12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Florida's manatees are experiencing a crisis and The Bishop Museum of Science and Nature has been asked by FWC and USFWS to expand its manatee rehabilitation program. The Bishop has been caring for and releasing manatees since 1998 and has specific expertise in caring for young calves. By helping The Bishop expand its program, this funding will also expand the rehabilitation network's overall capacity and help the network strategically maximize use of facilities and resources.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The Bishop will either lease and retrofit a portion of an existing facility in Manatee County or retrofit space on the Museum campus, depending on funding. The Bishop will work with the Manatee Rescue and Rehabilitation Partnership to determine which animals will be cared for by Bishop staff and manage facilities accordingly. Additionally, Bishop staff will train and share their expertise with other organizations to enhance capabilities among all members of the rehabilitation partnership. The Bishop also raises awareness of the challenges manatees face and how members of the public can help manatees in need through presentations to Museum visitors and its outreach communications.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

A larger number of manatees will be rehabilitated than is currently possible due to increased physical capacity of the rehabilitation network. Training will be provided to less experienced organizations and individuals, enhancing efficiency and effectiveness of the network.

Students from 10 Florida counties visit the Museum annually and will learn about the manatee crisis and ramifications of the decline in seagrass around Florida. This real-life situation is difficult to include in textbooks or formal curricula because of its dynamic nature.

Manatees are a "sentinel species" so things that affect them can eventually affect people. We will show the public that we can help manatees during a crisis, demonstrating that environmental concerns can be addressed and they can make a difference with their individual actions. Human health is directly tied to environmental health so taking action to help manatees now will also enhance human health in the long run.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

People and manatees in Florida will benefit from this project. Increasing the statewide capacity to rehabilitate more manatees benefits the manatee population in both the short and long term.

Nature-based tourism is a significant part of Florida's tourism economy and manatees are an important component, creating employment and economic opportunities for communities. A healthy manatee population is crucial to this industry. This kind of tourism also educates residents and visitors about the environment and its importance to human health and quality of life, encouraging environmentally friendly behavior to preserve Florida's natural resources.

Our collective cultural experience is enriched by increased awareness of manatees as Florida's state marine mammal, the challenges they face in the wild, the importance of preserving Florida's natural resources and appreciation of the interconnectedness of people, animals and the environment. What's good for manatees is also good for people.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

More manatees will be rehabilitated and released during a crisis time for manatees, thereby contributing to recovery of this Threatened species as efficiently and cost-effectively as possible. Local citizens will be more aware of how to help manatees during this crisis and know that manatees found on local beaches will be helped.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Withholding of recurring funds.
