1. Title of Project: Bridge Housing for Homeless Families

Project/Program Description:

This project will provide 48 units to house homeless families awaiting permanent housing. During the 2016-17 school year, over 3,295 school aged children were homeless. Of these students, 888 lived in motels, 96 lived in

school year, over 3,295 school aged children were homeless. Of these students, 888 lived in motels, 96 lived in cars, parks, campgrounds, and 67 lived in shelters. The remaining children shared the housing of other persons also known as "couch surfing". This number does not include their parents or siblings under the age of 5. Nor does this number include the unprecedented numbers of families arriving from Puerto Rico daily. In October, over 1,000 children registered in Osceola County Schools, many without a permanent housing solution. There is currently a 6-8 month waiting lists for private subsidized/ low-income (30% -50% of median income) housing units and a three (3) year waiting list for Housing Choice Vouchers (Section 8).

d. What are the direct services to be provided to citizens by the appropriations project?

48 apartment style housing units.

e. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population is families experiencing homelessness living in motels. Families will be identified through the Continuum of Care and the Coordinated Entry System. The project is expected to serve upwards of 150 families annually based on an average of 120-180 day stays. Exits to permanent housing will increase the turn over rate and projected numbers thereby reducing the residency period to 60 days.

f. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

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150 families annually based on an average of 120-180 day stays. Exits to permanent housing will increase the turn over rate and projected numbers, thereby reducing the residency period to 60 days. The benefit is reduced burden on public services. The cost to allow a chronically homeless individual to remain on the street and access emergency services is \$33,000 annually. The cost to house that same individual and provide wraparound services is \$10,000. The savings to the system of care is similar with homeless families. The project outcome is to improve quality through housing stability and case management. Families placed in this housing solution will be part of the continuum of care and case managed.

- g. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

 This will be a very visible project in Central Florida. With the recent movie "The Florida Project", all eyes are on Central Florida and Osceola County to address the needs of families experiencing homelessness and living in motels. As a result this project will be accountable to jurisdictional partners and the countless families suffering in silence.

The land is owned by Aspire Health Partners. The City was a founding member of the HOME program acquired by Aspire Health Partners in 2012. They agreed to allow completion of this project and will structure a deal necessary to increase housing units needed to address homeless gap in Osceola County.
