4. Project/Program Description

The Miami River Commission was created by the Florida Legislature for the purpose of improving economic development as well as protecting the natural areas of the Miami River. The Miami River Commission is mandated in s. 163.06, F.S., to perform certain functions and make annual reports to the Legislature and Governor. While ongoing funding is partially received from Miami-Dade County, City of Miami, and private entities, the costs associated with programs, functions, and compliance of state reporting exceeds what is contributed locally..

12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Improving the Miami River District's economy and natural environment. Assist job generating business in the Miami River District. Improve the environment via removing illegal dumping and invasive plant species and providing new plantings, water decontamination, etc. Host public meetings, website, etc. Market and promote the multi-use, multi-cultural, multi-income Miami River District, which includes the downtown Miami, Little Havana, and Overtown areas.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Assisting new private sector businesses to open along the Miami River. Removing illegal dumping materials and invasive plant species clean-up, including on state-owned submerged lands. Scavenger Water Decontamination Vessel services collect floating debris while decontaminating 600,000 gallons of river water per hour and injecting 150,000 liters of oxygen into the Miami River every hour, significantly improving water quality. Plantings, landscaping, and painting over graffiti along the public riverwalk.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Scavenger Water Decontamination Vessel services improving water quality. New plantings, landscaping, and painting over graffiti along the public riverwalk. Assist businesses with due diligence and the processes to open. Assist citizens with any issue related to the Miami River. Host and provide supplies for volunteer Miami River clean up events. Maintain the community vegetable and fruit garden. Frequent updates of the informative website, www.miamirivercommission.org.

The Miami River District has the most densely populated neighborhoods in the State of Florida, including downtown Miami, Brickell, Little Havana, Overtown, Allapattah, Durham Park, Spring Garden, Grove Park, and Melrose. Miami River District attracts new businesses, which create new jobs.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Significantly improving the Miami River District's economy by assisting businesses and improving its natural environment by removing garbage, decontaminating water, providing new plantings, etc. The outcome will be measured by the number of new businesses, quantity of cubic yards of collected and disposed garbage and invasive plant species, number of gallons of decontaminated Miami River water, and number of assisted job generating businesses.
