12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

To become an autonomous Fire Academy by building training center with facility structures, burn props, classrooms, and other requirements in accordance with Florida Administrative Code 69a 37.060.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The pinnacle of fire training centers is in the fire tower. Minimum Standards require the fire tower for skills and certification training. Specialized training such as confined space, rope rescue, and collapse training can be conducted using a fire training tower. Florida requires live-fire training as part of minimum training standards. Also, exterior props provide the basis for the car fire scenario. These scenarios are necessary for the students to graduate.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

To erect a fire training tower facility on East Campus that meets the requirements of F.A.C. 69a-37.060 suitable for search training, ladder training, rope rappelling, advancing hose lines, rescue drills, confined space training and rapid intervention crew training. The Fire Academy at PHSC is seeking two buildings: one for live fire and one with necessary classrooms for instruction and trainings.

To build a separate or attached facility to conduct live fire burn training on East Campus the meets both NFPA 1403 and F.A.C. 69a-37.060 suitable for holding a live fire training on East Campus.

Build or contract to be built an LP operated prop consisting of a tank and a vehicle fire prop for live-fire exercise with exterior props having a remote operation control panel for realistic live fire training.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The primary target population served by this project are the citizens of Pasco and Hernando Counties as well as the surrounding counties. With a Burn Center, we would offer current fire fighter advanced and specialized training courses our Career and Job Training (non-credit).

In Pasco County alone, they plan to hire at least 200 new fire fighters in the next two years. We could assist with the training if we had our own Burn Center to train cadets during the day and night academies. We presently only hold a night academy. Each academy may hold 40 cadets. We may have a total of 120 cadets per year in the Fire Academy plus training courses.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

To continue to grow the PHSC Fire Academy. At present, we rent the Pasco County Fire's fire tower, but we can only use it in the evenings or weekends. If Pasco County Fire grows, PHSC Fire Academy may not have a place to conduct the scenario-based fires required for fire training and might need to end the Academy. In addition, each cadet in the Fire Academy must pass the necessary exams as set by the Florida Fire College to become a firefighter in Florida. To ensure our training is successful, we would want at least a 90% pass rate for each Academy. We would also like to become self-sustainable by offering our non-credit advanced and specialized training courses to assist in replenishing our consumables and supplies that were damaged quickly with overuse.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

The main penalty for PHSC Fire Academy at present is we may not have a Burn Center for our students in the Fire Academy to train, and the Fire Academy may need to cease offering classes until a proper Burn Center is available for our students.

Pasco-County State College would be the entity who would take ownership of the facility to maintain for the future.
