professional training.

Florida Federation of Alpha Chapters³⁰

Alpha Phi Alpha's mission statement is "develop leaders, promotes brotherhood and academic excellence, while providing service and advocacy for our communities." The Fraternity's programs and projects include community outreach mentoring initiatives.

Omega Psi Phi Fraternity License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed as follows:

- 5 percent for the UNCF to be used for scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities
- 10 percent to State of Florida Omega Friendship Foundation, Inc., to market the plate; and
- 85 percent to State of Florida Omega Friendship Foundation, Inc. to promote community awareness and action though educational, economic, and cultural service activities.

State of Florida Omega Friendship Foundation, Inc. 31

Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., was the first international fraternal organization to be founded on the campus of a historically black college. Founded in 1911 at Howard University, "Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance and Uplift" were adopted as Cardinal Principles.

Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed as follows:

- 5 percent for the UNCF to be used for scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities
- 10 percent to Southern Province of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., to market the plate; and
- 85 percent to Southern Province of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. to promote community awareness and action though educational, economic, and cultural service activities.

- Encourage honorable achievement in every field of human endeavor;
- Promote the spiritual, social, intellectual, and moral welfare of members;
- Assist the aims and purposes of Colleges and Universities; and Inspire service in the public interest.

Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed as follows:

- 5 percent for the UNCF to be used for scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities
- 10 percent to the TMB Charitable Foundation, Inc., to market the plate; and
- 85 percent to the TMB Charitable Foundation, Inc., to promote community awareness and action though educational, economic, and cultural service activities.

TMB Charitable Foundation, Inc. 33

According to corporate filings with the Department of State, the Foundation's principal address is in Tallahassee, Florida. The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation "operated exclusively for charitable purposes, including, without limitation, acting as an instrument to which youth are encouraged and inspired to achieve academic success through mentoring."

Zeta Phi Beta Sorority License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed as follows:

- 5 percent for the UNCF to be used for scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities
- 10 percent to Florida Pearls, Inc., to market the plate; and
- 85 percent to Florida Pearls, Inc., to promote community awareness and action though educational, economic, and cultural service activities.

The Florida Pearls, Inc.³⁴

The Florida Pearls, Inc., is a not-for-profit corporation established to provide Florida communities with scholarships, health initiative programs, cultural and humanities program, youth programs, and feeding the hungry programs.

Annual use fees are distributed as follows:

• 5 percent for the UNCF to be used for scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities

- 10 percent to the Delta Research and Educational Foundation to market the plate; and
- 85 percent to the Delta Research and Educational Foundation to promote community awareness and action though educational, economic, and cultural service activities.

Delta Research and Educational Foundation³⁵

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority established the Foundation in 1967. The Foundation's mission is to promote research which identifies and fashions solutions to issues affecting African American women and their families, nationally and globally through funding and support of programs of the sorority and collaborative organizations.

Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed as follows:

- 5 percent for the UNCF to be used for scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities
- 10 percent to the Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation, Inc., to market the plate; and
- 85 percent to the Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation, Inc., to promote community awareness and action though educational, economic, and cultural service activities.

Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation, Inc. 36

The Foundation was created in 1980 by the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. "The mission of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation is to promote lifelong learning. This is accomplished by securing charitable contributions, gifts and endowed funds to award scholarships, fellowships and grants."

Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed as follows:

- 5 percent for the UNCF to be used for scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities
- 10 percent to the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority National Education Fund, Inc., to market the plate; and
- 85 percent to the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority National Education Fund, Inc., to promote community awareness and action though educational, economic, and cultural service activities.

Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority National Education Fund, Inc. 37

The Fund was developed by the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority to provide scholarship aid to needy students and to conduct educational programs, workshops, symposiums, and forums to enhance the quality of life.

Safe and Free Florida License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to the Department of Legal Affairs to establish a program to award grants to nongovernmental organizations that assist sexually abused, exploited, or trafficked victims. Funds may not be distributed to any organization that charges victims for services received through this funding. An organization receiving such funds must use them to provide material needs, detoxification services, prenatal and postnatal care, safe houses or recovery care centers, counseling and training programs, or emergency legal advocacy for victims. The department may use up to 15 percent of the proceeds to promote and market the plate, and is authorized to adopt rules to implement this plate.

Department of Legal Affairs

The Department of Legal Affairs, ³⁸ also known as the Office of the Attorney General, is responsible for numerous duties, including conducting various programs to assist victims of crime. The Statewide Council on Human Trafficking is a 15-member council chaired by Florida's Attorney General. ³⁹ The council was created by legislation passed in 2014, to combat human trafficking and assist victims of human trafficking. ⁴⁰ Membership includes law enforcement, prosecutors, legislators, and experts in the fields of health, education, and social services. The council's purpose is to:

- Develop recommendations for comprehensive programs and services for victims of human trafficking;
- Make recommendations for apprehending and prosecuting traffickers and enhancing coordination of responses;
- Hold an annual statewide policy summit with an institute of higher learning;
- Work with the Department of Children and Families to create and maintain an inventory of human trafficking programs and services in each county; and
- Develop policy recommendations that further the efforts to combat human trafficking in this state.

Bonefish and Tarpon Trust License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to the Bonefish and Tarpon Trust to invest and reinvest the proceeds and use the interest to conserve and enhance Florida bonefish and tarpon fisheries and their respective environments. Up to 10 percent of the proceeds may be used to promote and market the plate.

Bonefish and Tarpon Trust⁴¹

The Bonefish and Tarpon Trust is a non-profit organization dedicated to conserving and enhancing global bonefish, tarpon, and permit fisheries and their environments. The trust does this through stewardship, research, education, and advocacy, including funding studies and providing educational materials to the public and fisherman on bonefish, tarpon, and permit fisheries. The trust also works with regulatory authorities and the public to ensure protection of these species is enforced.

Jacksonville Armada Football Club License Plate

The Jacksonville Armada Football Club is an American professional soccer team. The team is part of the North American Soccer League (NASL) and based in Jacksonville, Florida. The team was established in 2013, and started competing in the NASL in the 2015 spring season.⁴²

Annual use fees are provided as specified for Florida Professional Sports Team license plates.

Ronald Reagan License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to Florida Ronald Reagan Centennial, Inc. Of the proceeds:

- Up to 15 percent may be used for administrative costs;
- Up to 10 percent may be used for promotion and marketing of the plate;
- Up to 10 percent shall be donated to the Florida National Guard Foundation; and
- The remainder is to fund activities, programs, and projects that educate Florida's students and citizens about the contributions of President Reagan and to support ongoing research of Alzheimer's disease.

Florida Ronald Reagan Centennial, Inc. 43

According to corporate filings with the Department of State, the organization was created in 2016 to support, promote, and fund activities, programs, and projects educating individuals about the contributions of President Reagan; supporting Alzheimer disease research; supporting the Florida National Guard Foundation; and establishing, operating, maintaining, and funding related programs.

Florida Bay Forever License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to the Florida National Park Association, Inc., to supplement the Everglades National Park service's budgets and to support educational, interpretive, historical, and scientific research relating to the Everglades National Park. Up to 10 percent of such fees may be used for administrative costs and marketing of the plate.

Florida National Park Association, Inc. 44

The Florida National Park Association, also known as the Everglades Association, is a non-profit organization founded in 1951 to support educational, interpretive, and historical and scientific research responsibilities to help support the Everglades National Park, Big Cypress National Preserve, Biscayne National Park, and Dry Tortugas National Park. The association has provided more than 2.5 million dollars in aid to the National Park Service areas of south Florida.

Medical Professionals Who Care License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to Florida Benevolent Group, Inc., to assist low income individuals in obtaining a medical education and career through scholarships, support, and guidance. Up to 10 percent of fees may be used for administrative costs and marketing of the plate.

Florida Benevolent Group, Inc.

The Florida Benevolent Group provides scholarships and ongoing support to individuals who desire a career in the medical profession. $\frac{45}{}$

Florida Native License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to Florida Native Plant Society to fulfill its mission. Of the fees:

- Up to 10 percent may be used for administrative costs;
- Up to 10 percent may be used to market and promote the plate;
- At least 25 percent must be dedicated to maintaining, improving, and restoring public hunting and fishing habitats; and
- 25 percent used to promote the cultivation of Florida's agricultural products.

Florida Native Plant Society⁴⁶

The mission of the Florida Native Plant Society is to promote the preservation, conservation, and restoration of Florida's native plants through support for conservation land acquisition, land management, research, public policies, and education.

Protect Pollinators License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to Florida Wildflower Foundation, Inc. Up to 10 percent of annual use fees are for promotion and marketing of the plate. The remaining proceeds are to be invested and reinvested, and the interest used to establish pollinator wildflower habitats and pollinator education and research programs.

Florida Wildflower Foundation, Inc.⁴⁷

The organization's mission is to "enrich lives with Florida native wildflowers through education, planting and research."

National Wild Turkey Federation License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to the Florida State Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation. Up to 25 percent of proceeds may be used for marketing of the plate, administrative costs, and promotion and education regarding Florida's hunting heritage. At least 75 percent of proceeds are to be used to fund programs and projects within the state that promote conservation or improve or increase turkey wildlife habitat.

National Wild Turkey Federation

The National Wild Turkey Federation was founded in 1973. The organization is dedicated to the conservation of wild turkey habitat and preserving hunting heritage. According to its website, the organization has invested \$488 million in its mission, and has improved more than 17 million acres of wildlife habitat. ⁴⁸ The Florida State Chapter of the organization is made up of officers and board of directors from local chapter members, and has a focus on local events and conservation projects around the state. ⁴⁹

Ducks Unlimited License Plate

Annual use fees will be distributed to Ducks Unlimited, Inc., to support the organization's mission and efforts for the conservation, restoration, and management of Florida wetlands and associated habitats for the benefit of waterfowl, other wildlife, and people. Up to 5 percent of proceeds may be used for administrative costs and marketing of the plate.

Ducks Unlimited, Inc.⁵⁰

Ducks Unlimited, Inc., is a non-profit and volunteer-based organization whose mission is to conserve, restore, and manage wetlands and associated habitats for North America's waterfowl. According to the Ducks Unlimited website, it is the world's largest and most effective waterfowl and wetlands conservation organization. The organization currently has habitat projects in all 50 states, every Canadian province, and key areas of Mexico.

Dogs Making a Difference License Plate

Annual use fees will be distributed to Southeastern Guide Dogs, Inc., for the training and promotion of dogs for use by veterans and citizens who are blind. Up to 10 percent of proceeds may be used for administrative costs and marketing of the plate.

Southeastern Guide Dogs, Inc.⁵¹

Southeastern Guide Dogs, Inc., is a non-profit organization located in Palmetto, Florida. The organization is accredited by the International Guide Dog Federation and Assistance Dogs International. It was founded in 1982, and employs "the latest in canine development and behavior research to create and nurture partnerships between visually impaired individuals and extraordinary guide dogs." According to its website, Southeastern Guide Dogs has matched over 2,800 guide dogs with individuals, and continues to place more than 100 dogs each year to help

people with visual impairments, and veterans. The charity provides its services free of charge and receives no government funding.

Educate Engage Empower License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to the Circuelle Foundation, Inc. Of the proceeds:

- Up to 10 percent may be used to market and promote the plate;
- Up to 10 percent may be used for administrative costs;
- 20 percent is to support breast cancer research; and
- The remainder is for Circuelle Foundation's programs, services, and activities to educated women about the risk factors of breast cancer and importance of breast health awareness.

Circuelle Foundation, Inc.⁵²

This non-profit organization was founded in 2013, with a mission to "empower and educate women to know their breasts, support healthy breast rituals, and feel comfortable with their body". The foundation promotes healthy body image and breast health education, and donates mammograms, ultrasounds, and imagery for women with limited financial resources.

Diabetes Awareness License Plate

Annual use fees are remitted to the Department of Health to be distributed. Of the fees:

- 35 percent is retained by the Department of Health for diabetes-specific health services for state residents, of which up to 10 percent may be used for administrative and marketing expenses;
- 35 percent is distributed to the Florida American Diabetes Association, Inc., for scholarships in the health fields, promote health and wellness among minority populations, and diabetes awareness based on identified needs. Up to 5 percent of this amount may be used for administrative expenses; and
- 30 percent is distributed to LIFT Health Organization, Inc., for grants to promote community engagement; education, scholarships, and research; and provide medical bracelets to persons with diabetes. Up to 5 percent of this amount may be used for administrative and marketing expenses.

Florida American Diabetes Association, Inc.

At the time of publication, staff was unable to find information about or a corporate filing for this organization. It is unclear if the organization is affiliated with the American Diabetes Association⁵³.

LIFT Health Organization, Inc. 54

L.I.F.T. (Life Is Full of Truth) Health Organization aides in creating solutions for health issues and lifestyle inadequacies.

Rotary License Plate

Annual use fees are distributed to the Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, Inc., who distributes the funds as follows:

- Up to 10 percent for administrative costs and for marketing the plate;
- 10 percent to Rotary's Camp Florida for direct support to all programs and services provided to special needs children who attend the camp; and
- The remainder to each Rotary district in the state in support of Rotary youth programs in Florida.

Rotary's Camp Florida⁵⁵

Rotary's Camp Florida is a non-profit organization providing camping facilities to children and adults with special needs. The facility is a 21-acre camp located in Brandon, Florida, which provides user groups with clean, safe, and barrier-free camping. The facility meets the full standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act. Half of the cost to rent the camp is paid by the disability user group and half is subsidized by Rotary Clubs throughout Florida. There is no charge to a child attending the camp.

Rotary Club⁵⁶

Rotary is a 1.2 million-member, international organization dedicated to service. Rotary clubs bring together individuals to exchange ideas, build relationships, and take action. There are numerous Rotary clubs throughout the state.

Tampa Bay Rowdies License Plate

The Tampa Bay Rowdies is an American professional soccer team.⁵⁷ The Rowdies are part of the NASL, and play home games in St. Petersburg, Florida. The team was originally established in 1975 and won the NASL Soccer Bowl in its inaugural year. It was reestablished in 2008, began playing in 2010, and won the NASL Soccer Bowl Championship in 2012.

Annual use fees are provided as specified for Florida Professional Sports Team license plates.

Margaritaville License Plate

Annual use fees will be distributed to the Singing for Change Foundation for the organization's programs that focus on developing creative and sustainable communities through educational, economic, and cultural projects that will improve the quality of life in Florida. Up to 10 percent of the proceeds may be used for promotion and marketing of the plate.

Singing for Change Foundation⁵⁸

Singing for Change is a private foundation established by Jimmy Buffet in 1995. \$1 of every Jimmy Buffet concert ticket goes to the Foundation. Its mission is to fund organizations that bring about positive change, focusing on grassroots organizations that rely heavily on volunteer

efforts. The foundation has disbursed almost \$9 million in grants. According to its website, the foundation looks for groups:

- Working to engage individuals in their communities;
- Helping people realize their full potential and become self-sufficient; and
- Creating lasting change in the communities they serve.

Changes to Existing Specialty Plates

Conserve Wildlife License Plate

The bill modifies the use of annual fees from the sale of the Conserve Wildlife specialty plates.⁵⁹ The bill allows the specialty plate revenue to be used by the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to provide bear-resistant residential garbage containers.

In God We Trust License Plate

The distribution and use of annual use fees of the In God We Trust specialty plate⁶⁰ are modified to allow a *maximum* of 10 percent of annual use fees to be used to offset marketing, administration, and promotion of the plate. The bill repeals provisions requiring the fees to be used for the children of public safety employees and U.S. military members who have died in the line of duty who are not covered by existing law. Instead, the fees will be used to address the needs of military service members and public safety employees, their spouses and dependents, in addition to uses already in statute.

Share the Road License Plate

The bill decreases the amount of annual use fees from the Share the Road plate for marketing and promotion of the concept and plate, from up to 25 percent to up to 15 percent. It removes the Florida Bicycle Association, Inc., from receiving funds from the sale of the plate, and requires Bike Florida, Inc., to use up to 25 percent of annual use fees for the marketing and promotion of Bike Florida Tours. The bill also adds that Bike Florida must use the remaining funds to give an annual presentation on bicycle and motorist safety in North, Central, and South Florida, and use funds for the promotion of safe bicycling as well as uses already in statute.

Florida Professional Sports Team License Plates

The bill adds the North American Soccer League to the Florida Professional Sports Team license plates for the purpose of adding two NASL teams: The Jacksonville Armada Football Club and Tampa Bay Rowdies.

Effective Date and Contingency Clause

The bill takes effect October 1, 2016, if SB 1390 or similar legislation is adopted this session or an extension thereof and becomes law.

SB 1390 increases the minimum pre-sale requirement for specialty plates from 1,000 plates to 4,000. If both bills become law, all proposed specialty plates within this bill must sell 4,000 pre-sale vouchers within the 24-month pre-sale period to be manufactured.

Individuals who choose to purchase a specialty license plate created in the bill will pay a \$25 annual use fee in addition to appropriate license taxes and fees. The organization designated to receive those fees, after retention of funds by the DHSMV to defray departmental expenditures, will receive revenue from each purchase.

C. Government Sector Impact:

According to the DHSMV, the cost for the minimum required number of each specialty license plate to be designed and manufactured is \$11,280. In addition, the DHSMV will also have programming costs to develop all new specialty license plates. The DHSMV is authorized to retain revenues from the first proceeds of specialty license plate sales to defray departmental expenditures related to the specialty license plate program. ⁶¹

- (a) The department shall develop an America the Beautiful license plate as provided in this section and s. 320.08053. The word "Florida" must appear at the top of the plate, and the words "America the Beautiful" must appear at the bottom of the plate.
- (b) The annual use fees from the sale of the plate shall be distributed to the America the Beautiful Fund, which may use a maximum of 10 percent of the proceeds to offset administrative costs of the organization and to market and promote the plate, and the remainder of the proceeds for programs in support of military service members and their families and advancing selfsufficiency in children and families; educational scholarships; and land and wildlife conservation to ensure sustained and equitable benefit to people, animals, and wildlife.
 - (87) TEAM HAMMY LICENSE PLATES.-
- (a) The department shall develop a Team Hammy license plate as provided in this section and s. 320.08053. Team Hammy license

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plates must bear the colors and design approved by the department. The word "Florida" must appear at the top of the plate, and the words "Team Hammy" must appear at the bottom of the plate.

- (f) Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.—The annual use fees from the sale of the plate shall be distributed as follows:
- 1. Ten percent shall be distributed to the Delta Research and Educational Foundation, a charitable, nonprofit organization under s. 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and used solely for marketing of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., license plate.
- 2. Eighty-five percent shall be distributed to the Delta Research and Educational Foundation and used to promote community awareness and action through educational, economic, and cultural service activities.
- 3. Five percent shall be distributed to the United Negro College Fund to be used for college scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities.
- (g) Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.—The annual use fees from the sale of the plate shall be distributed as follows:
- 1. Ten percent shall be distributed to the Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation, Inc., a charitable, nonprofit organization under s. 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and used solely for marketing of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., license plate.

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- 2. Eighty-five percent shall be distributed to Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation, Inc., and used to promote community awareness and action through educational, economic, and cultural service activities.
- 3. Five percent shall be distributed to the United Negro College Fund to be used for college scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities.
- (h) Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc.—The annual use fees from the sale of the plate shall be distributed as follows:
- 1. Ten percent shall be distributed to the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority National Education Fund, Inc., a charitable, nonprofit organization under s. 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and used solely for marketing of the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc., license plate.
- 2. Eighty-five percent shall be distributed to the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority National Education Fund, Inc., and used to promote community awareness and action through educational, economic, and cultural service activities.
- 3. Five percent shall be distributed to the United Negro College Fund to be used for college scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities.
 - (89) VISION FOR EXCELLENCE LICENSE PLATES.-
- (a) The department shall develop a Vision For Excellence license plate as provided in this section and s. 320.08053. The plate must bear the colors and design approved by the department. The word "Florida" must appear at the top of the plate, and the words "Vision For Excellence" must appear at the



bottom of the plate.

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(b) The annual use fees from the sale of such plates shall be distributed to Vision For Excellence, Inc., which shall retain all such proceeds until all startup costs for developing and establishing the plates have been recovered. Thereafter, the proceeds shall be used by Vision For Excellence, Inc., for direct support of programs, services, and activities provided to children who participate in Vision For Excellence, Inc., youth development programs. Up to 10 percent of the annual use fee revenue may be used for promotion and marketing of the specialty license plate, and up to 10 percent of the annual fee revenue may be used for administrative costs directly associated with the programs.

(90) GO BOATING LICENSE PLATES.-

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marketing costs. The balance of the fees shall be used by Furry Friends of Florida, Inc., for activities, programs, and 389 projects, including, but not limited to, pet rescue, animal shelters, pet vaccinations, veterinary services, and service animals.

- (95) ORLANDO CITY SOCCER CLUB LICENSE PLATES.—The department shall develop an Orlando City Soccer Club license plate as provided in subsection (9).
 - (96) SUPPORT OUR CONSTITUTION LICENSE PLATES. -
- (a) The department shall develop a Support Our Constitution license plate as provided in this section and s. 320.08053. Support Our Constitution license plates must bear the colors and design approved by the department. The word "Florida" must appear at the top of the plate, and the words "Support Our Constitution" must appear at the bottom of the plate.
- (b) The annual use fees shall be distributed to The Constitution Foundation, Inc., which may retain all proceeds from the annual use fees until the startup costs for developing and issuing the license plates have been recovered. Thereafter, The Constitution Foundation, Inc., shall use the proceeds as follows:
- 1. A maximum of 15 percent may be used for administrative costs of the organization.
- 2. A maximum of 10 percent may be used for promotion and the marketing costs of the license plate.
- 3. The remainder shall be used to fund the activities, programs, projects, and mission of The Constitution Foundation, Inc., to increase awareness and understanding of the United States Constitution in Florida's public schools, recruit and

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train school leaders to make presentations in each school district, and provide to each student, at no charge, learning materials and a pocket Constitution.

- (97) NATIONAL WILD TURKEY FEDERATION LICENSE PLATES.-
- (a) The department shall develop a National Wild Turkey Federation license plate as provided in this section and s. 320.08053. The plate must bear the colors and design approved by the department. The word "Florida" must appear at the top of the plate, and the words "National Wild Turkey Federation" must appear at bottom of the plate.
- (b) The annual use fees from the sale of the plate shall be distributed to the Florida State Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation to be used as follows:
- 1. Up to 25 percent of the funds may be used for marketing of the license plate, for promotion and education regarding this state's hunting heritage, and for administrative costs directly associated with the operation of the chapter.
- 2. At least 75 percent of the funds must be used to fund programs and projects within the state that promote conservation or that improve or increase turkey wildlife habitat. To the extent feasible, turkey wildlife habitat projects shall be coordinated with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

 - 3. Five percent shall be distributed to the United Negro College Fund to be used for college scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities.
 - (f) Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.—The annual use fees from the sale of the plate shall be distributed as follows:

- 3. Five percent shall be distributed to the United Negro College Fund to be used for college scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities.
- (h) Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc.—The annual use fees from the sale of the plate shall be distributed as follows:
- 1. Ten percent shall be distributed to the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority National Education Fund, Inc., a charitable, nonprofit organization under s. 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and used solely for marketing of the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc., license plate.
- 2. Eighty-five percent shall be distributed to the Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority National Education Fund, Inc., and used to promote community awareness and action through educational, economic, and cultural service activities.
- 3. Five percent shall be distributed to the United Negro College Fund to be used for college scholarships for Florida residents attending historically black colleges and universities.
 - (89) VISION FOR EXCELLENCE LICENSE PLATES.-

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train school leaders to make presentations in each school district, and provide to each student, at no charge, learning materials and a pocket Constitution. (97) DUCKS UNLIMITED LICENSE PLATES.-

- (a) The department shall develop a Ducks Unlimited license plate as provided in this section and s. 320.08053. Ducks Unlimited license plates must bear the colors and design approved by the department. The word "Florida" must appear at the top of the plate, and the words "Conserving Florida Wetlands" must appear at the bottom of the plate.
- (b) The annual use fees from the sale of the plate shall be distributed to Ducks Unlimited, Inc., a nonprofit corporation under s. 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, to be used as follows:
- 1. Up to 5 percent may be used for administrative costs and marketing of the plate.
- 2. A minimum of 95 percent shall be used to support the mission and efforts of Ducks Unlimited, Inc., for the conservation, restoration, and management of Florida wetlands and associated habitats for the benefit of waterfowl, other wildlife, and people.

- (a) The department shall develop an America the Beautiful license plate as provided in this section and s. 320.08053. The word "Florida" must appear at the top of the plate, and the words "America the Beautiful" must appear at the bottom of the plate.

- (b) The annual use fees shall be distributed to The Constitution Foundation, Inc., which may retain all proceeds from the annual use fees until the startup costs for developing and issuing the license plates have been recovered. Thereafter, The Constitution Foundation, Inc., shall use the proceeds as follows:
- 1. A maximum of 15 percent may be used for administrative costs of the organization.

Support Our Constitution license plates must bear the colors and design approved by the department. The word "Florida" must appear at the top of the plate, and the words "Support Our Constitution" must appear at the bottom of the plate.
- (b) The annual use fees shall be distributed to The Constitution Foundation, Inc., which may retain all proceeds from the annual use fees until the startup costs for developing and issuing the license plates have been recovered. Thereafter, The Constitution Foundation, Inc., shall use the proceeds as follows:
- 1. A maximum of 15 percent may be used for administrative costs of the organization.
- 2. A maximum of 10 percent may be used for promotion and the marketing costs of the license plate.
- 3. The remainder shall be used to fund the activities, programs, projects, and mission of The Constitution Foundation, Inc., to increase awareness and understanding of the United States Constitution in Florida's public schools, recruit and

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train school leaders to make presentations in each school district, and provide to each student, at no charge, learning materials and a pocket Constitution.

I. Summary:

CS/SB 168 repeals and amends various provisions of law to remove authorization for the use of traffic infraction detectors, commonly known as "red light cameras," which are currently used to enforce specified provisions of traffic law by automatically photographing vehicles whose drivers run red lights. The bill leaves intact the express preemption to the state of regulation of the use of red light cameras, thereby prohibiting implementation of red light camera programs by local ordinance.

II. Present Situation:

Traffic Infraction Detectors Generally

Traffic infraction detectors, or "red-light cameras," are used to enforce traffic laws by automatically photographing vehicles whose drivers run, or fail to yield at, red lights. The cameras are connected to the traffic signal and to sensors that monitor traffic flow at the crosswalk or stop line. The system continuously photographs vehicles that enter the intersection above a pre-set minimum speed after the signal has turned red. In some cases, video cameras are used. These video cameras and accompanying sensors record the license plate number, the date and time of day, the time elapsed since the signal has turned red and the vehicle's speed.

Traffic Infraction Detectors in Florida

In 2010, the Florida Legislature enacted ch. 2010-80, L.O.F. The law expressly preempted to the state regulation of the use of cameras for enforcing the provisions of ch. 316, F.S.¹ The law authorized the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV), counties, and municipalities to authorize officials to issue notices of violations of ss. 316.074(1) and 316.075(1)(c)1., F.S., for a driver's failure to stop at a traffic signal when such violation was identified by a traffic infraction detector.²

Municipalities may install or authorize installation of traffic infraction detectors on streets and highways in accordance with Department of Transportation (DOT) standards, and on state roads within the incorporated area when permitted by DOT.³ Counties may install or authorize installation of traffic infraction detectors on streets and highways in unincorporated areas of the county in accordance with DOT standards, and on state roads in unincorporated areas of the county when permitted by DOT.⁴ DHSMV may install or authorize installation of traffic infraction detectors on any state road under the original jurisdiction of DOT, when permitted by DOT.⁵

If DHSMV, a county, or a municipality installs a traffic infraction detector at an intersection, the respective governmental entity must notify the public that a traffic infraction device may be in use at that intersection, including specific notification of enforcement of violations concerning right turns.⁶ Such signage must meet the specifications for uniform signals and devices adopted by DOT pursuant to s. 316.0745, F.S.⁷

Notifications and Citations

If a traffic infraction detector identifies a vehicle violating ss. 316.074(1) or 316.075(1)(c)1., F.S., the visual information is captured and reviewed by a traffic infraction enforcement officer. Notices of violation and traffic citations may not be issued for failure to stop if the driver is making a right-hand turn "in a careful and prudent manner" at an intersection where right-hand turns are permissible, and may not be issued if the driver of the vehicle came to a complete stop after crossing the stop line and before turning right but failed to stop before crossing over the stop line.

A notification must be issued to the registered owner of a vehicle within 30 days of an alleged violation, ¹⁰ notifying the alleged violator that he or she must pay the required penalty to the county or municipality, ¹¹ furnish an affidavit setting forth an authorized defense (see below), or

request a hearing within 60 days of the date of the notification to avoid issuance of a uniform traffic citation. The notification must include notice that the owner has the right to review the photographic or electronic images or the streaming video evidence, which constitute(s) a rebuttable presumption against the vehicle owner, and must state the time and place, or the Internet location, where the evidence may be examined and observed. The notification must also direct the alleged violator to a website that provides information on the right to request a hearing and on all related court costs, and a form to request a hearing.

If the registered owner of the vehicle does not submit payment, request a hearing, or submit an affidavit setting forth an authorized defense within 60 days of receipt of the notification described above, the traffic infraction enforcement officer must issue a uniform traffic citation to the registered owner (first name on registration in cases of joint registration). The citation must also include the statements described above regarding review of the photographic or video evidence. The report of a traffic infraction enforcement officer and images provided by a traffic infraction detector are admissible in court and provide a rebuttable presumption the vehicle was used in a violation. A traffic infraction enforcement officer must provide by electronic transmission a replica of the citation data when issued under s. 316.0083, F.S., to the court having jurisdiction over the alleged offense or its traffic violations bureau within five days after the issuance date of the citation to the violator, or, if a hearing is requested, to the clerk for the local hearing officer having jurisdiction over the alleged offense within 14 days. The citation of the citation over the alleged offense within 14 days.

Defenses

The registered owner of the motor vehicle is responsible for payment of the fine unless the owner can establish that the vehicle:

- Passed through the intersection to yield the right-of-way to an emergency vehicle or as part of a funeral procession;
- Passed through the intersection at the direction of a law enforcement officer; or
- Was, at the time of the violation, in the care, custody, or control of another person.

Additional defenses are available if a law enforcement officer issues a uniform traffic citation for the alleged violation or if the owner was deceased on or before the date the uniform traffic citation was issued. ¹⁹

To establish any of these defenses, the owner of the vehicle must furnish an affidavit to the appropriate governmental entity within 30 days after the date of issuance of the uniform traffic citation that provides detailed information supporting an exemption as provided above, including relevant documents such as a police report (if the car had been reported stolen) or a copy of the uniform traffic citation, if issued.²⁰ If the owner submits an affidavit that another driver was

behind the wheel, the affidavit must contain the name, address, date of birth, and if known, the driver's license number, of the other driver.²¹ Upon receipt of an affidavit and required documentation, the appropriate governmental entity must dismiss the citation and provide proof of such dismissal to the person that submitted the affidavit.²² A notice of violation may then be issued to the person identified in the affidavit as having care, custody or control of the vehicle at the time of the alleged violation, and the affidavit from the registered owner may be used as evidence in a further proceeding regarding that person's alleged violation of ss. 316.074(1) or 316.075(1)(c)1., F.S.²³ Submission of a false affidavit is a second degree misdemeanor.²⁴

If a vehicle is leased, the owner of the leased vehicle is not responsible for paying the citation, nor required to submit an affidavit, if the motor vehicle is registered in the name of the lessee.²⁵ If a person presents documentation from the appropriate governmental entity that the citation was issued in error, the clerk of court may dismiss the case and may not charge for such service.²⁶

Fines

A fine of \$158 is levied on violators who fail to stop at a traffic signal as required by ss. 316.074(1) or 316.075(1)(c)1., F.S. When the \$158 fine is the result of a local government's traffic infraction detector, \$75 is retained by the local government and \$83 is deposited with the Department of Revenue (DOR). DOR subsequently distributes the fines by depositing \$70 in the General Revenue Fund, \$10 in the Department of Health Emergency Services Trust Fund, and \$3 in the Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Trust Fund. 28

If a law enforcement officer cites a motorist for the same offense, the fine is still \$158, but the revenue is distributed from the local clerk of court to DOR, where \$30 is distributed to the General Revenue Fund, \$65 is distributed to the Department of Health Emergency Services Trust Fund, and \$3 is distributed to the Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Trust Fund. The remaining \$60 is distributed in small percentages to a number of funds pursuant to s. 318.21, F.S.²⁹

Violations of ss. 316.074(1) or 316.075(1)(c)1., F.S., enforced by traffic infraction detectors may not result in points being assessed against the operator's driver's license and may not be used for the purpose of setting motor vehicle insurance rates.³⁰

Actual Revenues

According to the DOR website, from July 2014 through June 2015, 75 jurisdictions operated red light camera programs throughout the state. DOR reports the state portion of the fines collected during that fiscal year amount to \$54,114,003. Of the total, \$45,644,880 was distributed to the

General Revenue Fund; \$6,514,765 was distributed to the Health Administration Trust Fund; and \$1,954,389 was distributed to the Brain & Spinal Cord Injury Trust Fund.³¹

Impact on Crashes and Fatalities

Research reveals numerous studies of the impact of red light cameras on crashes and fatalities, and the studies are contradictory.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Section 1 of the bill amends s. 316.003, F.S., to repeal the current subsection (87) definition of "traffic infraction detector," currently defined to mean a vehicle sensor installed to work in conjunction with a traffic control signal and a camera or cameras synchronized to automatically record two or more sequenced photographic or electronic images or streaming video of only the rear of a motor vehicle at the time the vehicle fails to stop behind the stop bar or clearly marked stop line when facing a traffic control signal steady red light. Also removed is the requirement to include in any notice of violation or traffic citation issued by the use of a traffic infraction detector a photograph or other recorded image showing both the license tag of the offending vehicle and the traffic control device being violated.

This section of the bill also amends s. 316.003, F.S., to repeal the current subsection (91) definition of "local hearing officer," currently defined to mean the person, designated by a department, county, or municipality that elects to authorize traffic infraction enforcement officers to issue traffic citations under s. 316.0083(1)(a), who is authorized to conduct hearings related to a notice of violation issued pursuant to s. 316.0083. Authorization of a charter county, noncharter county, or municipality to use a currently appointed code enforcement board or special magistrate to serve as the local hearing officer, as well as authorization of the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles to enter into interlocal agreements to use a county or municipal local hearing officer, is likewise removed.

Section 2 amends s. 316.008, F.S., to repeal the current subsection (8) authorization of counties or municipalities to install, or authorize the installation of, and use traffic infraction detectors to enforce specified provisions of traffic law relating to obedience to traffic control signals and stopping a vehicle facing a steady red signal.

Section 3 repeals s. 316.0083, F.S., the "Mark Wandall Traffic Safety Program," which currently:

- Authorizes DHSMV, a county, or a municipality to authorize a traffic infraction enforcement
 officer to issue traffic citations for specified provisions of traffic law relating to obedience to
 traffic control signals and stopping a vehicle facing a steady red signal;
- Prohibits issuance of notices of violation or traffic citations for failing to stop while making rolling, "right-on-red" turns in a "careful and prudent manner" and for failing to stop before crossing the stop line or other point at which a stop is required when making a "right-on-red" turn;
- Provides the process and requirements for issuance of notices of violation, sets forth specific information to be included in such notices; provides alternative options for an alleged

violator, including providing a specified affidavit, requesting a hearing, or paying the penalty stated in the notice; provides penalty amounts and fine distributions; and prohibits certain individuals manufacturers, or vendors from receiving commissions, fees, or remuneration relating to the use of traffic infraction detectors;

- Provides the process and requirements for issuance of traffic citations; sets forth specific
 information to be included in such notices; provides for defenses to be established by
 affidavit, states requirements for information to be included in such affidavits, provides
 penalties for submission of false affidavits; provides for dismissal of citations and issuance of
 notices of violation and traffic citations to the person designated in an affidavit as having
 care, custody, or control of the motor vehicle at the time of the violation; and provides for
 supplemental enforcement;
- Requires each county or municipality that operates traffic infraction detectors to provide a
 specified annual summary report to DHSMV regarding the use and operation of traffic
 infraction detectors, and requires DHSMV to prepare an annual report to the Governor,
 Senate President, and House Speaker; and
- Sets forth procedures for hearings on notices of violation and authorizes a specified appeal of a final administrative order.

Section 4 repeals s, 316.00831, F.S., which currently provides for retention by a county or municipality and subsequent remission to the Department of Revenue, as appropriate, of penalties collected for notices of violation during the interim between passage of the Mark Wandall Safety Program in 2010 and DOR's notification of its ability to receive and distribute the retained funds.

Section 5 repeals s. 316.07456, F.S., which currently requires deployed traffic infraction detectors to meet specifications published by DOT and be tested at regular intervals according to DOT specifications; requires DOT to establish such specifications on or before December 31, 2010; and provides that any detectors in operation before July 1, 2011, are not required to meet the DOT specifications until July 1, 2011.

Section 6 repeals s. 316.0776, F.S., which currently provides permitting, placement, and installation standards for traffic infraction detectors; and for signage, public announcement, and public awareness campaigns under certain conditions.

Section 7 amends s. 318.15, F.S., to repeal provision in current subsection (3) for withholding of a license plate or revalidation sticker for any motor vehicle owned or co-owned by a person who failed to pay the penalty, comply with the terms of a payment plan or order, or failed to appear at a hearing; and authorizes a person to challenge the withholding solely on the basis that the outstanding fines and civil penalties have been paid.

Section 8 repeals s. 321.50, F.S., which currently authorizes DHSMV to use traffic infraction detectors to enforce specified provisions of traffic law relating to obedience to traffic control signals and stopping a vehicle facing a steady red signal on state roads under DOT jurisdiction when permitted by DOT.

Section 9 amends s. 28.37(5), F.S., to remove a cross reference and to correct a cross reference to conform to changes made by the act.

Section 10 amends s. 316.640(1)(b) and (5)(a), F.S., to remove DHSMV authorization to designate employees as traffic infraction enforcement officers; instruction and training requirements for such officers; provisions relating to such officers carrying firearms or other weapons and making arrests; the requirement that such officers be physically located in the state.; authorization of such officers to issue traffic citations under the Mark Wandall Traffic Safety Program; and authorization of any sheriff's department or police department of a municipality to designate employees as traffic infraction officers.

Section 11 amends s. 316.650(3)(a) and (c), F.S., to remove a cross reference to conform to changes made by the act and to remove provisions relating to provision of replicas of traffic citations and notices of violation issued under the Mark Wandall Traffic Safety Program.

Section 12 amends s. 318.121, F.S., to remove a cross reference to conform to changes made by the act.

Section 13 amends s. 318.14(2), F.S., to remove a cross reference to conform to changes made by the act.

Section 14 amends s. 318.18(15) and (22), F.S., to remove penalty amounts for red light violations enforced by a traffic infraction enforcement officer; distribution requirements for fines collected from traffic infraction detector programs; provisions for dismissal of notices of violation or traffic citations issued in error; the prohibition against certain individuals manufacturers, or vendors receiving commissions, fees, or remuneration relating to the use of traffic infraction detectors; and authorization of local hearing officers to order payment of county or municipal costs, not to exceed \$250.

Section 15 amends s. 320.03(8), F.S., to remove a cross reference to conform to changes made by the act.

Section 16 amends s. 322.27(3)((d), F.S., to remove prohibitions against imposition of driver license points for red light violations enforced by a traffic infraction enforcement officer and against using red light violations enforced by a traffic infraction enforcement officer to set motor vehicle insurance rates.

Section 17 provides that the act takes effect July 1, 2019.

Because the preemption provisions of s. 316.0076, F.S., remain in statute, local governments will have no authority to implement red light camera programs.

B. Private Sector Impact:

The possible imposition of a \$158 fine (and potential court costs) for red light violations detected by red light cameras is eliminated.

C. Government Sector Impact:

The state portion of the \$158 fine is \$83. The bill would eliminate the source of this revenue for the distributions identified above. Revenue from fines collected for red light violation citations issued by law enforcement officers would continue to be distributed to the identified funds.

The local jurisdiction retains \$75 of the \$158 fine. The bill would eliminate this source of revenue but would also eliminate expenses related to operating and maintaining red light camera programs. No future revenues would be realized following repeal of red light camera authorization.
