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11. Program	Performance
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a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

To provide holistic, 4-component customized treatment plans for veterans suffering with visible and invisible scars from combat and military service. The goal of the Resiliency Project is to empower veterans and their families to find purpose, be resilient, and live well.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Over 2.7 million men and women have been deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan in the fight on terrorism. Unfortunately for many veterans, the rigors of combat and the scars of war take a toll on their psychological, social, spiritual, and physical health. In direct correlation to this, the suicide rate among veterans has reached drastic proportions.

SOF Missions has developed an effective solution to dealing with this issue through holistic care plans that address the four components of humans; physical, social, spiritual, and physical. Our primary focus area is The Resiliency Project, where our team develops and provides a complete treatment plan encompassing psychological, social, spiritual, and physical programs. We accomplish this mission through our national network of partners, non-profit organizations, and civilian health care providers.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Psychological: Veterans attend intensive peer-based programs designed to challenge them to overcome past experiences and equip them with tools as they move forward into a life of purpose. Counseling services are also provided for the veteran and their family.

Physical: Veterans who face physical challenges are provided medical care through our nationally recognized partners. Whether they require physical rehabilitation and therapy or life performance medicine; veterans receive the care they need to engage in life again.

Spiritual: Veterans are assigned a mentor to walk alongside them in this journey. Warriors are also provided applicable educational material. These resources bolster their faith and the know-how to overcome life's challenges.

Social: All veterans are given access and plugged into the SOF Network of Teams, "groups with a purpose." They grow spiritually, work together in

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population are veterans, active duty service members and their families. It is expected that greater than 200 individuals will be served.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Improvement of physical, mental, spiritual and social health. Participants will increase their energy levels, find improved movement quality, increase strength and decrease pain and/or headaches. Mentally, participants will decrease levels of anxiety, decrease symptoms of avoidance behavior and reduce their levels of irritability, anger and aggression. Socially, participants will increase participation in leisure activities and find a greater ability to maintain relationships. Lastly, participants will improve their spiritual health through increased personal prayer, reflection and/or meditation. All of the above will be measured through qualitative and quantitative data collection using observations, surveys, and interviews.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

The organization will submit a review to the state detailing it's plan to meet deliverables in a reasonable amount of time and/or accept an abatement in its allocation if services provided are under-utilized or not being used by the target population.



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
