COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

I. Summary:

CS/SB 1288 defines the term "activate" to mean the execution and implementation of the necessary plans and activities required to mitigate, respond to, or recover from an emergency or disaster pursuant to ch. 252, F.S., and the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan.

The bill is effective upon becoming law.

II. Present Situation:

Florida Division of Emergency Management

Florida's Division of Emergency Management (FDEM) administers programs to rapidly apply all available aid to impacted communities stricken by emergency.¹ The FDEM is responsible for maintaining a comprehensive statewide program of emergency management to ensure that Florida is prepared to respond to emergencies, recover from them, and mitigate against their impacts. In doing so, the FDEM coordinates efforts with and among the federal government, other state agencies, local governments, school boards, and private agencies that have a role in emergency management.²

The FDEM is required by s. 252.35, F.S., to prepare a State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan (CEMP) to be integrated into and coordinated with the emergency management plans and programs of the federal government. The CEMP must contain provisions to ensure that the state is prepared for emergencies and minor, major, and catastrophic disasters.³ The CEMP designates the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) as the permanent location in which the State Emergency Response Team (SERT) carries out the coordination and completion of response and recovery activities.⁴ The SERT is comprised of FDEM staff, other state agencies, and private volunteer organizations and non-governmental agencies and serves as the primary operational mechanism through which state assistance to local governments is managed. Members of the SERT are organized into sections, branches, and Emergency Support Functions (ESF).⁵

The CEMP states that the SEOC will be activated at a level necessary to effectively monitor or respond to threats or emergency situations. The SEOC operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, but the level of staffing varies with the activation level.⁶ There are three levels of activation:

- Level 3: Normal conditions.
- Level 2: The SERT is activated, but may not require activation of every section, branch, or ESF.
- Level 1: The SERT has activated all sections, branches, and ESFs to conduct response and recovery operations.⁷

The SEOC maintains at a Level 3 activation at all times.

Emergency Management Powers of the Governor

The Governor is responsible for meeting the dangers presented to this state and its people by emergencies.⁸ In the event of an emergency beyond local control, the Governor, or his or her designee, may assume direct operational control over all or any part of the emergency management functions within this state.⁹ As part of the Governor's power, he or she may by executive order or proclamation declare a state of emergency. A state of emergency has the force and effect of law and assists in the management of an emergency by activating the emergency mitigation, response, and recovery aspects of the state, local, and interjurisdictional emergency management plans applicable to the political subdivision or area in question.¹⁰ A state of emergency may be declared if the Governor finds that an emergency has occurred or is imminent.

The Federal Declaration Process

The Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act¹¹ states in part that all requests for an emergency or major disaster declaration by the President shall be made by the Governor of the affected state.¹²

The Governor must provide to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in its request for an <u>emergency</u> declaration the following information:

- Findings that the situation is of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capability of the state and the affected local government(s) and that federal emergency assistance is needed to save lives and to protect property, public health and safety, or to lessen or avert the threat of a disaster;
- Confirmation that the Governor has taken appropriate action under state law and directed the execution of the state emergency plan;
- A description of the state and local government efforts and resources utilized to alleviate the emergency;
- A description of other federal agency efforts and resources utilized in response to the emergency; and
- A description of the type and extent of additional federal assistance required.¹³

The Governor must provide to FEMA in its request for a <u>major disaster</u> declaration the following information:

- Findings that the situation is of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capabilities of the state and the affected local governments and that federal assistance is necessary to supplement the efforts and available resources of the state, local governments, disaster relief organizations, and compensation by insurance for disaster-related losses;
- Confirmation that the Governor has taken appropriate action under state law and directed the execution of the state emergency plan;
- An estimate of the amount and severity of damages and losses stating the impact of the disaster on the public and private sector;
- A description of the state and local government efforts and resources utilized to alleviate the disaster;
- Preliminary assessments of the types and amount of Stafford Act assistance needed; and
- Certification by the Governor that state and local governments will comply with all applicable cost sharing requirements of the Stafford Act.¹⁴

Upon receipt of the request, FEMA will evaluate the information and provide a recommendation to the President on whether to issue an emergency declaration, major disaster declaration, or deny the state's request. Should a request from the state be denied or modified the Governor has one opportunity and 30 days to appeal the President's decision.¹⁵

According to the FDEM, FEMA has in the past also considered the activation level of the SEOC in its recommendation to the President in addition to the criteria listed above. During the 2013 July Panhandle Flooding and 2015 Central Florida Flooding events FEMA claimed that there was insufficient evidence to prove that the SEOC remains activated at all times, despite maintaining a Level 3 activation. FEMA denied Florida's request for a major disaster declaration for both of the flooding events in 2013 and 2015. However, Florida later won an appeal to FEMA in 2013 and was granted a major disaster declaration for the 2013 Panhandle Flooding event.¹⁶

CS/SB 1288 amends s. 252.34, F.S., to define the term "activate" to mean the execution and implementation of the necessary plans and activities required to mitigate, respond to, or recover from an emergency or disaster pursuant to ch. 252, F.S., and the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan.

The bill also updates cross-references in ss. 163.360, 474.2125, and 627.659, F.S., to conform to the bill.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

I. Summary:

CS/SB 1538 requires each state agency and authorizes the political subdivisions of the state to develop and implement a written veterans recruitment plan to establish annual goals for ensuring the full use of veterans in the agency's or political subdivision's workforce.

The bill requires the Department of Management Services to annually collect and publish on its website and include in its annual workforce report statistical data for each state agency on the following:

- The number of persons who claim veterans' preference;
- The number of persons who are hired through the veterans' preference; and
- The number of persons who are hired as a result of the veterans recruitment plan.

II. Present Situation:

Veteran Presence in Florida

The Florida Statutes defines the term "veteran" as a person who served in the active military, naval, or air service and who was discharged or released under honorable conditions, or who later received an upgraded discharge under honorable conditions.¹ Currently, there are 21.8

million veterans in the United States, of which, over 1.6 million reside in Florida.² This makes Florida the state with the third largest veteran population, behind only California and Texas.³ Approximately 299,000 of Florida's veterans are service-disabled.⁴

Florida's overall unemployment rate for calendar year 2014 was 6.3 percent.⁵ The unemployment rate among Florida veterans was 5 percent compared to 5.3 percent nationally.⁶ The unemployment rate among Florida Post-9/11 era veterans averaged 4.8 percent compared to 7.2 percent nationally.⁷

Veterans' Preference in Employment

The Florida Statutes have included some form of veterans' employment preference since 1947.⁸ The purpose of the veterans' preference statute is to reward those who served their country in a time of need and to recognize the qualities and traits developed by military service.⁹ In 2014, the Legislature expanded Florida's veterans' preference in public employment process to increase the field of persons eligible for veterans' preference to include all veterans, Florida National Guard members, reservists, and Gold Star parents.¹⁰ In addition, beginning in 2014, private employers in Florida were authorized to provide veterans' preference requirements.¹¹

Currently, Florida law does not provide a policy for state agencies concerning the recruitment of veteran employees. However, the law specifically requires all state government entities, counties, cities, towns, villages, special tax school districts, and special districts (government employers) to grant employment preference in hiring and retention to certain veterans, and family members of certain military servicemembers and veterans.¹² All advertisements and written job announcements must include notice that veterans and eligible family members receive preference in employment and are encouraged to apply for the position.¹³

Pursuant to s.295.07, F.S., the following persons are eligible to claim veterans' employment preference:¹⁴

- A disabled veteran;
- The spouse of a veteran:
 - Who has a total and permanent service-connected disability and who, because of this disability, cannot qualify for employment; or
 - Who is missing in action, captured in line of duty by a hostile force, or detained or interned in line of duty by a foreign government or power.
- A Veteran of any war, who has served at least one day during that war time period as defined in subsection s. 1.01 (14), F.S., or who has been awarded a campaign or expeditionary medal. (Active duty for training shall not be allowed for eligibility under this provision.)
- The unremarried widow or widower of a veteran who died of a service-connected disability.
- The mother, father, legal guardian, or unremarried widow or widower of a service member who died as a result of military service under combat-related conditions.
- A veteran as defined in section s. 1.01(14), F.S., F.S.
- A current member of any reserve component of the U.S. Armed Forces or the Florida National Guard.

Florida law exempts the following government positions from the veterans' preference requirements:¹⁵

- Positions that are exempt from the state Career Service System, including certain legislative branch personnel, judicial branch personnel, and personnel of the Office of the Governor; however, all positions under the University Support Personnel System of the SUS as well as all Career Service System positions under the FCS and the School for the Deaf and the Blind are included;
- Positions in political subdivisions of the state which are filled by officers elected by popular vote or persons appointed to fill vacancies in such offices and the personal secretary of each officer;
- Members of boards and commissions;
- Persons employed on a temporary basis without benefits;
- Heads of departments;
- Positions that require licensure as a physician, licensure as an osteopathic physician, or licensure as a chiropractic physician; and
- Positions that require membership in The Florida Bar.

If an examination is used to determine qualification for employment, points are added to the final examination score as follows:¹⁶

In order for points to be awarded, the applicant must first obtain a qualifying score on the examination.¹⁷

Veterans' Preference Applied when Examination Does Not Determine Qualification for Employment

If an examination is not used to determine qualifications for a position, preference is given as follows: ¹⁸

- First preference is given to disabled veterans and the spouses of veterans who have a total and permanent service-connected disability or who are missing in action, captured in line of duty by a hostile force, or detained or interned in line of duty by a foreign government or power; and
- Second preference is given to a veteran of any war; the unremarried widow or widower of a veteran who died of a service connected disability; the mother, father, legal guardian, or unremarried widow or widower of a service member who died as a result of military service under combat-related conditions; a veteran as defined in section s. 1.01(14), F.S., F.S.; and a current member of any reserve component of the U.S. Armed Forces or the Florida National Guard.

State Equal Employment Policy

Section 110.112, F.S., declares that the policy of the state is to afford equal employment opportunities through programs of affirmative and positive action allowing for the full utilization of women and minorities. Each executive agency is required to develop and implement an affirmative action plan; ¹⁹ establish annual goals in its affirmative action plan for ensuring full

utilization of groups underrepresented in the agency's workforce as compared to the relevant labor market;²⁰ and appoint an affirmative action-equal employment opportunity officer.²¹

Section 110.201(5), F.S., requires DMS to develop an annual workforce report that contains data representative of the state's human resources.²² DMS is also required to include in its annual workforce report information relating to each executive agency's affirmative action plan.²³

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

CS/SB 1538 amends s. 295.07, F.S., to require each state agency and authorize political subdivisions of the state to develop and implement a written veterans recruitment plan to establish annual goals for ensuring the full use of veterans in the agency's or political subdivision's workforce. These veterans recruitment plans apply to veterans and their family members who are eligible for veterans employment preference identified in s. 295.07(1), F.S.

The bill requires the Department of Management Services to annually collect and publish on its website and include in its annual workforce report statistical data for each state agency on the following:

- The number of persons who claim veterans' preference;
- The number of persons who are hired through the veterans' preference; and
- The number of persons who are hired as a result of the veterans recruitment plan.

The bill also updates cross references in ss. 295.085 and 295.09, F.S.

The bill takes effect on October 1, 2016.

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

I. Summary:

CS/SB 1688 authorizes the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) to collect, for the Florida Veterans Foundation (foundation), a voluntary contribution of \$1 or more per applicant through the motor vehicle registration, driver license and identification card, and marine vessel registration application forms.

The bill also exempts the foundation from the statutory requirement to submit an application and application fee to the DHSMV 90 days prior to the legislative session to establish the voluntary contributions sought in the bill.

II. Present Situation:

The application forms for motor vehicle registration and renewal, a driver license or replacement driver license, identification card, or marine vessel registration all provide a voluntary contributions section that allows applicants the opportunity to make a donation by checking a box on the form.¹

¹ Sections 320.02(8), (14), and (15), F.S., provide motor vehicle registration applicants with 23 options for voluntary contributions. Section 322.08(7), F.S., provides driver license and identification card applicants with 20 options for voluntary contributions. Sections 328.72(11) and (16), F.S., provide boat registration applicants with 3 options for voluntary contributions.

The Florida Statutes specifically authorize which organizations can receive a voluntary contribution. Section 320.023, F.S. establishes the requirements for organizations seeking to establish a voluntary contribution on motor vehicle registration application forms, and s. 322.081, F.S. establishes similar requirements for driver license and identification card applications.² Both sections require:

- A request for the voluntary contribution being sought, describing the voluntary contribution in general terms;
- An application fee³, not to exceed \$10,000, to defray the DHSMV's cost for reviewing the application and developing the voluntary contribution check off, if authorized;
- A marketing strategy outlining short-term and long-term marketing plans for the contribution; and
- A financial analysis outlining the anticipated revenues and the planned expenditures of the revenues to be derived from the contributions.

This information must be submitted to the DHSMV at least 90 days before the next regular session of the Legislature convenes.

The Florida Veterans Foundation

The Florida Department of Veterans Affairs (FDVA) was authorized during the 2008 Regular Session to establish a direct-support organization in order to provide assistance, funding, and support for the department in carrying out its mission.⁴ Incorporated in June of 2008, the Florida Veterans Foundation (foundation) carries out a number of activities that serve, support, and advocate for Florida veterans.

The foundation's main mission is to provide emergency assistance to Florida veterans and their families who, through no fault of their own, are experiencing financial difficulties that cannot be resolved by the veteran or other veteran service organizations.⁵ Other activities of the foundation include:

- Operating and participating in Homeless Veteran Stand Downs;
- Providing guidance and information services regarding Florida veteran benefits and Federal veteran benefits;
- Printing and distributing the FDVA's Florida Veterans' Benefit Guide;
- Providing veteran employment information; and
- Overseeing projects such as the Florida Veterans' Hall of Fame⁶ and the Florida Veterans' Walk of Honor and Memorial Garden.⁷

Funding for the foundation comes from donations received as a result of fundraising efforts.⁸ The foundation previously received a portion of the revenue generated from the sale of the Florida Salutes Veterans specialty license plate, which ended 48 months after the foundation was incorporated.⁹

Such contributions will be distributed by the DHSMV to the foundation.

The bill also exempts the foundation from the requirements in ss. 320.02 and 320.08, F.S., which would require the foundation to submit an application and application fee to the DHSMV 90 days prior to the legislative session to establish the voluntary contribution on the motor vehicle registration and driver license and identification card forms.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2016.
