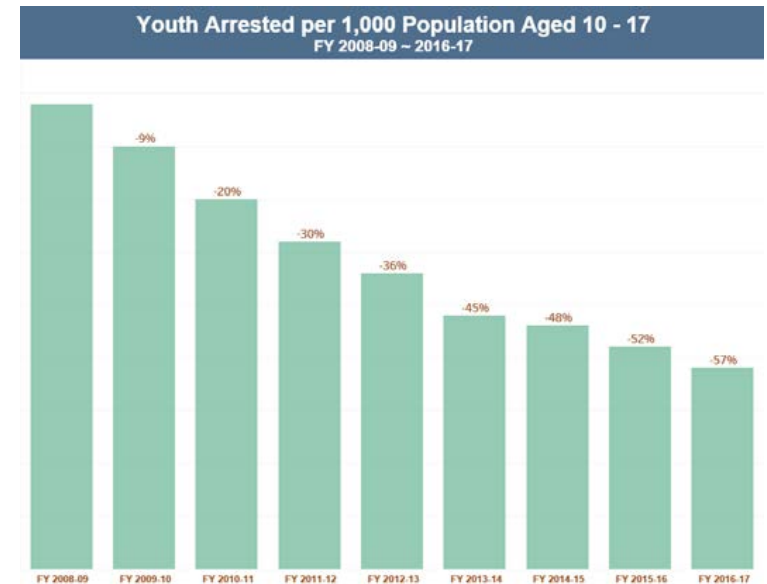

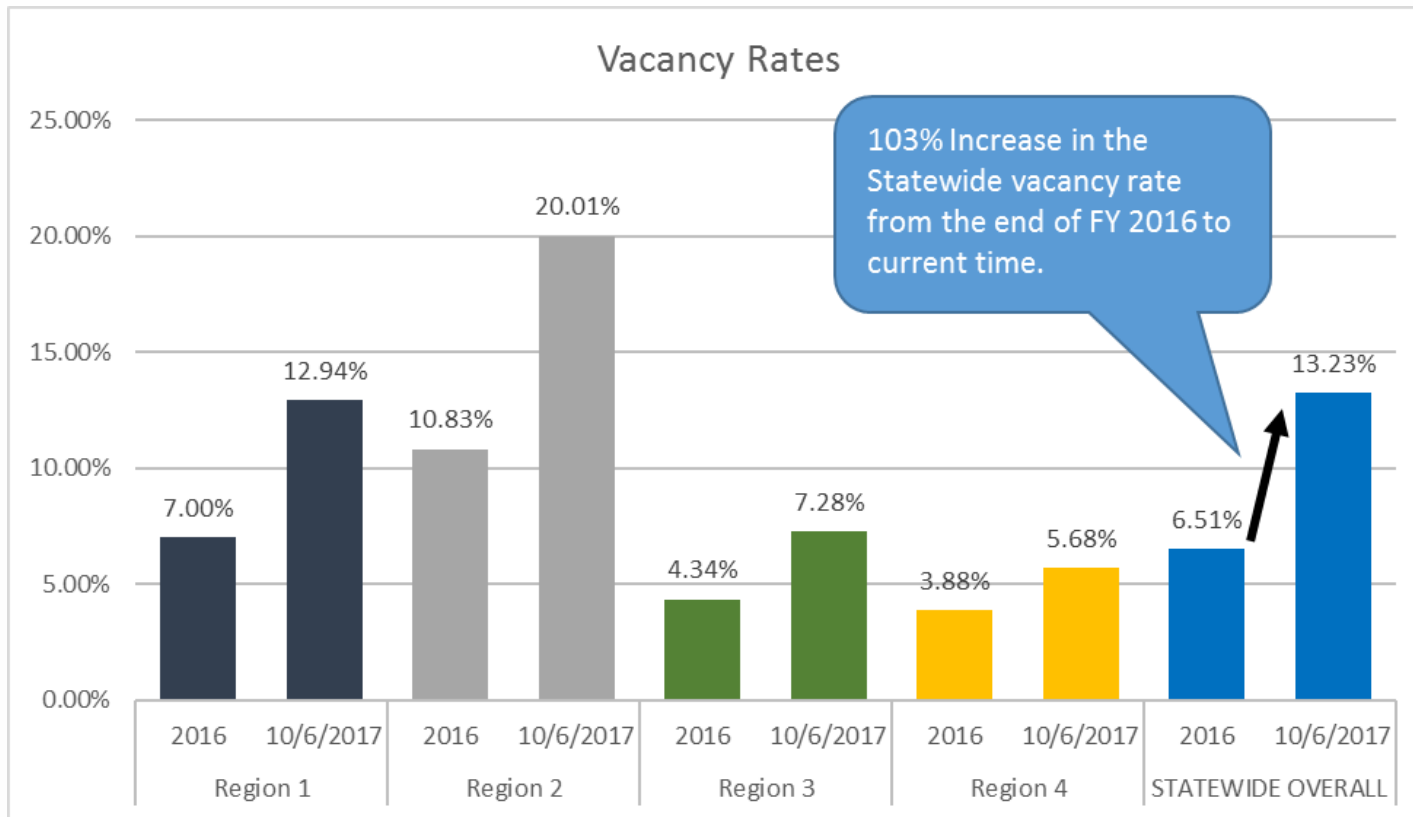


Operating Base Budget

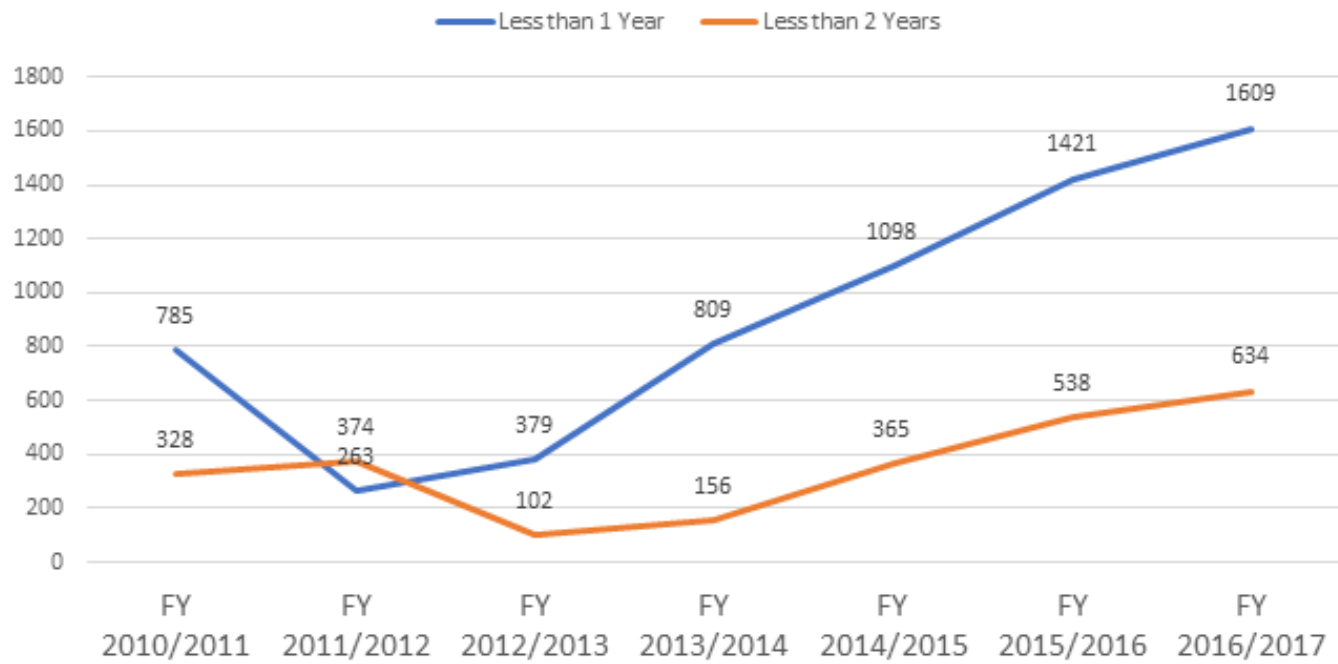


FY 2017-18 Budget by Program



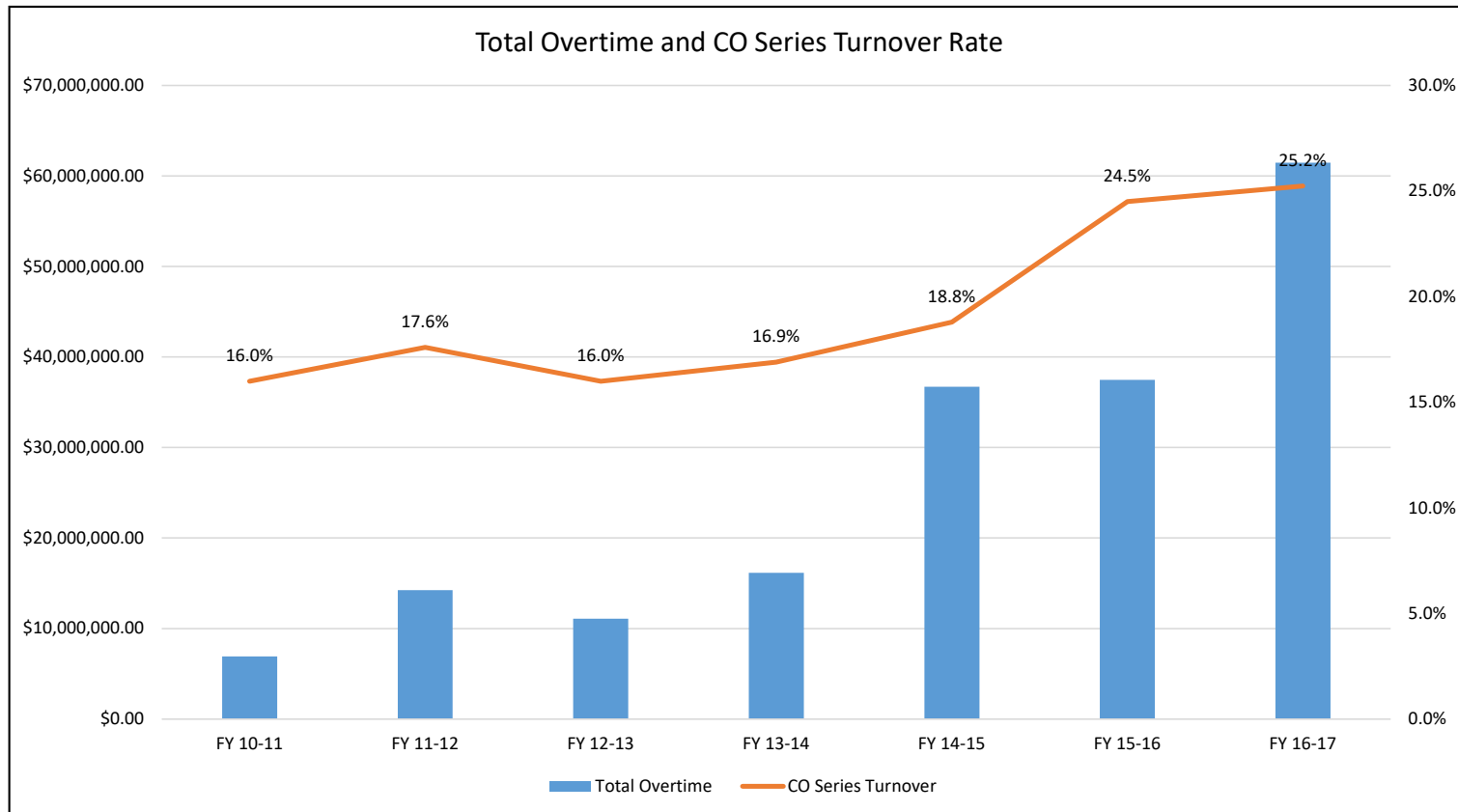

Bridging the Gap Between Research & Practice



Key Points of the Disposition Matrix

- ◎ Low-risk offenders remain in the community with minimal supervision
- ◎ Moderate-risk offenders typically placed in more structured community programs, with intensive probation supervision for higher risk youth
- ◎ Residential placement reserved for the highest risk offenders **after community-based alternatives have been exhausted**

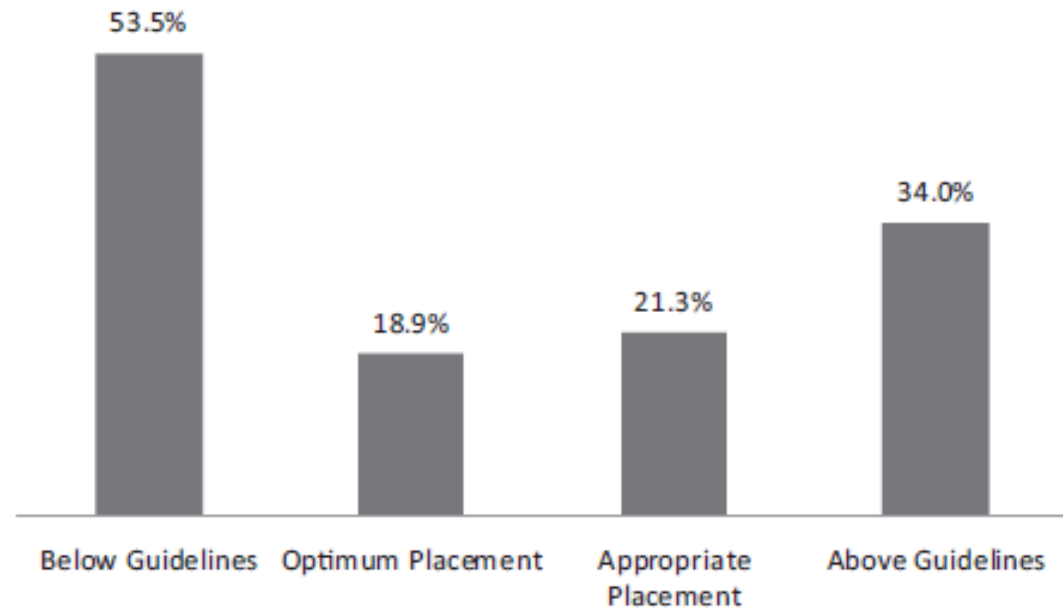

2nd Disposition Matrix Validation

- Strong evidence that the Department's implementation efforts have resulted in fewer youth receiving above or below guidelines placements. This translates into a direct improvement in public safety as youth are less likely to recidivate when given appropriate dispositions.
- Males were three times more likely than females to receive above-guidelines dispositions.
- Black youth were 1.7 times more likely than white youth to receive above-guidelines dispositions.
- Youth living in the Northern portion of the state were more likely to receive sanctions above guidelines than youth in other areas of the state.

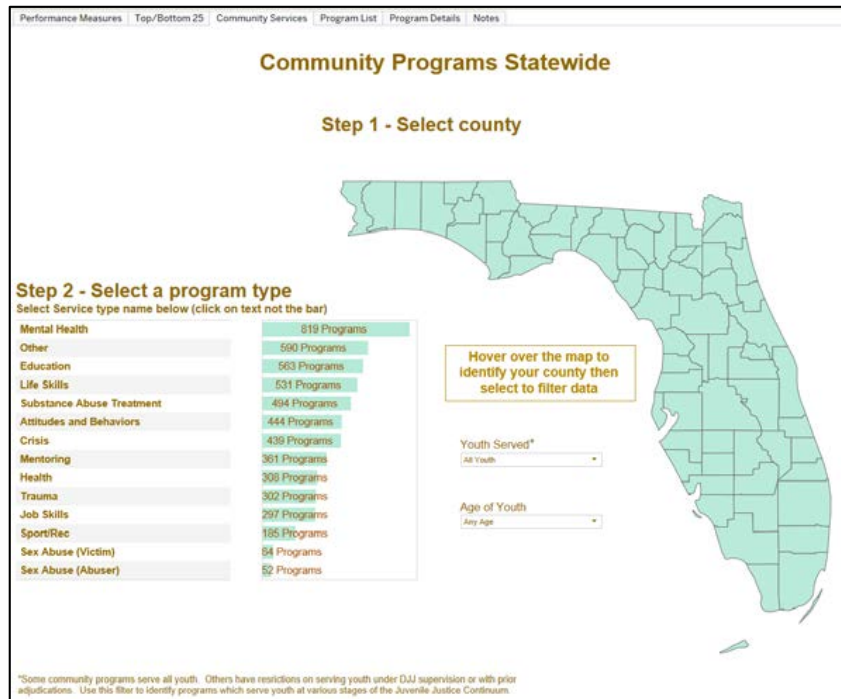




Continuum of Service Mapping
