12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Florida Stroke Registry (FSR) aims to maintain Florida's position as a national leader in stroke care by, 1) driving a quality improvement-based system of stroke care; 2) expanding evidence-based interventions; 3) improving the rapid identification and triage of stroke patients; 4) enhancing community outreach on prevention and better transitions of care; and 5) building upon the past four years of state funding that has facilitated the Florida Stroke Registry's success in securing Floridians excellent quality of stroke care.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The FSR produces evidence-based results, which impact the quality of stroke care for Floridians through: 1) Organizing data collection across stroke centers; 2) Applying interoperability of Florida state agency databases with the stroke registry; 3) Production of annual reports (for over 154 stroke centers) to track, measure, and benchmark stroke performance and outcomes; 4) Production of region-specific reports to help organize stroke systems of care and to improve the provision of treatment; 5) Developing, Demonstrating, and Disseminating interventions to address disparities and gaps in quality of care; 6) Expanding FSR stakeholder membership and networks to include multidisciplinary representation; 7) Enhancing community outreach on stroke education; and 8) Developing and informing evidence-based interventions.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?



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Stroke remains one of the leading causes of mortality and disability for Floridians. The FSR serves Florida citizens by improving the quality of stroke care they or loved ones receive at stroke centers and ultimately reducing stroke mortality and disability. FSR data-driven feedback provides hospitals benchmarks to increase the number of patients receiving life-saving stroke treatment; improve overall stroke care quality; provide interventions; and inform policy to facilitate Floridian's receipt of the highest quality of stroke care.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Target populations include hospital systems of care, health professionals (clinicians, pharmacists, paramedics, administrators, stroke coordinators, case managers, policy advocates, academics), stroke patients and caregivers, and stroke advocacy groups. Direct collaboration will occur with over 154 currently participating Florida hospitals, and multiple Emergency Medical Service Departments.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Expected benefits include improvement of hospital stroke performance measures, increasing the number of stroke patients who will receive life-saving treatments, reducing stroke recurrence and disability, and improving quality of life after stroke; all benefits that could result in a reduction of healthcare costs associated with the disease of stroke. Multiple FSR educational programs continue to be expanded to disseminate the most current information about stroke treatment and prevention to healthcare providers in FL. Outcomes will be measured through data-driven results provided through relevant FSR analyses and visualized for hospitals in their Annual and Regional reports. The Annual reports are developed for each of the participating hospitals to track, measure, and benchmark their quality-of-care performance metrics. Regional reports are developed to meet the needs to track and measure endovascular therapy, which since 2017 has become the new standard in stroke care.
