Department Updates

Senate Bill 80 Overview

- The bill creates consistency, transparency and works to reduce further trauma for individuals involved in the Child Welfare System. Specifically, the legislation addresses the following components:
 - Face Sheet
 - Multidisciplinary Teams
 - Office of Continuing Care
 - Reinstatement of Parental Rights



Face Sheet

- The Face Sheet is a newly required document that contains a condensed overview of a child and their case for a more transparent way to get a snapshot of a child's history and to more quickly inform next steps.
- The Department:
 - Developed a template for Face Sheets that includes all elements in statute and has a projected go-live date this month.

Multidisciplinary Teams

- Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) staffings bring together a diverse group of individuals to convene and holistically serve the family by helping children achieve permanency, safety, and overall family well-being.
- The Department is:
 - Onboarding facilitator positions
 - Initiating rulemaking; first workshop was on September 10th
 - Collaborating with the Community-Based Care Lead
 Agencies to ensure alignment of processes and protocols



Office of Continuing Care

- The Office of Continuing Care was created to serve former foster youth ages 18 to 26 in order to receive ongoing support and coordination of care.
- The Department:
 - Has selected an Office of Continuing Care director.
 - Is recruiting and hiring peer support coordinators while prioritizing those with lived experience.
 - Will have the opportunity to deepen the service array for this population.



Reinstatement of Parental Rights

- Allows for the motion to reinstate parental rights in specific instances when a child remains in foster care and has not been adopted following the termination of parental rights.
- The Department is:
 - Initiating rulemaking; first workshop was on September 10th.
 - Collaborating with Children's Legal Services to handle the motions for reinstatement of parental rights.



Senate Bill 96 Overview

- The bill is focused on collaborating with critical partners to protect children and reduce further trauma.
 - Critical Incident RapidResponse Team (CIRRT)
 - Cross Reporting AnimalAbuse
 - Kinship & Family Finders
 - Post-Adoption Service

- Multidisciplinary Legal Representation
- Rights of Foster Children
- Managing Entities &Community Based CareAgencies Role



Critical Incident Rapid Response Team

- The Critical Incident Rapid Response Team (CIRRT) process was expanded to include deployment on verified reports of sexual abuse of a child in out-of-home care when certain criteria are met.
- The Department:
 - Utilized existing CIRRT protocol to ensure readiness to begin reviewing cases for expanded population.
 - Is continuing to hire and train CIRRT team members.



Cross Reporting Animal Abuse

- The Department is required to cross report and develop training, concerning the connection between child abuse and animal cruelty.
- The Department:
 - -Created training in collaboration with the Humane Society, local code enforcement, and animal welfare consultants.
 - Released the training this month for Department staff and partners.

Kinship & Family Finders and Post Adoption Services

- The purpose of the Family Finder Program and Kinship Navigators is to ensure a robust and exhaustive search to identify relatives for placement early in a case and that families have the support and services necessary to take care of children in order to avoid the additional trauma of future placement changes.
- Each CBC is required to offer post-adoption services to families, providing customized wrap-around services that stabilize and sustain the family.

The Department:

- Reviewed existing Kinship & Family Finder programs operated by CBCs to determine how to replicate the model statewide.
- Promulgated rules pertaining to post adoption services prior to passage of SB 96.
- Will prioritize contract tools and support to ensure consistent compliance.



Multidisciplinary Legal Representation

- The bill allows for the creation of Multidisciplinary Legal Representation model programs by the Office of Criminal Conflict and Civil Regional Counsel.
- The Department is:
 - Coordinating with Regional Counsel Offices to support the implementation of a multidisciplinary representation model.
 - Coordinating Title IV-E reimbursement agreements with regional counsels and the Justice Administrative Commission (JAC).



Rights of Foster Children

- The bill specifies rights of children in shelter or foster care and requires case management provide verbal and written instructions of these rights to children in care in a manner appropriate for their age and maturity.
- The Department is:
 - Finalizing the bill of rights brochures after completion of a workshop with multiple youth advocate programs and young adults.
 - Planned distribution for October 2021.



Managing Entities and Community Based Care Lead Agencies

- The bill requires the Department, Managing Entities and Community Based Care Lead Agencies to work together to promote transparency of services and contractual relationships.
 - Promotional Material
 - Financial Compensation and Tax Information
 - Conflicts of Interest
- The Department is:
 - Actively working with both Managing Entities and Community Based Care
 Lead Agencies to coordinate data sharing and reporting requirements.



Families First Prevention Services Act

- Families First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA) was passed into federal law in 2018.
- Goals of the legislation:
 - -Prevent children from entering foster care
 - Engage families in prevention services
 - -Provide appropriate family-like settings for foster care



System Readiness

- Prepared to submit the updated Title IV-E State Plan to the Administration for Children and Families by October 1.
- Working with statewide partners for the past three years to ensure maximization of federal IV-E reimbursement.
 - Defining candidacy for prevention and foster care eligibility
 - Enhancing the placement setting array and building capacity
 - Development of technology and monitoring tools for financial claiming

- <u>New-Specialized</u>
 Therapeutic Group
 Credentialed as a QRTP (156 transitioning beds)
- Specialized Therapeutic Group Homes (STGH 9)
- Statewide In-Patient Psychiatric (SIPP, 10)




Placements in Group Homes

- The Department has been able to identify and place around 381 children into more family-like settings during the transition to FFPSA, reducing the use of group care by 22% since July 2019.
- Approximately 400 children remain in traditional group homes.
 - The state is still eligible to claim IV-E dollars for these placements after October 1, as long as they remain in that setting.
- FFPSA has created two new federally defined group home types:
 - "At-risk" homes
 - Qualified Residential Treatment Programs (QRTPs)



Qualified Residential Treatment Program (QRTP)

- Qualified Residential Treatment
 Programs are a new placement setting
 created by the FFPSA. They are a step
 below more restrictive settings such as
 Psychiatric Residential Treatment
 Facilities / Statewide Inpatient
 Psychiatric Programs.
- The Department is working to incorporate the new federally defined QRTP setting into our placement array and aligning requirements to maximize IV-E draw down.





Families First Transition Act

- Through the Families First Transition Act (FFTA) funding, the Federal Government has authorized the use of these funds to help implement FFPSA. The Department is using the funds to:
 - Train and increase supports to foster parents who invite children with higher acuity challenges into their homes, to increase retention and build more family-like placement capacity.
 - » Developed an enhanced level 2 foster parent status to receive:
 - Enhanced payments
 - Specialized training
 - Peer mentorship
 - Develop and fund prevention strategies to help reduce the number of children who enter care.

Prevention Services

- Florida has elected to implement all nine well-supported Evidence Based Practices (EBPs) currently on the federal Clearinghouse.
 - The Department will utilize FFTA funds to support training for the implementation of five of the EBPs, chosen collaboratively with our community partners, and implement prioritized provider training slots for high removal areas and service deserts.
