


## FLORIDA CENTRAL OPERATIONS AND COORDINATION OFFICE

## **NEW STATE EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER**

Florida is constructing a new State Emergency Operations Center in Tallahassee, located in Southwood, which is on track to open Spring, 2026.

### **Ongoing: RECOVERY**

#### State Non-Congregate Sheltering Program

- Survivors in 52 counties had homes impacted by both Helene and Milton.
- Over 1,100 displaced households sheltered.
- **Over 1,400** travel trailers donated to local jurisdictions and non-profit partners.

#### Volunteer Village

 Sarasota County – At its peak, provided lodging for up to 250 volunteers to serve surrounding impacted communities.

#### Public Assistance

Obligated: \$1.2 billion

# **HURRICANE HELENE- SEPTEMBER 26, 2024**

### **Ongoing: RECOVERY**

#### Debris Task Force

- Following Hurricane Helene and prior to Hurricane Milton, the Debris Task Force quickly coordinated with local officials on how to better address the counties' needs.
- As of September 2025, more than 31.6 million cubic yards of debris have been reported as removed statewide for Helene and Milton.

#### Public Assistance

• Obligated: \$625.6 million

In Development: \$524.7 million





### **Ongoing: RECOVERY & MITIGATION**

#### Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

It is currently estimated that the state will receive \$45.4 million in hazard mitigation funding to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures in communities impacted by Hurricane Debby.









# **HURRICANE IDALIA – AUGUST 27, 2023**

#### **RECOVERY**

State Non-Congregate Sheltering Program (Complete)

• Survivors in **18** counties impacted by Hurricane Idalia were eligible to apply for sheltering assistance from the State of Florida.

128 Households received sheltering assistance with 45 households placed in hotel rooms and
 83 households placed in travel trailers.





## **HURRICANE IAN – SEPTEMBER 28, 2022**

#### **RECOVERY**

- State Non-Congregate Sheltering Program (Complete)
  - Survivors in **26** counties impacted by Hurricane Ian were eligible to apply for sheltering assistance from the State of Florida.
  - 1,175 Households received sheltering assistance with placement in travel trailers at their damaged dwellings or a nearby commercial park location.
- State Home Repair Connection (SHRC) Program (Complete)
  - Over 970 Ian impacted Florida homes received no-cost habitability repairs via a public private partnership between Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOADs), Volunteer Florida, and the Florida Division of Emergency Management to enable residents to return to their home.
  - The average value of these repairs was \$16,132, and the average construction time to repair a home was 22 days.

## FLORIDA RECOVERY OBLIGATION CALCULATION (F-ROC)

- F-ROC is a program that implements a **standardized approach** to FEMA's Public Assistance (PA) process.
- Reducing risk of noncompliance with federal program requirements and helping communities Prepare to Recover.





## **ELEVATE FLORIDA PROGRAM SNAPSHOT**



Elevate Florida is a **first-of-its-kind**, groundbreaking statewide residential mitigation program designed to improve the resilience of homes and communities across the state. The program is funded by two Federal Emergency Management Agency grants: the **Flood Mitigation Assistance** (FMA) **Swift Current** and the **Hazard Mitigation Grant Program** (HMGP). More than 12,000 Floridians have applied for assistance through Elevate Florida. Based on current funding levels, Elevate Florida will **assist 1,500-2,000 property owners**.

#### **Funding Breakdown**

Elevate Florida expanded its mitigation efforts by partnering with 37 counties that contributed a portion of their HMGP allocations to the State. Elevate Florida funds are being used to help more Floridians protect their homes, with each county's allocation benefiting its own residents.

## **ELEVATE FLORIDA PROGRAM STATUS**

Jul

On July 16, 2025, 295 Swift Current properties were submitted to FEMA under Elevate Florida.

Aug

The program has completed HMGP project prioritization and notified all applicants of their status. More than 600 homeowners will advance, pending submission of signed forms and inspection cost-share. 300 properties have been placed on the waitlist and may move forward if spots open due to withdrawals.

Fall 2025

As HMGP applicants submit their agreements and inspection costshare, inspections are being scheduled and completed in batches. By late October, the first batch of HMGP applications will be submitted for funding determination.



The program anticipates breaking ground and beginning construction on projects as soon as FEMA awards are received.

- DEMES is a modern, cloud-based platform designed to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of all Florida Division of Emergency Management's (FDEM) operations.
- Built on Salesforce, **DEMES** integrates the agency's separated manual and computer systems that did not directly communicate with one another, combining them into a unified system that increases the speed, accuracy, and transparency of all FDEM and partner agency actions.
- DEMES offers both internal applications for FDEM staff and external portals for partners, enabling effective communication and collaboration.

# WEB-BASED (WEB) EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER (EOC)

## What is WebEOC?

- WebEOC is a web-based information management system.
- This platform allows the State Emergency Response Team (SERT) to use the same volunteer, and mutual aid entities, to use the same operating environment when responding to and recovering from and emergency.
- The goal for FDEM statewide WebEOC initiative is to provide the opportunity for all of Florida Counties to utilize WebEOC.

### **WebEOC Benefits**



#### **Information Storage**

WebEOC creates a system of record for both county and state agencies. This allows for a historical depository database for utilization in after action reviews and improvement plans.



#### Free up County Funding

Statewide WebEOC integration allows for county emergency management agencies to free up funding for additional needed emergency preparedness utilization.



#### **Streamline Data Management**

WebEOC minimizes the local burden of technology management by streamlining data sharing between cities, counties, and FDEM. Statewide integration improves coordination at all levels of government during a disaster.
