

- Construction & Renovation Reimbursement Sources:

Public Corporation Concept

- Operation of State Veterans' Homes transferred to Public Corporation
- Public Corporation to be self-funded -- no GR
- Increase Veteran resident quality of care
- Improve flexibility to recruit & retain employees
- Allow homes to compete with industry incentives
- Corporation reports directly to Governor & Cabinet as Board of Trustees
- FDVA & Public Corporation coordinate on Veterans' issues
- Retain Federal VA Per Diem funding
- Sovereign Immunity & risk management continue to apply










Benefits and Assistance VA Disability Ratings Reviewed-Cumulative








Benefits and Assistance VA Benefits Granted-Cumulative











Benefits and Assistance Issues

- Recent legislation allows for three new Agent Orange presumptive issues, Ischemic Heart disease, Parkinson's Disease and B Cell Leukemias and relaxed PTSD requirements.
- DVA Quick Pay and Fast Track claims with 5-10 day turnaround.
- Impact on FDVA VCEs limited review time for disability claims.
- Field Service VCEs extensive outreach and out of office.
- Issue resolution numbers and claims intake is declining.
- B&A has not denied any requests for outreach for retiree functions, returning or deploying military members, Homeless Stand Downs, Congressional Town Hall meetings and Military Appreciation Events, or special functions such as the Coalition to Support America's Heroes.

Mission:

Provide high quality, professional guidance and assistance to veterans and their dependents in obtaining their rightful entitlements from the U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs as well as other federal and state agencies. We serve as advocates for our clients in a wide variety of issues.

Qualifications/Accreditations

- The County Veteran Service Officer (CVSO) is required by Florida Statute to be a wartime veteran. The CVSO is required to initially be certified by the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs and then recertified annually at training conferences.
- Most CVSOs are accredited by at least one national service organization such as American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans etc.
- This accreditation allows access to veterans' records via VA Central Computer System

Locations

Currently the Association has 156 members who provide assistance to their clients in 89 offices throughout 66 of Florida's 67 counties.

Types of Assistance

- County veteran service offices provide a wide variety of assistance including: filing claims for: service connected/non-service connected pension; death compensation/pension; Combat Related Special Compensation; Survivor Benefits etc.

Outreach

- Visit homebound clients' homes, Assisted Living Facilities and Nursing Homes
- Visit local correctional facilities as requested
- Provide veterans benefits briefings to military/veterans and civilian groups

Partnerships

- The Association partners with veterans' organizations such as: American Legion (thru the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs); Veterans of Foreign Wars; Disabled American Veterans etc.
- These organizations, located at the VA Regional Office in St. Petersburg as well as the Mini-Service Centers in Orlando and West Palm Beach VAMC, provide assistance with claims and appeals at the VA Regional Office.

Justice-involved Veterans



- Less likely to be arrested or incarcerated
- Average 9-10% of criminal justice population
- Approx 80% discharged Honorable/General

- 57% of were violent offenders compared to 47% of non-Veterans
- Reported longer sentences for all crime types
- Expected increase from Iraq and Afghanistan



Post-9/11 Veterans: Who are they?





- Over 2 million had been deployed to the Global War on Terror (GWOT)
- 810,000 deployed more than once to OEF/OIF
- Unemployment
- Homelessness
- Mental Health & Trauma
- Suicide

- Jan 08 First VTC opened in Buffalo, NY
- Jan 11 53 VTCs in22 States
- 10 x growth rate of original Drug Courts





Drug Courts



- 1989 1st Drug Court formed in Miami, FL
- 2010 Over 2,500 Drug Courts nationwide (and over 100 in Florida)
- Drug Courts Work
 - Reduce crime
 - Lower costs
 - Ensure compliance



Drug Courts Reduce Crime



- 75% of clients remain arrest-free at least 2 years after graduation.
- Reductions in crime last at least 3 years and can endure for over 14 years.
- Crime reduced as much as 35% more than other sentencing options.



Drug Courts Save Money



- \$3.36 in criminal justice costs for every \$1.00 invested.
- \$12 for every \$1 invested when including other cost offsets such as reduced victimization and healthcare service utilization.
- Produce total cost savings ranging from \$4,000 to \$12,000 per client.



Drug Courts Ensure Compliance



 Provide more comprehensive and closer supervision than other community-based supervision programs.

 6 times more likely to keep offenders in treatment long enough for them to get better.



What is a Treatment Court? 👯



- Intensive treatment and other services combined with accountability
- Judge, Prosecution, Defense, Probation, Treatment Providers, and others work together using a nonadversarial approach
- Frequent court appearances and random drug tests
- System of Incentives and Sanctions
- Voluntary participation



What is a Veterans Treatment Court?



- Hybrid Drug and Mental Health Court based on the Drug Court Model
- Allows Veterans to go through the treatment court process with other Veterans
- Utilizes partnerships with federal, state and local agencies, Veterans Service Organizations, etc.
 - U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs
- Mentors/Peer Specialists



VTCs vs. Drug Courts



- Higher alcohol and prescription drug abuse
- Different and significant mental health issues
- Numerous resources available to include volunteers
- More willing to admit those accused of violent offenses to participate
- Significant need for training and technical assistance
