## **FLORIDA FOREVER PROGRAM**

#### **OVERVIEW**



- Florida is recognized as a national leader in conservation, which is vital to our state's environmental protection and economic growth.
- Florida Forever acquisitions provide a host of benefits, including water quality and quantity, resilience from storm impacts, habitat and species protection, and outdoor recreation.



## **FLORIDA FOREVER PROGRAM**

#### **ACQUISITION TYPES**





- There are two different ways land is acquired under Florida Forever:
  - Conservation Easement: The state owns certain rights to the property, but the seller retains ownership.
  - Fee Simple: The state owns the property outright.
- The type of acquisition depends on a variety of factors, but both ways conserve the land in perpetuity.

# FLORIDA FOREVER PROGRAM EXPENDITURES AND SUCCESSES





- Since January 2019, over \$1.4 billion has been committed to the Florida Forever program.
- During this time, DEP has acquired over 374,000 acres, 91% of which are within the Florida Wildlife Corridor.

# FLORIDA FOREVER PROGRAM EXPENDITURES AND SUCCESSES



- Last year, DEP acquired 68,764 acres of conservation and recreation land.
  - 53% were conservation easements.
  - 47% were fee simple acquisitions.
- In 2025, DEP has acquired 80,181 acres to date.

# FLORIDA FOREVER PROGRAM DISPOSITION OF CONSERVATION LAND



- Article X, Section 18 of the Florida Constitution, and Chapters 253 and 259, Florida Statutes, provide stringent protections for state-owned conservation lands.
- The disposition of conservation land requires:
  - 1. The Acquisition and Restoration Council's evaluation and recommendation to the Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund that the land is no longer needed for conservation purposes.
  - 2. The Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund's approval for the disposition of conservation land.
- Over the past 10 years, only 2.32 acres of conservation land has been sold, and 65 acres were exchanged for 139 acres of conservation land.
- No conservation easements acquired under the Florida Forever program have been released.

- 12,262 acres acquired in Bay County for a new state forest.
- 74 acres acquired as an addition to Allen David Broussard Catfish Creek Preserve State Park in Polk County.

- 200<sup>th</sup> conservation easement acquired.

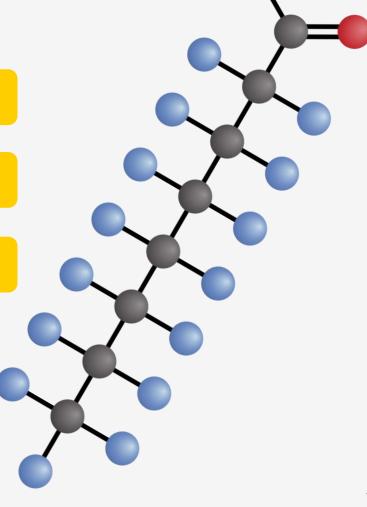

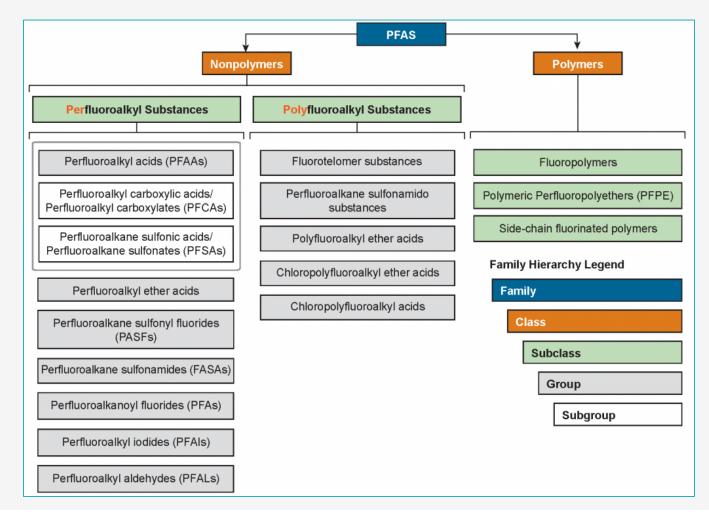
#### **PFAS Overview**

#### PFAS are a complex family of more than 10,000 unique, manmade organic compounds.

- Unique physical and chemical properties
- Oil and water repellent
- Temperature resistant
- Environmentally persistent
- Manufactured and used for more than 70 years
- Not widely documented in environmental samples until the early 2000s
- The two most manufactured, used, and studied PFAS are perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS)



## PFAS Overview continued





#### PFAS Overview continued

#### Widely Distributed in Humans and the Environment:

- Stain-resistant carpets
- Water-resistant fabrics
- Oil and grease-resistant packaging
- Personal care products
- Product recovery enhancer for oil and mining
- AFFF (aqueous firefighting foam)

























# **PFAS Health Impacts**

# Possible non-cancerous effects caused by PFAS exposure may include:

- Increased cholesterol levels
- Reduced ability of the immune system to fight infections
- Changes in liver enzymes
- Hypertension and preeclampsia in pregnant women
- Small decreases in birth weight
- Decreased fertility



# PFAS Health Impacts continued

Exposure to some PFAS may increase the risk of developing cancer.

- Kidney
- Testicular

While the evidence is not always sufficient to establish a causal link, studies are ongoing to better understand the relationship between PFAS exposure and cancer development.



# **Protecting from PFAS**

Reduce or limit contact when possible, prioritizing the reduction of PFAS exposure from drinking water and food.

- Filter drinking water.
- Reduce or limit consumption of food stored in grease resistant packages, containers, and wrappers.
- Reduce or limit use of non-stick cookware. Stainless steel, cast iron, or porcelain cookware products are good PFAS-free alternatives.
  - Cookware labeled as PFOA and PFOS free does not always mean it is free from all PFAS chemicals.



PFOA PFOS - Perfluorooctanoic acid

- Perfluorooctanesulfonic acid

PFOS and PFOA are the most studied because they are among the most widely produced and used types.

# Protecting from PFAS continued

- Many common products have been tested which contain levels of PFAS.
- Choosing products that do not contain these compounds is recommended.

DOH is the agency responsible for Florida's public health system.

- Determines non-enforceable drinking water health advisory level for Florida if regulation/enforceable standards are not available:
  - In 2018, DOH adopted non-enforceable lifetime health advisory for the combined amount of PFOA and PFOS in drinking water of 70 nanograms per liter (ng/L) developed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)

Note: EPA announced enforceable drinking water standards for PFOA and PFOS of 4.0 ng/L individually



DOH is the agency responsible for Florida's public health system.

- Determines non-enforceable drinking water health advisory level if regulation/enforceable standards are not available
- Conducts well investigation and testing through a contract with DEP including water assessment and routine data monitoring:
  - Since 2016, DOH has collected 3,826 water samples for PFAS testing
  - Provides guidance on potable water testing and results interpretation



DOH is the agency responsible for Florida's public health system.

- Determines non-enforceable drinking water health advisory level if regulation/enforceable standards are not available
- Conducts well surveys and surveillances through a contract with DEP including water assessment and routine data monitoring
- Conducts risk communication and health impact assessments to identify potential risk to human health from exposure to PFAS:
  - Open houses and community events
  - Health consultations and assessments
  - Factsheets, brochures, and information on frequently asked questions



DOH is the agency responsible for Florida's public health system.

- Determines non-enforceable drinking water health advisory level if regulation/enforceable standards are not available
- Conducts well surveys and surveillances through a contract with DEP including water assessments and routine data monitoring
- Conducts risk communication and health risk assessments to identify potential risk to human health from exposure to PFAS
- Develops fish consumption advisories for specific water locations



# What Other States Are Doing

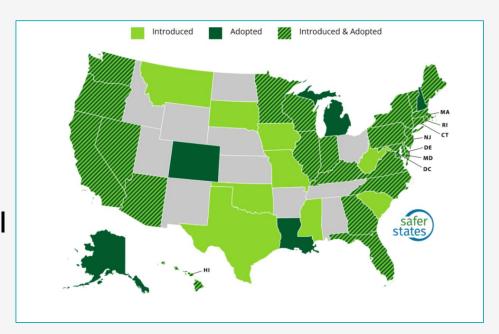
#### Other states address PFAS through a multi-faceted approach.

- Banning the chemical in products:
  - Maine: Full ban planned on consumer goods by 2030
- Taking legal action against manufacturers
- Establishing regulatory/enforceable standards or health advisory levels in drinking water
- Several states and the District of Columbia have issued fish consumption advisories specifically for PFAS, varying by location, fish species, and PFAS type (Alabama, Alaska, Connecticut, Indiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Washington, and Wisconsin)



# What Other States are Doing continued

- Increased testing and monitoring of surface water, sludge, and air for PFAS contamination.
- Maine has written the EPA 2024
   PFAS standards into state law to
   ensure protections remain
   enforceable, regardless of federal
   changes.
- 405 state policies have been adopted in 40 states.

# Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) INTRODUCTION

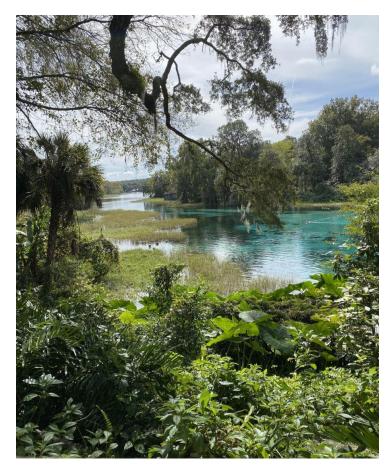


- PFAS are a large class of complex, manmade chemicals that do not naturally degrade.
- In certain circumstances, releases of PFAS into the environment may pose a risk to public health and the environment.
- DEP continues to take actions to protect the health of Floridians and our natural resources.



#### PFAS HISTORY





**2013** – **2015:** Sampling completed for Environmental Protections Agency's third Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule (**UCMR3**):

- PFOA and PFOS among the list of 30 Contaminants of Emerging Concern (CECs).
- Three Florida public water systems identified exceedances of the Health Advisory Level (HAL) and took appropriate measures to reduce the levels of PFOA and PFOS in the water supply.

**May 2016:** 

EPA issued lifetime drinking water HALs for PFOA and PFOS of 70 parts per trillion (ppt) or **0.07 parts per billion (ppb)** either individually or in combination (PFOA + PFOS).

#### SITE INVESTIGATION ANALYSIS

#### **HISTORY**



#### 2016:

DEP's Site Investigation Section (SIS) begins investigations to determine the sources of PFAS to the three public water systems identified under UCMR3:

- Identified a number of the source areas were related to the use of Aqueous Firefighting Foam (AFFF), a known source of PFOA and PFOS;
- Evaluated drycleaners in the State's Drycleaning Solvent Cleanup Program (DSCP); and
- Inventoried sites in state-funded cleanup programs and conducted sampling of landfills, plating facilities, and chemical manufacturers.



## PROVISIONAL CLEANUP TARGET LEVELS





**2018:** DEP developed provisional groundwater and soil cleanup target levels (P-CTLs) for PFOA and PFAS.

**Groundwater:** 70 ppt individually or in combination (same as EPA HAL).

## SITE INVESTIGATION ACTIONS

### **HISTORY**



When groundwater samples around Site Investigations Services assessment sites are greater than 70 ppt, the following occurs:

- DOH completes sampling private wells within a half mile radius;
- Sampling extends beyond the half-mile radius if there are exceedances of HAL; and
- DEP's Water Supply Restoration Program immediately provides bottled water until a permanent solution (filter or connection to public water supply) is accomplished at no cost to the property owner.

## **CONTINUED STATE AND FEDERAL ACTIONS**



**Dec. 2021:** EPA publishes **UCMR5**:

Requires sampling for 29 PFAS and lithium between 2023 and 2025.

**June 2022:** EPA issues interim Health Advisory for PFOA (4 ppt) and PFOS (2 ppt):

**July 2022:** Section 376.91, F.S., Statewide Cleanup of Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances:

- If EPA has not finalized drinking water standards by January 1, 2026, DEP will adopt by rule statewide cleanup target levels.
- Until ratified by the Legislature, a governmental entity or private water supplier may not be subject to any administrative or judicial action to compel site rehabilitation.
- Tolls statute of limitations on pursuing relief in accordance with existing authority.

**Aug. 2022:** EPA proposes designation of PFOA and PFOS as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, also known as the Superfund law.

# POLYFLUOROALKYL SUBTANCES (PFAS) FEDERAL ACTIONS



- Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA) Hazardous Substance Designation.
  - o Published in Federal Register May 8, 2024.
  - o Effective July 8, 2024.
- Primary drinking water regulation for Perfluorooctanoic Acid (PFOA) and Perfluorooctane Sulfonate (PFOS), additional PFAS and PFAS mixture (Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) Rulemaking).
  - Published in Federal Register April 26, 2024.
    - Effective June 25, 2024.
    - Established MCLs for PFOA and PFOS at 4 ppt. (Potable Water Systems compliance date: June 2029)
    - MCLs for three additional PFAS (GenX, PFHxS, PFNA) at 10 ppt.
  - On May 14, 2025, EPA announced several actions:
    - PFOA and PFOS MCLs to remain in effect.
    - MCLs for three additional PFAS and a PFAS mixture of four PFAS would be rescinded for reconsideration.
    - Additional rulemaking by Spring 2026 would extend compliance date to 2031 for public water systems.

# PFAS – STATE ACTIONS WASTE CLEANUP PROGRAM



Fire Training Facilities (FTFs):

**30** FTFs (current and former) have been sampled, and **27** exceeded the Provisional Groundwater Cleanup Target Level (P-GCTL) and are undergoing additional PFAS monitoring/assessment:

**State-Funded Cleanup:** 

• 29 of the 30 FTFs sampled were above at least one of the MCLs.

**Dry Cleaners:** 

**43** sites have been sampled, and **23** sites exceeded the P-GCTL and are undergoing additional PFAS monitoring/assessment:

• **42** of 43 sites sampled were above at least one of the MCLs.

**Superfund Sites:** 

Actively screening drycleaning sites for PFAS:

• Total of **310** sites have been sampled, **187** sites exceeded the P-GCTL.

• 307 of the 310 sites sampled were above at least one of the MCLs.

Brownfield, CERCLA Site Screening Sites or Responsible Party: At DEP's request, EPA has sampled **three** Superfund sites that were former drycleaners:

• All three were above the P-GCTL and at least one of the MCLs.

**Nine** sites have been screened and exceeded the P-GCTL and at least one of the MCLs. Sites have included former landfills, dumps and plating facilities.

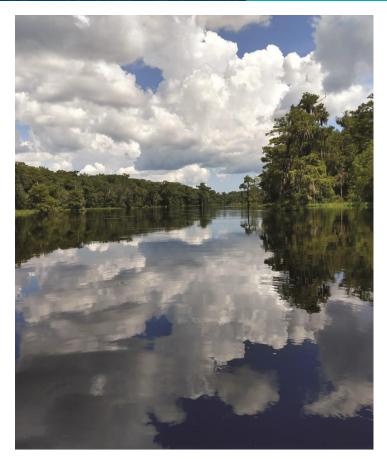


**DEP Site Assessments:** DEP will continue working through its established processes with respect to the various categories of site assessments that have been conducted.

**Forthcoming Federal Laws/Actions:** DEP will continue to engage with EPA on imminent final rulemakings and other anticipated federal actions to ensure the state is best situated to take required actions.

**Engagement with Stakeholders:** DEP will continue engaging and working with stakeholders as they provide input or comments related to PFAS.

**Risk Communication:** DEP will continue to utilize strategies to ensure both accurate and precise communication related to PFAS.

#### I. Summary:

SB 150 designates the American flamingo (*Phoenicopterus ruber*) as the official Florida state bird and the Florida scrub-jay (Aphelocoma coerulescens) as the official Florida state songbird.

#### II. **Present Situation:**

#### **American Flamingo**

The American flamingo (*Phoenicopterus* ruber), also called the Caribbean flamingo, is one of the largest flamingo species in the world and stands approximately five feet tall. American flamingos are wading birds with long legs and necks.<sup>2</sup> They have a thick, curved bill that they use to filter crustaceans, mollusks, and other aquatic invertebrates from the water. Adult American flamingos are bright to pale pink with a black trailing edge on their wings. They are social birds and typically forage and nest in dense colonies that can consist of up to 80,000 individuals.<sup>3</sup>

American flamingos can be found throughout the Caribbean, with potential breeding sites in Colombia, Curação, and the Turks and Caicos Islands and known breeding populations in Cuba, Mexico, Venezuela, Bonaire, the British Virgin Islands, the Bahamas, the Galápagos Islands, the Dominican Republic, and Florida.<sup>4</sup>

American flamingos are historical residents of Florida, but overhunting around the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century resulted in their disappearance from the state.<sup>5</sup> By 1925, captive breeding in South Florida had reintroduced them to the state and there is evidence that some flamingos migrated to Florida on their own throughout the 1900s.<sup>6</sup> Today, American flamingos can be observed along much of the Florida coast, although they are most commonly seen in Hialeah, the Everglades, Biscayne Bay, and the Florida Keys.<sup>7</sup>

The Florida population of American flamingos is less than one percent of the global population. The American flamingo is a species of low conservation concern and it is protected under the Federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act.<sup>8</sup>

#### Florida Scrub-Jay

The Florida scrub-jay (*Aphelocoma coerulescens*) is the only bird species that lives exclusively in Florida. Florida scrub-jays are blue and gray birds that prefer sand-pine-and-oak scrub and scrubby flatwoods. They live in the highest and driest areas of Florida, including sandy ridges in Central Florida, sand dunes along the coast, and sandy deposits along rivers in the interior of the state.

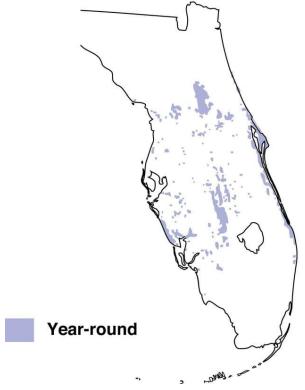

Florida scrub-jays are non-migratory and typically defend the same nesting territory every year. <sup>12</sup> They live in family groups that consist of a breeding pair and helpers, which are typically the pair's offspring. The offspring may stay in their parents' territory until they are two or three years old. Florida scrub-jays eat primarily insects, frogs, toads, lizards, mice, bird eggs, and acorns. <sup>13</sup>

Florida scrub-jays are a federally-designated threatened species protected by the federal Endangered Species Act. <sup>14</sup> They are also protected by Florida's Endangered and Threatened Species Act and by the federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act. <sup>15</sup>

The main threats to the scrub-jay are habitat destruction, fragmentation, and degradation caused by development, agriculture, and fire-suppression. <sup>16</sup> Habitat fragmentation prevents scrub-jays from easily travelling between patches of suitable

habitat and ultimately creates smaller, separated populations that are at greater risk of disappearing. Florida scrub-jays rely on naturally occurring or prescribed fires, which prevent their habitat from becoming too dense and tall. Fire suppression degrades their habitat and threatens their survival.<sup>17</sup>

#### Northern Mockingbird

The northern mockingbird (*Mimus polyglottos*) is commonly found throughout much of North America and the Caribbean. <sup>18</sup> They live in a wide variety of habitats, including arroyos and canyons, deserts, meadows, forests, saltwater wetlands, and

urban areas.<sup>19</sup> They typically prefer dense shrubs, thickets, and open ground with short grass or open soil.<sup>20</sup>

Northern mockingbirds are slim with a long tail. They are pale gray with white wing patches and white outer tail feathers. They regularly imitate other bird songs and typically sing from February through August and September to early November.<sup>21</sup>

Mockingbirds are protected by the federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act.<sup>22</sup>

The northern mockingbird is the official state bird of five states: Arkansas, Florida, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Texas.<sup>23</sup> It has held the position of official Florida state bird since 1927 when it was designated by the Florida Legislature because "the melody of its music has delighted the heart of residents and visitors to Florida" and because "this bird of matchless charm" is found throughout Florida.<sup>24</sup>

#### III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

**Section 1** creates s. 15.0352, F.S., to designate the American flamingo (*Phoenicopterus ruber*) as the official Florida state bird and the Florida scrub-jay (*Aphelocoma coerulescens*) as the official Florida state songbird.

**Section 2** provides that the designation of the American flamingo as the official Florida state bird and the Florida scrub-jay as the official Florida state songbird replaces the designation of the northern mockingbird (*Mimus polyglottos*) as the official Florida state bird by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 3, which was adopted during the 1927 Regular Session.

Section 3 provides an effective date of July 1, 2026.
