- 4. Project/Program Description:

The Autism Society of Florida is formally addressing the drowning rate of children with autism through this scholarship program aimed at improving safety and preventing drownings. This project will provide 250 children with autism living in Florida with instruction in water survival by certified Water Safety Instructors (WSI) through a scholarship program. Also provided will be training of swim instructors on autism and how to teach these children, consultation with the American Red Cross on autism module development, distribution of information to parents and pediatricians on water safety/elopement, and collaboration with the Department of Health (DOH) to ensure that emergency room staff are adequately reporting fatal and non-fatal drownings to DOH so that families can access much needed support.

11. Program Performance:

a. What is the specific purpose or goal that will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Autism Society of Florida is formally addressing the drowning rate of children with autism. Drowning is the number ONE cause of death of children with autism. This statistic has remained the same for decades. Florida has the highest number of drownings in the United States. In 2018 (up until Dec 1), there were 88 drowning deaths of children in Florida – 76% age 3 and younger; 10% were identified as children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD), when only 2% of all children have an ASD. Of the 88 fatal drownings, most were a result of the child wandering, eloping, or missing from a caregiver – all factors that impact autism every day. According to



DOH and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), most children who drown are between the ages of one and four years old. The CDC average age of an ASD diagnosis is 4.5 years of age. There is a strong likelihood that the number of young children who drown would have been later diagnosed with an ASD had they survived.

b. What are the activities and services that will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Vouchers/scholarships of swimming survival lessons for 250 children; training of swim instructors on autism and how to teach these children; educate the American Red Cross on autism toward module development in the Red Cross WSI certification; create and distribute marketing information to pediatricians, teachers, and other professionals working with kids with autism; provide outreach and information to emergency room staff encouraging them to report fatal and near fatal drownings to DOH so that families can access much needed support.

c. What are the direct services to be provided to citizens by the appropriations project?

Water safety/swimming instruction for 250 children with autism through a voucher/scholarship so that family finances do not prevent a child from receiving greatly needed swimming instruction.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Young children with autism - 250 children will be provided coverage through this project. The funds will be paid to Water Safety Instructors who are qualified to provide swimming lessons to children with autism. Water Safety Instructors from the 10 areas of the state with the largest number of childhood drowning incidences will receive training in autism.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Continued decrease of drownings of children with autism until there are no drownings. The progressive attainment of individual swimming skills that will allow an individual to survive a drowning. Methodology: Follow the American Red Cross methodology, a system that is already in place designed to introduce, reinforce, and assess fundamental water skills from infancy to adulthood for participants of all skill levels. As such, the goal is for children to be able to step or jump into water over their head, float or tread water for one minute, turn around in a full circle and find an exit, swim 25 yards to the exit without stopping, and exit the water without using steps or a ladder.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

Withdrawing the funds.
