SF has received \$52.2 million in federal assistance, including \$21.7 million directed towards student relief and \$30.5 million for institutional support. Of the \$30.5 million, SF anticipates using \$24.3 million to offset current and projected revenue loss caused by the pandemic. The remaining amount is set to cover academic support, student support services and facility health safety enhancements throughout FY 21-22 and 22-23.

### 12. Program Performance

### a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

To grow student capacity; maximize classroom utilization; expand academic programing and technologies; increase student access; keep students and employees safe, and address the needs of employers. Investments for maintaining and enhancing these facilities is vital to supporting SF's service district and developing its workforce.

### b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Classrooms and lab spaces will be remodeled to optimize college course section sizes, increase capacity in high demand STEM classes and enhance classroom technology to all students, including for remote learning and multiple instructional modalities. These modifications will improve learning opportunities, student retention and completion.

### c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Students will have greater access to highly sought-after academic and workforce programs. Instructional areas, including classrooms and laboratories, will be modernized and significant upgrades to the existing facilities will extend the life of the buildings that were built in the mid-1970s. Academic support services will also be enhanced by the project which will directly benefit the students.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?



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The target population includes current and future high school and college students; jobless persons, economically disadvantaged persons; homeless, and veterans. The project impacts the four large academic houses on campus as well as 5 other buildings predominantly dedicated to direct instruction. Thousands of individuals are expected to be served.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

SF will adapt learning environments and re-imagine existing spaces to grow capacity, maximize classroom utilization, expand academic programing and technologies, increase student access, keep students and employees safe, and address the needs of employers. Modernized learning spaces will allow SF to remain nimble to serve an immediate local industry need by more customized and innovative training solutions for regional companies. The project will also improve program access and expand SF's record of producing extraordinary degree and credential attainment, career and earnings outcomes, and equitable results for low-income, first-generation, and underrepresented students.
