12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The unemployment rate for adults with disabilities is over 80%. ITEM provides participants with the opportunity to earn industry certifications in Technology, Business Administrative Office and Hospitality with wraparound services including employability, social skills, internships, and career coaching. Specific goals to be achieved by ITEM include: Program Completion of 80%; Certification Passage of 60%; and Job Placement of 60%. STEM Works participants will be measured by pre- and post- assessments on: (1) Increased understanding and use of mathematical skills and concepts like data graphing and multi-digit computations; (2) Increased understanding of science concepts like speed, motion, and interactions; (3) Increased problem-solving, communication, and project management skills; (4) Enhanced use of digital media; and (5) Increased confidence in presenting by participating in exhibitions and competitions.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Provide academic instruction according to national industry standards and licensing requirements in business office, technology, or hospitality fields; Adapt the amount of instruction time needed, vary instructional methods and materials, and increase experiential learning; Provide the skills necessary toward gainful employment including social and self-advocacy skills and employment readiness training; Prepare participants for employment with field-specific internships; Provide access to the on-line platform for extended learning and training; Facilitate the creation of resumes using on-line tools; Practice interviewing using a virtual system; Provide STEM curriculum paired with skill training in employment, leadership, time management and independent living; Provide participants with the opportunity to showcase their products at community exhibitions.



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c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Certification programs give participants 300 clock hours in industry certification courses, 310 clock hours of internships, and 150 hours of core/elective courses, independent living skills, and social skills training. Online tools and STEM Works will provide courses in Robotics, Web Development, Graphic Design, and Computer Repair and support additional non-traditional learners seeking employment including public/private secondary schools, nonprofit organizations, government agencies throughout the State of Florida.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

101-200 individuals living in the State of Florida ages 14 to 28 with a diagnosed disability.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Statewide benefits include: Offers a model enhancing delivery of service, addressing the needs of Floridians, leading to increased employment outcomes for nontraditional learners; Lessens reliance on government benefits, such as SSI, through employment leading to greater independence; Isolation, depression, stress, mental health issues, and the associated treatment costs may be reduced through successful employment and individual's integration into the community; Best-practice models for instruction in technology, employment, and financial literacy shared statewide through the on-line platform; Add consumers that support local economies; Increase the number of qualified people to the workforce promoting an inclusive culture.
