# Florida Children's Week

Florida Children's Week has been a signature event in the Florida Capitol since Lawton Chiles was our Governor. My favorite Children's Week tradition is the "Hanging of the Hands," which is a collection of tens of thousands of pieces of children's artwork created each year in schools and child care centers around the state. Every year, my breath is taken away when I walk into the Rotunda and see the thousands of tiny hands representing thousands of children who are counting on us to do the right thing. domestic product – there is so much opportunity and I am looking forward to working with Captain Sandy to make sure we are acknowledging the importance of the "blue economy" to Florida's bottom line. It was also great to show her the nautical map in my office showing over 140 miles of coastline in Senate District 3 stretching from Port St. Joe to Steinhatchee!



### **BILLS and BUDGET**

I'm happy to report that two of my bills passed unanimously out of their first committees this week. *The Brownfields to Brightfields Act (SB1562)* calls for a study to look at whether brownfields and landfills could be repurposed as solar farms. This is really a no brainer - taking unproductive blighted land and making it productive with solar panels. What a great idea for the Sunshine State!

The other bill (*SB 290, Surplus State Owned Non-Conservation Lands*) doesn't have nearly as cool of a name, but it will help small fiscally constrained counties who want to acquire state lands or buildings that are no longer being used.

This week we saw our first glimpse at the budget for next year. While I'm cautiously optimistic with what I have seen so far– there is a LONG way to go before we can celebrate. Stay tuned for more on that as we move through the budget process in the coming weeks.

#### **DINING IN THE DARK**

Last weekend we attended the "Dining in the Dark" dinner which is just what it sounds – a dinner completely in the dark to simulate the experience of the visually impaired. This is an annual fundraiser for the Lighthouse of the Big Bend. If you ever have a chance to participate in something like this – you should really do it. And I must share a proud mom moment – Will Hollimon was the recipient of the Paula Bailey Inspiration Award! Thanks so much to the Lighthouse for the work they do every day to serve the needs of the visually impaired across the Big Bend.



I will be taking to the streets on Sunday morning to run the Tallahassee Half Marathon. If you are in Tallahassee this weekend, be sure to check out the road closures, and come on out to cheer on the runners -- it should be a perfect morning!
