4. Project/Program Description

To provide re-entry services which includes both pre-release and post-release services. On the pre-release side, the Operation New Hope (ONH) Ready4Release program meets with inmates to formalize a release plan. On the post-release side, the ONH Ready4Work program provides: case management, mental health support, soft skills training, vocational training, job preparation training, and a dedicated job coach. Additional supportive services are available such as: transportation, transitional housing assistance, clothing assistance, medical /vision assistance, assistance to obtain vital documents, and allowance for work related clothing that may be necessary. The program's success is measured by a 3 year 8.64% recidivism rate compared to FDOC's recidivism rate of 24.5%.

12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Operation New Hope will deliver of our nationally-recognized, reentry services to specific locations which will decrease the States costs, while continuing to increase public safety through reduced recidivism. In conjunction with the State's ongoing First Step criminal justice reform aimed at reducing prison populations, Operation New Hope will feature reentry services as the strategy required to: slash incarceration costs, address the lack of available reentry services, reduce the unemployment rate for the formerly incarcerated, increase the number of available skilled workers, treat substance abuse and addiction, break the cycle of poverty, lower recidivism rates, and correct coercive mobility. The Florida Department of Corrections reports a 3-year recidivism rate of 24.5%. Our Ready4Work program reports a 3-year recidivism rate for the same cohort of 8.64%. We are saving taxpayers millions of dollars by avoiding repeated cost of incarceration and lost tax revenue.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Pre-release direct services include: face to face release management planning, follow-up meetings with inmates to continue to work the release plan, and coordination of housing prior to release.

Post-release direct services include assistance and funding for: housing, transportation, medical, vital documents, and clothing/work attire. In addition, post-release direct services include full-time gainful wage employment through job training, case management, substance abuse treatment, and mental heath support.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?



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Implementing a comprehensive 4-pronged approach (case management, supportive services, job training, and job placement assistance), our Ready4Work post-release program ensures each client succeeds. Our clients can receive up to \$5,000 in supportive services and earned incentives while enrolled in the program. This includes transitional housing and transportation services. We also work with post-secondary educational institutions to address the skills gap of employment needs and offer vocational training to provide our clients with a competitive edge that leads to living wage employment. In addition to our Ready4Work program, Operation New Hope successfully delivers Ready4Release pre-release services to 17 prisons. Our dedicated pre-release team meets face to face with inmates prior to release to create individualized release plans for a successful transition back to the community.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Jobless persons, economically disadvantaged persons, currently or formerly incarcerated persons and justice-involved drug offenders. We will anticipate serving approximately 400-500 pre-release inmates and 250-325 post release individuals.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected outcomes are to enable citizens returning to the community to be stable, with improved life and job skills. This will enable them to find employment, become self supporting and reduce recidivism rates. All of our data is managed in the Efforts to Outcomes software (by Social Solutions). Measurements are based on: career development graduation, job placement, job retention, average salary, and recidivism.
