COI received PPP loans to support staff to provide basic needs supports to over 400 families during the crisis. Over 118,904 lbs of food were delivered to homes as well as personal protective equipment, child development and education resources. Assistance was provided for housing referrals and utility supports. COI also received funding from the City of Jacksonville to provide additional COVID-19 basic needs and child development supports through door-to-door outreach.

12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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When a parent is incarcerated, children are uncertain about the safety of their parent and this insecurity undermines children's ability to cope and to grow in a healthy manner. The result for young children is insecure attachments and bonds. These broken bonds have been linked to poorer peer relationships and diminished cognitive abilities. Over half, 58%, of children with incarcerated parents are under 10 years of age. School-aged children and teenagers face problems such as poor academic performance, peer relationship issues and classroom behavior problems, often resulting in suspension and high drop-out rates. The Children of Inmates, Inc. Family Strengthening and Reuniting program addresses these challenges by reconnecting children with their incarcerated parent and working to sustain that connection. Follow-up and support services are offered to help the child overcome the challenges and achieve a positive developmental track, with the support of caring, responsible adults.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

COI will conduct a minimum 60 bonding visits to support family strengthening in FL correctional facilities. The Covid-19 pandemic halted visitations and severely interrupted bonding for the children and their parents; further, it left children and caregivers with a heighten concern about their loved ones, creating additional trauma. During this period, COI continued to operate, providing door-to-door outreach to bring food, personal protective equipment, cleaning supplies, educational supports and most importantly, child development activities to over 400 families. We focused on providing civic and STEM education activities to foster enhanced literacy rates and community connectedness. With the relaunch of bonding visitations, COI is engaging incarcerated individuals and FDC to proactively serve "fragile families." We have found children from "fragile families" consistently have more difficulties with behavior, health and education. We will create care plans with incarcerated pare

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Direct services to be provided will be transportation and social services to support families during the bonding visits. For participating "fragile families" wrap-around care coordination, including facilitated referrals to appropriate service providers to meet basic needs including addressing health, homelessness, disabilities, substance abuse and educational needs, child development assessments, child therapy and child development activities and child safety protection gear will be provided. Tutoring and evidenced based engagement activities and supplies will be provided through the STEM and literacy activities. Advocacy services will be provided to enhance public understanding of the plight of children of incarcerated parents.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population served by this project are children with incarcerated parents and their caregivers. COI serves children, ages 0-21 throughout Florida. We also serve currently and formerly incarcerated parents, assisting them to rebuild relationships with their children and caregivers. We anticipate serving 1,500 children with these funds. This equates to approximately 600 families or incarcerated individuals. Research from Cambridge University documents that children with incarcerated parents are at twice the risk of mental illness and three times the risk of antisocial behaviors. Many are economically disadvantaged and often face homelessness. Further, many within the COI population struggle with developmental disabilities and/or physical disabilities. Children with incarcerated parents are exposed to higher levels of community and direct violence.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected benefits are to interrupt intergeneration incarceration by identifying, working with and supporting children with incarcerated parent. Working with "fragile families", activities will focus on reducing physical, verbal aggression and anti-social behaviors in children with incarcerated parents who exhibit these behaviors. Over 85% of COI children report reduced anti-social behaviors. Family visits create strong bond between incarcerated parent, children and caregivers and promote family support for the incarcerated parent upon returning to community. Using FDC data, COI found that over 89% of COI participants successfully re-enter and rebuild their lives over a three year period. In short, family matters for reentry.
