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# Sentencing and prison release in Florida

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## Prior to 1983

- Indeterminate sentencing
- Discretionary parole, most inmates eligible
- Judges had wide sentencing discretion
- Inmates released in Fiscal Year 1982-83 served 59% of their sentence

## After 1983


- Determinate sentencing with sentencing guidelines
- Parole mostly abolished following some court-imposed delays
- Sentencing judges limited by scores with ranges of permissible sentences

## Currently

- Florida had 95,022 inmates as of August 2019
- 29,187 offenders were released from Florida prisons in Fiscal Year 2018-19
- On average, inmates released in Fiscal Year 2018-19 served 86% of their imposed sentence

# Inmates can earn more gain-time than they can use


Inmates can earn up to 10 days per month of incentive gain-time and a total of 60 days for program completion, but are limited to a 15% sentence reduction






## Discretionary Supervised Release




## Non-Discretionary Supervised Release



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

# Most states allow inmates to earn gain-time

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## Earned Time

- Credit against an inmate's sentence that they earn for participating in or completing productive activities

## Incentive Time


- Credits are awarded to offenders for following institution rules and can be offered in addition to earned time credits

# In Florida, most gain-time is earned through incentive time

30 states have some form of incentive time credit available to inmates based on institutional behavior



Offenders in West Virginia can reduce their sentence by up to 50% via incentive time, while other states offer good time to inmates at a lower rate

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# Improving offender reentry

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- Risk assessment instruments can both inform release determinations and level of supervision needed
- Determining and applying the appropriate level of supervision is important for public safety and reentry success
- Community service provision has a role in helping to ensure public safety and support reentry success

# Release considerations

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- Correctional system resources and services to support reentry
- Reentry organizations need for coordination
- Reentry taskforces or coalitions

# Options

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## Legislature could consider modifying prison release mechanisms

- Reinstating discretionary parole
- Modifying the current 85% time served requirement
  - Modify current gain-time opportunities for inmates to participate in activities that decrease probability of recidivism or provide a significant public benefit
- Expanding the criteria for conditional medical release
  - Create elderly release criteria
  - Establish nursing homes for conditionally released inmates who require a nursing facility level of care and do not pose a public safety risk

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

# Legal Financial Obligations Generally Fall into Three Categories

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## Fines

- Imposed by the court as part of the judgment in the case; viewed as punishment

## Fees

- Also known as costs, amounts authorized by statute that users of the legal system are expected to pay

## Restitution

- Amounts intended to compensate victims for consequences of the crime

# Fine Amounts Generally Relate to Type and Level of Offense

Type and Level of Offense	Fine Amount Up to
2 <sup>nd</sup> Degree Misdemeanor -or- Non-Criminal Violation	\$500
1 <sup>st</sup> Degree Misdemeanor	\$1,000
3 <sup>rd</sup> Degree Felony	\$5,000
1 <sup>st</sup> or 2 <sup>nd</sup> Degree Felony	\$10,000
Life Felony	\$15,000

- Some statutes establish a specific fine that differs from those above
  - Violation of s. 403.161(3), *F.S.* for causing pollution that injures human health or welfare, animal, plant, or aquatic life or property is a 3<sup>rd</sup> degree felony, but court may impose fine up to \$50,000

# Fees are Generally Mandatory

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- Fees, also referred to as costs, are detailed in statute
- Some fees are assessed in every criminal case
  - s. 938.05(1)(a), *F.S.*, requires any person pleading guilty to or found guilty of any felony or misdemeanor to pay a cost of \$225 for a felony or \$60 for a misdemeanor
- Other fees are only assessed depending on the situation or crime
  - Minimum cost of \$100 for representation by public defender
  - Fees assessed if convicted of certain violent or sexual crimes
- Additional fees that may be assessed if a county has elected to do so through an ordinance
  - \$15 fee for misdemeanor convictions involving drugs or alcohol



# Courts Assessed Over \$315 Million in Fines and Fees in Criminal Cases in County Fiscal Year 2017-18

- \$235.6 million in circuit criminal cases, \$80.2 million in county criminal cases



# Statewide Collection Rates for Criminal Cases Are Low

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- The Florida Clerks of Court Operations Corporation (CCOC) determines whether clerks are meeting performance measures in several areas including collections
  - CCOC produces a quarterly report listing any counties that have not met performance standards
- Statewide collection rate for county Fiscal Year 2017-18
  - Collection rates likely higher in misdemeanor (county criminal) because of lower amounts assessed and short or no terms of incarceration

	Performance Standard	Actual Collection Rate
County Criminal	40%	39.89%
Circuit Criminal	9%	9.31%

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# Fines and Fees Collected in Criminal Cases are Distributed to Multiple Funds

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- Majority of fines and fees collected in all cases go to the clerks, the courts, and general revenue
  - Also go to public defenders, state attorneys, and state trust funds
- The state trust funds that receive revenue from criminal cases are generally criminal justice related
  - Additional Court Cost Clearing Trust Fund
    - FDLE for training
    - DCF for domestic violence programs
  - Crime Stoppers Trust Fund
  - Crimes Compensation Trust Fund
  - Crime Prevention Trust Fund
  - Domestic Violence Trust Fund
  - Rape Crisis Program Trust Fund

# Other States Have Taken Steps to Change Assessment and Collection of Fines and Fees in Criminal Cases

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- Increasing court's role in examining individual's financial resources
  - Court must conduct a hearing about offender's income, debt, and expenses
    - Arizona, Michigan, Ohio, and Texas
  - Bench cards to assist judges in assessing fines and fees
    - Ohio, Texas, and Washington
  - Online calculator
    - Washington
- Expanding judicial discretion to waive fines and fees or convert them into community service
  - Texas: Judges now permitted to waive all or part of fines and fees at sentencing. Previously required to delay waiving until after default.

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## Panelists for the Discussion on Fines and Fees

**State Attorneys:** Jack Campbell is the State Attorney for the Second Judicial Circuit of Florida which consists of six counties: Leon, Gadsden, Jefferson, Liberty, Wakulla and Franklin.

After graduating Leon High School in 1991, Mr. Campbell received his B.A. at Florida State University, and his J.D. (in 2001) at Cumberland School of Law at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama.

Since that graduation and until his recent election, with the exception of a brief stint in private practice, Mr. Campbell has been an assistant state attorney in the Second Judicial Circuit of Florida handling major felony trial cases including homicide, sexual assault, narcotics and robbery. He has also handled executive assignments in other judicial circuits. Due to his interest in protecting children, he was appointed as a Special Assistant to the U.S. Attorney's Office, Northern District of Florida, for the purpose of dealing with internet crimes against children. He has taught at the Pat Thomas Law Enforcement Academy at Tallahassee Community College.

**Public Defenders:** Nancy Daniels, former Public Defender for the Second Judicial Circuit -- While studying at the Florida State University College of Law, Ms. Daniels taught in the area of criminal law and during her first legal job -- clerking at the First District Court of Appeal -- she gravitated to criminal cases.

Daniels was the first woman in Florida elected to the office of public defender, and served for 26 years as the public defender of the Second Judicial Circuit of Florida. In that role, she managed a staff of 113 employees who handled criminal, juvenile and mental health trials in the six counties of the Second Circuit and criminal appeals from 32 North Florida counties.

She was instrumental in the creation of juvenile drug courts, adult drug courts, a mental health court, and she was part of a team that implemented a veterans' court.

**Courts:** Judge Josephine Gagliardi, County Judge from the 20<sup>th</sup> Judicial Circuit -- Judge Gagliardi was appointed to the County bench in 2006. As a county judge she hears both civil and criminal matters. For the past nine years, she has volunteered to handle cases for the Felony Adult Drug Court program. This

program assists addicts to recover, attain sobriety and become productive members of society.

She earned her Bachelor's from the University of Pittsburgh and her Juris Doctor from Antioch School of Law.


**Clerks of Court:** Ken Burke, Clerk of the Circuit Court and Comptroller, Pinellas County -- Elected in November 2004. He was sworn in on January 4, 2005 and was re-elected without opposition in 2008, 2012 and again in 2016.

Since assuming office, Ken has been elected by his fellow clerks to the statewide Clerks of Court Operations Corporation (CCOC), which is the board created by the Legislature to approve the Clerks' court related budget.

**Florida Police Chiefs Association:** Gary Hester, Government Affairs Consultant -- Mr. Hester is a lifelong resident of Polk County. He worked in Polk County public safety for more than thirty-seven years in roles including: Chief of Staff to Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd; Police Chief for the cities of Winter Haven and Haines City; and Deputy County Manager for Polk County.

He graduated from Saint Leo University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminology. He earned a Master of Science degree from the University of Alabama. He also graduated from the Southern Police Institute and the Police Executive Research Forum's Senior Management Institute for Police. He is a State of Florida Certified Public Manager.


