

Coronavirus Relief Fund

Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act

- The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) was enacted on March 27, 2020 in response to the Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) outbreak
- The Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) provides \$150 billion in direct assistance for states, tribal governments, eligible units of local government, D.C., and U.S. Territories
- Fund must be used for eligible expenses incurred in responding to the public health emergency and second-order effects.



Coronavirus Relief Fund Award

State of Florida CRF Award - \$8.2 billion

- State Administered Response \$5.9 billion
 - State \$4,580,521,589
 - Counties Below Population Threshold \$1,275,956,089
- Counties Above Population Threshold \$2.5 billion

Coronavirus Relief Fund – What is Covered?

- Per the CARES Act, recipients must use Coronavirus Relief Fund payments to cover costs that:
 - Are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19;
 - Were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020; and
 - Were incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020 and ends December 31, 2021.

Coronavirus Relief Fund – Eligible Expenses

Three Prong Test Criteria:

- Necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency;
- Costs not accounted for in the most recently approved budget as of March 27, 2020; and
- Costs were incurred between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2020. (now extended to December 31, 2021 in P.L. 116-260)

- Public Health Expenses
- Payroll Expenses
- Public Health Compliance Expenses
- Economic Support Expenses
- Other Response Expenses



- General Revenue funds available for FY 2020-21 increased by \$1.1 billion or 3.5% from the previous year
- General Revenue for FY 2021-22 and FY 2022-23 is expected to increase by \$1.84 billion (5.7%) and \$1.75 billion (5.1%), respectively






- The proposed FY 2022 appropriations totaling \$96.6 billion are \$4.3 billion or 4.7% above FY 2021.






