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The Project will replace and revitalize an aging infrastructure, update security, and make necessary repairs in dorm showers and leaking roofs, replace leaking and aging windows and equipment in the critical areas such as the kitchen, school and vocational programs on campus.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Continuing to help residents recover from substance abuse through completing high school education and continuing to transition to a preferred vocational training field such as Culinary certification, Plumbing pre-apprenticeships, Computer Tech, Computer Graphics, Photography, Arts, Broadcasting, etc.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Therapeutic substance abuse treatment as well as educational / vocational courses that enhance the individual's ability to become a confident, skilled, independent, and productive man.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Adolescents and young adult males. Thousands have completed the program successfully and we have a 82% success rate. We continue to assist all who are referred by the drug courts, DJJ, DCF and the criminal justice system. Our capacity for residential is 40.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

That 70% of the persons served will positively complete the program and 90% enrolled in school at discharge. Successful completion is determined by a person served being 100% drug free and completed 75% of their treatment goals.
