31	From the funds in Specific Appropriation 596, \$10,151,874 in nonrecurring funds from the General Revenue Fund is provided to the Department of Corrections to competitively procure deliverables-based contracted services for the replacement of the Offender Based Information System. Of these funds, \$8,151,874 is provided for system modernization, and up to \$2,000,000 is provided to competitively procure a private sector provider with experience in conducting independent verification and validation (IV&V) services of public sector information technology projects to provide IV&V services for all department and vendor staff working to modernize the system. Of these funds, \$9,001,874 shall be held in reserve. The department is authorized to submit quarterly budget amendments requesting release of these funds pursuant to the provisions of chapter 216, Florida Statutes, and based on the department's planned quarterly expenditures. Release is contingent upon the procurement of the IV&V vendor and the approval of a detailed operational work plan and monthly spend plan that identifies all work activities and costs budgeted for Fiscal Year 2022-2023. IV&V reports shall include technical reviews of project deliverables submitted or accepted within the reporting period and assessments of the department's project management and governance. The department shall provide monthly project status reports the Executive Office of the Governor's Office of Policy and Budget, the chair of the Senate Committee on Appropriations, and the chair of the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee, and the Florida-Digital Service. Each status report must include progress made to date for each project milestone, deliverable, and task order, planned and actual completion dates, planned and actual costs incurred, and any current project issues and risks.	From the funds in Specific Appropriation 596, \$13,093,000 in nonrecurring funds from the General Revenue Fund is provided to the Department of Corrections to competitively procure software and hardware for the replacement of the Offender Based Information System (OBIS). Of these funds, \$11,319,750 shall be placed in reserve. The department shall award a multi-year contract for OBIS which must align with the scope as identified in the department's Schedule IV-B submitted September 15, 2021. Upon submission of a copy of the contract approved by the Chief Financial Officer, the department is authorized to submit quarterly budget amendments to request funds held in reserve pursuant to the provisions of chapter 216, Florida Statutes.
