12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Teach For America will support the development of Title I School novice teachers (in years 1-3 of teaching) in Jefferson, Duval, Polk, Brevard, & Miami-Dade counties.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

A series of professional development opportunities including a focus on: creating welcoming and inclusive classrooms, building rigorous student-centered classrooms, foundational skill on data-driven classroom reflection, and responding to pandemic and other public emergency circumstances such as hurricanes.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The educators trained by Teach For America immediately provide direct services in high-need classrooms and critical shortage subject areas.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?



Funds will be returned.

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Economically disadvantaged persons, at-risk youth, grade school students, high school students, and university/college students. More than 900 students will benefit as a result of Teach For America's training of novice teachers.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Teach For America provides more middle and high school math and science teachers to Florida Title I schools than any state college or university. Students taught by Teach For America teachers demonstrate an extra 3 months of learning in math over the course of one school year, relative to students in other classrooms within their same school. Students demonstrated increased learning in reading and literacy skills during years they were taught by Teach For America teachers, compared to years taught by non-Teach For America teachers.

Data on Teach For America's teacher placement at Florida Title 1 schools compared to state colleges and universities comes from the Florida Department of Education. The increased math performance by students with Teach For America teachers was found in two different third-party studies, conducted by the American Institutes for Research and Mathematica Policy Research, Inc., respectively.
