4. Project/Program Description

The Stepping Up Initiative includes pre- and post-arrest strategies, connecting people to behavioral health services at all five intercept points. As part of this national evidence-based initiative, the program addresses the over-representation of people with mental illnesses and/or substance use disorders in the Broward County jails; identifies inmates who may be diverted into community mental health programs using standard assessment tools in the jails, links behavioral health professionals and providers to collaborate with judges, state attorneys, and public defenders; saving \$300 per day (up from \$224) per person by diverting from the Broward jails; improving lives. Additional savings to sheriffs and police will ensue due to fewer arrests. Savings to hospitals and emergency rooms and homeless shelters/programs will occur, building a healthier and safer community. Providing treatment will prevent trauma and restore lives of people with mental illness and/or substance use disorders.

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

As part of the national Stepping Up Initiative, to address the over-representation of people with Mental illnesses and/or SUD in the Broward County jails; inmates will be identified who may be diverted into community mental health programs using standard assessment tools in the jails, linking behavioral health professionals and providers to collaborate with judges, state attorneys, and public defenders; saving \$300 per day (up from \$224) per person by diverting from the Broward County jail; improving lives. The project will also support a collaboration of advocates, behavioral health providers, the Managing Entity, law enforcement, jail and court personnel, etc. to connect people to community services, avoiding arrests altogether.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Inmates who qualify for the post-arrest jail diversion program are provided with individualized transition planning including linkages to community-based behavioral health treatment and support services Inmates. The Stepping Up Initiative Task Force will also review behavioral health and criminal justice systems to fill gaps and avoid incarceration for people with MI and/or SUD.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Behavioral health assessment, drug screening, risk-needs assessment, case management to link clients to housing and BH community services, peer support services and other supportive services as needed. Pre-arrest diversion includes monthly review of CIT Training, Mobile Response Teams, Baker-Act facilities, the 988 hotline, the Centralized Receiving System, co-responder programs and other ways to divert from the criminal justice system.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Target population is: Persons with poor mental health, economically disadvantage persons, homeless, currently or formerly incarcerated persons, drug offenders. The program will impact more than 800 individuals. As of September this year, 1687 inmates in the Broward jail are on the Mental Health Caseload, with 851 identified as living with Serious Mental Illness.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Improve physical and mental health by connecting participants to medical/medication management. Protect the general public from harm by providing CIT training to officers and diverting individuals with mental illnesses from the jail, increase and improve economic activity and self sufficiency by supporting individuals once they obtain employment and referring them to employment and vocational training and stable housing. Reduce recidivism to crisis units, re-arrest and State Hospital, reduce substance abuse by engaging participants in treatment and avoiding re-arrest. Data is being collected for these measures.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Efforts to meet performance measures and deliverables will be paramount to the operational plan. Failure to meet measures will be examined and justified as necessary. Processes will be re-evaluated, and an improvement plan will be developed to address deficiencies. Performance is reviewed on a monthly basis.
