11. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The requested funds will allow the organization to equip students on the autism spectrum with the resources needed to acquire critical skills that enable them to:

1) Mainstream to less restrictive learning environments when applicable.

2) Engage in higher ratios of instruction as they matriculate through their primary and secondary education.

3) Lead the most independent lives possible as they transition out of the education system.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The organization will advance a host of evidence-based and individualized educational programs based upon the principles of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA), a scientifically proven form of therapy for individuals affected by autism. More specifically, the organization will utilize a small intensive 1:1, 2:1, and 3-5:1 student-to-teacher ratio approach to provide early intervention services geared towards young children acquiring key skills at a critical time in childhood development, self-paced grade level instruction to prepare students for post-secondary education and/or employment opportunities, and vocational/daily living skills training to promote and generalize independence as students age out of the education system.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Lead by professionals highly qualified in the areas of education, behavioral therapy, and supervised by doctoral-level Board-Certified Behavioral Analysts, the organization will provide the following direct services: 1) Intensive verbal and non-verbal communication skills training; 2) Social skills training; 3) Daily living skills training (toileting, cooking, cleaning); 4) Computer literacy instruction; 5) Reading comprehension instruction; 6) Individualized mathematics instruction; 7) Individualized language arts instruction; 8) Specialized physical education; 9) Vocational/employment skills training; 10) Public transit navigation training; 11) Scheduling skills training; 12) Parent trainings; 13) Internships; 14) Supervision/Practicum Hours for professionals seeking certification.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

In 2015, the Florida Governor's Task Force on Autism reported that nearly 10% of all children with disabilities ages 3-21 who received special education services in Florida have autism. Additionally, the National Center for Biotechnology Information (NCBI) reports that 30-50% of individuals diagnosed on the autism spectrum manifest symptoms of other developmental or attention deficit disorders such as ADHD. In direct response to these rising statistics, the target population for this allocation project is children ages 3-22 who have been diagnosed with autism and other related developmental disabilities, including individuals with dual diagnosis such as Down syndrome, ADHD, and Cerebral Palsy. The organization anticipates 120-180 individuals being served through this allocation project each year, including a maximum of 60 students and 60-120 parents and caregivers.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

If achieved at full-scale, we anticipate students on the autism spectrum developing key skills that better positions them to mainstream to less restrictive learning environments, to learn at a higher instructional ratio, and/or demonstrate the level of independence necessary to navigate everyday life as they transition to adulthood. To measure these outcomes, instructors will routinely collect skill acquisition data utilizing the Catalyst system, a powerful digital platform specifically designed for autism professionals to track, monitor, and measure student progress. Each student will have a personalized Catalyst profile that is used to document key areas of development that require improvement such as language or verbal ability. Program instructors digitally collect relevant data, update student profiles as new skill acquisition targets are met, and analyze the data quarterly to report on program outcomes.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

In addition to the organization's standard procedure of returning allocated funds as a penalty for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures as contracted, the organization suggests the additional penalty to be relinquishing future funding eligibility for one fiscal year.
