4. Project/Program Description

Jack & Jill Children's Center - Economic Empowerment/ Workforce Development Initiative serves low-income working families in Broward County with high-quality early childhood education and family strengthening services. Our programming has proven to be an essential resource, especially during the COVID-19 public health & economic crisis. We are the only NAEYC (National Association for the Education of Young Children)-accredited center in Fort Lauderdale serving the entire family through a two-generation model that allows parent to maintain/advance employment and work toward selfsufficiency, through the provision of case management, parent education, and emergency assistance, while their children receive high quality early childhood education. Research has long documented the positive outcomes of high-quality early childhood education, including readiness for school, greater academic achievement, high rates of high school and college completion, lower rates of incarceration.

12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Jack & Jill Children's Center – Economic Empowerment/ Workforce Development Initiative serves low-income working families in Broward County with high-quality early childhood education and family strengthening services. Our programming has proven to be an essential resource, especially during the COVID-19 public health & economic crisis. We are the only NAEYC accredited center in Fort Lauderdale serving the entire family through a two-generation model that allows parent to maintain/advance employment and work toward self-sufficiency, through the provision of case management, parent education, and emergency assistance.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Parents of our children, a large percentage of whom are essential workers who have served the community throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, will maintain/advance employment and work toward self-sufficiency while our Center provides their children high-quality early childhood education. We serve children, ages 6-weeks through 5-years. Our Family Strengthening Program serves parents through extensive case management, parent enrichment courses, and emergency assistance when necessary.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

We offer a holistic approach to working with children and families: children in our early childhood center will receive quality education from the only NAEYC accredited childcare center in Fort Lauderdale and on-site medical screenings and health services; parents will receive case management, enrichment and financial literacy courses and emergency assistance from our Family Strengthening team.



d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Our target population includes jobless persons; Economically disadvantaged persons; At-risk youth; Homeless; Preschool students; Grade school students; University/college students; Currently or formerly incarcerated persons; Victims of Crime.

Our program is expected to serve 201-400 persons. 90% of parents we serve live within 175% of the Federal poverty line, headed by working single mothers making on average \$24,000/annually supporting more than one child.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?

1. 80% of children will meet or exceed age-appropriate developmental milestones. Children screened 2-3 times/year using Florida VPK Assessment & Teaching Strategies Gold.

2. 75% of parents will maintain or obtain stable and affordable housing. Family Assessments are administered upon a family's enrollment and annually thereafter. New assessments are compared to previous ones to track success/effectiveness.

3. 80% of parents will seek, secure, and/or retain employment, and maintain or increase income. Outcome measured through Family Assessments and pre- and post-assessments during parent education classes.
