



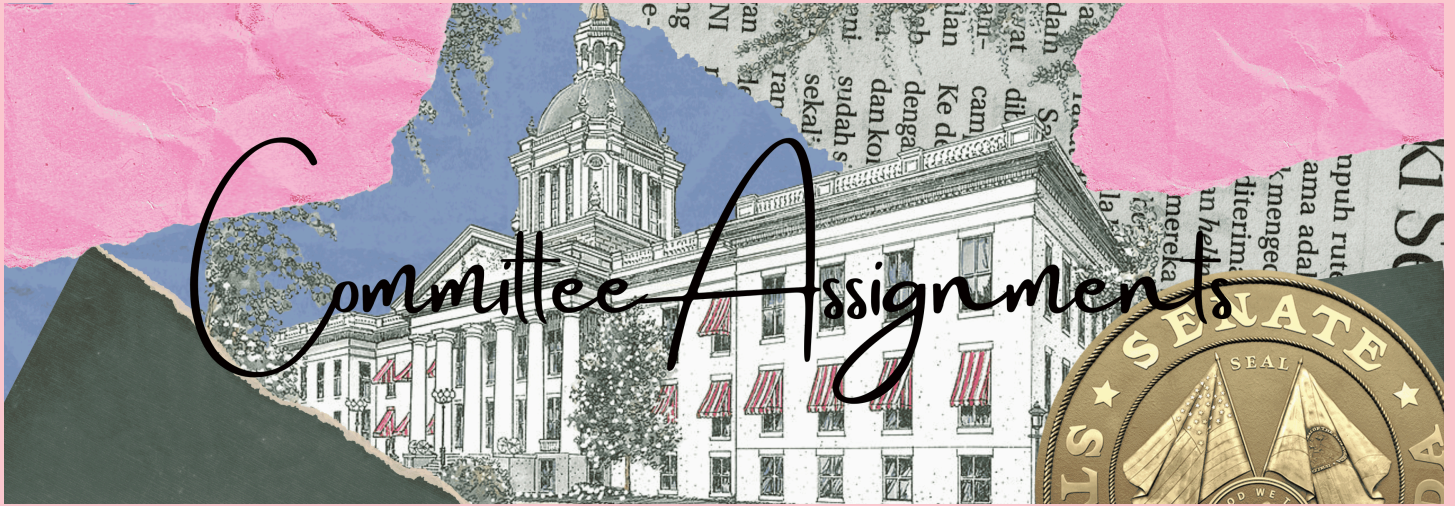
Dear Residents of District 32,

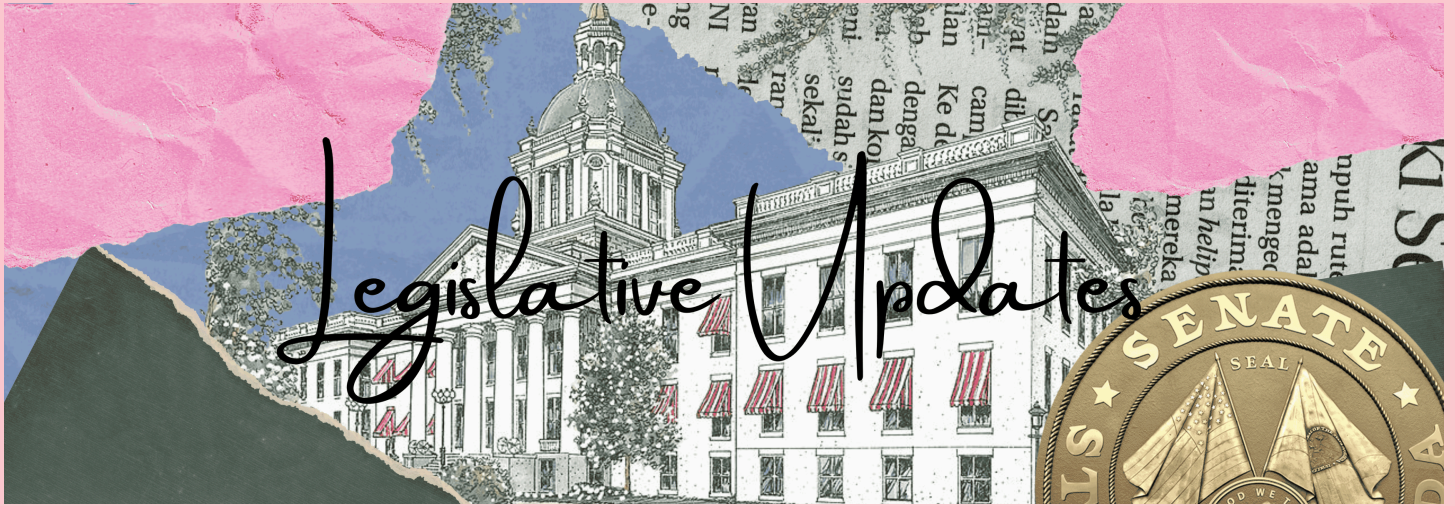


Committee Assignments

I'm proud to share a major step forward coming out of District 32 — this week, I presented a bill that will remove one of the most harmful and overlooked barriers facing returning citizens who want to pursue higher education.

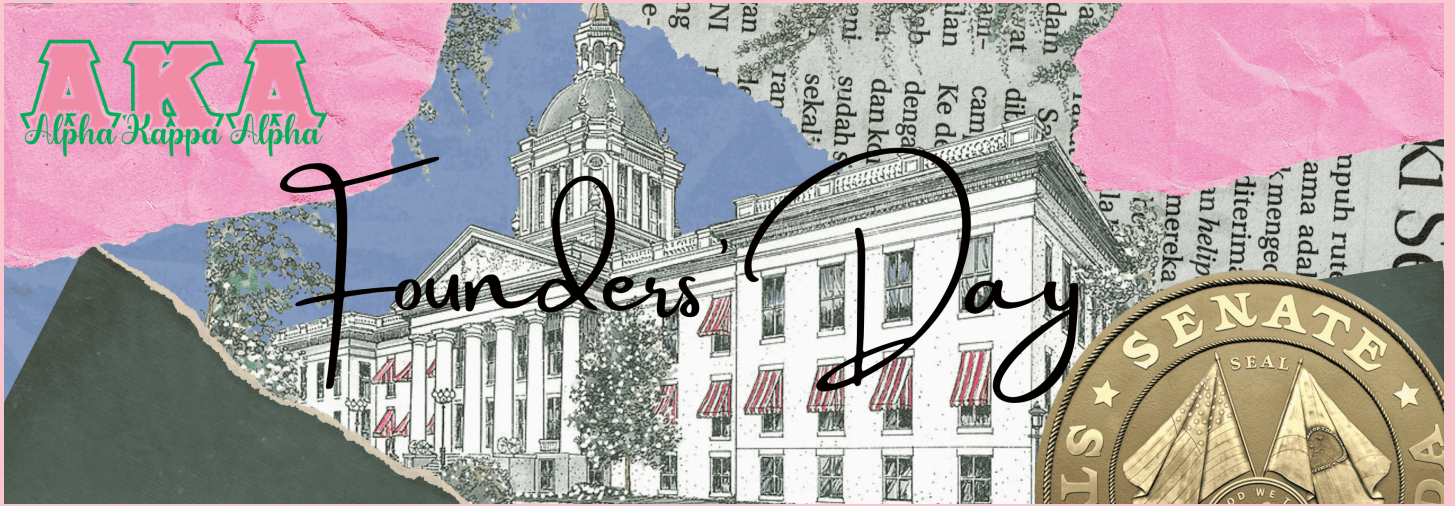
This legislation ensures that Floridians do not lose their in-state residency for tuition purposes simply because they were incarcerated. For too long, people returning home after incarceration—many of whom were born, raised, and deeply rooted in Florida—have been hit with out-of-state tuition costs that make college or workforce training financially out of reach.

This bill changes that.

By protecting resident tuition status, our District 32 bill makes education affordable and accessible at Florida state universities, Florida College System institutions, and career and technical centers. That means returning citizens can enroll, upskill, and earn credentials without being punished financially for time already served.

This is a huge win for second chances! Education is one of the strongest tools we have to reduce recidivism. When returning citizens succeed, our economy is stronger, and cycles of incarceration are broken.

This bill reflects a simple but powerful principle: incarceration should not permanently strip someone of opportunity. District 32 is proud to lead on policies that promote fairness, accountability, and real pathways forward.

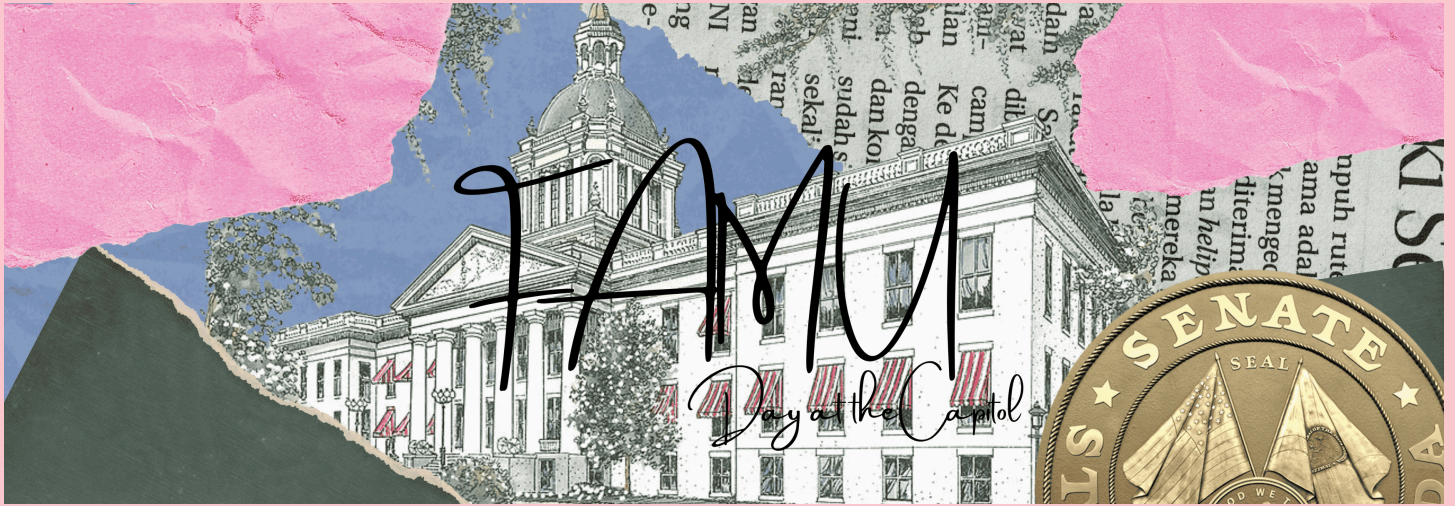
